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

Kristina Hollier and Laura Longworth had their film break as extras in newly released comedy drama Song for Marion, which also stars former Dr Who Christopher Eccleston and Bond girl Gemma Arterton.

The film, which centres on grumpy pensioner Arthur and his wife Marion who is terminally ill with cancer, was shot on Tyneside and in Durham.

Kristina and Laura, both 17 and students at Ponteland Community High School and the Famous 4.15 performing arts school in Jesmond, enjoyed a full day's filming with the cast and crew in High Heaton, Newcastle.

Laura said: "We were in the park as the choir sang, dancing and watching. We did

a whole day's worth of filming. It was a fun day; meeting the stars was amazing. It also made me appreciate how much work goes into making a film - it's not as glamorous as you think, however it's definitely something I want to do."

Kristina added: "I enjoyed the day; it was really interesting to meet new people and talk to them about their experiences as actors. It makes you realise how much time and effort goes into a few scenes and makes you appreciate the work ethic of the crew as well as the cast."

Their first foray into the world of the big screen follows earlier work on the small screen, as Kristina explained: "We have been attending Famous 4.15 for six years. They encourage and like to give us as many opportunities as possible in all forms of performing and got us the parts in Song for Marion.

"We've also been in CBBC's Wolfblood, Tracy Beaker, Tracy Beaker Returns and The Dumping Ground. Our acting coach at Famous 4.15 Tony Havelock took us along on the day and he was in the film himself."

Laura is studying A Levels in Art, Performing Arts and 3D Product Design and Kristina is taking Performing Arts, English Literature and Psychology. Both finish this summer and hope to study drama at university with a view to becoming professional actresses.

Tony, who also works as a media professional for the BBC, said: "It was great because the girls were right in the thick of it. They really got a feel of what it's like to be in a production like that."

# Cadets take controls of £12m 747 jumbo jet simulator

Two Ponteland Air Cadets enjoyed a test flight on a British Airways 747 jumbo simulator during a visit to Heathrow Airport.

Cadet Sergeant Alex Burn and Cadet Corporal Josh McAree took the controls of the  $\mathfrak{L}12m$  simulator at the BA Flight Training Centre, which are used to train the firm's own pilots.

Following the visit, the cadets were hosted overnight at RAF Northolt before being taken to the Royal Air Force Battle of Britain Bunker at RAF Uxbridge where they were given a guided tour of the museum by one of the volunteers. During World War 2, the Bunker housed the No.11 Group Operations Room and was used to coordinate the RAF's side of the Battle of Britain.

Josh, 15, said: "This was easily the best activity I have done with the Air Cadets. I have flown the simulators at the Squadron and at the Air Operations Acquaintance Centre at RAF Linton-on-Ouse, but this was something else! It was just like flying a real 747 and I had a brilliant time".

Alex, 16, added: "The visit to the Battle of Britain bunker was a fantastic opportunity to learn about the RAF's involvement during World War 2 and I learned a huge amount about the history of the RAF. I even got the opportunity to sit in the chair that Churchill sat on in 1940 when he visited the Bunker at the height of the Battle of Britain!"


## Teen star Olivia sets sights on O2 Arena

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#### **PROJECTS REPORT**

#### Memorial Hall

The planning application has been lodged with the County Council and is currently out for public consultation.

#### Street information signs

Work on the design of the back of the maps is nearing completion.

#### **Skate Park**

Arrangements are being made to have the requested noise survey carried out.

#### Repairs to brick walls at Waitrose Bridge Approval of the application lodged with the Environment Agency was awaited.

#### War Memorial

Prices are being sought for the repair of the damaged front wall. A report is to be considered at the April meeting regarding the War Memorial design.

#### Tree works at sub station and Darras Road

This work is now complete with the exception of the felling of one tree at the Darras Road bus stop.

#### River bank repairs

Quotes have been sought from four companies to carry out the necessary works at the worst areas of bank erosion in the park. The Council has allocated funds in the budget for this work and it was agreed that the lowest quotation be agreed.

## GRANTS TO LOCAL ORGANISATIONS

### Ponteland United Reformed Church Luncheon Club

The Council approved a grant of £250 for assistance towards transport costs to allow people to attend this Club.

#### Ponteland United Football Club

The Council approved a grant of £500 following an application from the Football Club for assistance towards the purchase of new adult size goal posts and nets for use on one of the new pitches being constructed.

The Council agreed the use of the Park for Party in the Park to be held on Sunday 9 June and to provide the toilets as in previous years.

### DARRAS HALL ESTATE COMMITTEE – BRIDLE PATH

The Council considered a report on the bridle path, which has been maintained for many years by the Darras Hall Estate Committee and the Town Council had given an annual grant towards this. The Darras Hall Estate Committee has had to reluctantly agree that they will have to scale down the extent of their work as it was becoming an increasing financial burden. According to agreements made in 1972, the County Council is responsible for its maintenance and will need to increase its involvement, although it was recognised that its budget was also constrained. It was reported that some drainage ditches had been created recently in view of the level of damage caused by the heavy rains and the Town Council agreed to a contribution of £200 towards the cost of these works. The Council also agreed to discussions being held with NCC and the Darras Hall Estate Committee in an attempt to establish an acceptable maintenance regime.

#### CORE STRATEGY

It was reported that three Councillors had reviewed the Core Strategy document and had prepared a submission for review and confirmation by the Council. Councillors agreed with the comments made and these would be submitted to NCC as the Town Council's response.

#### **CEMETERY COMMITTEE**

Various meetings of the Council's Cemetery Committee had been held to discuss issues relating to responsibility for this service being transferred to the Town Council from 1 April 2013. The service would be delivered by the County Council in 2013-14 on a Service Level Agreement basis. The Committee held on 4 March had made several recommendations for approval by the Town Council. The Council agreed to accept the proposal for the standard of maintenance at the Cemetery which would be the same as that currently provided by the County Council. The fees and charges already set by NCC were also agreed and the new scale of fees for 2013-14 would be approved when set by the County Council. The Council approved the residency criteria for Prestwick Cemetery as follows: residency was defined as living within the civil parish at the time of death or having lived in the area previously for a specific period of time i.e. 20 years. Proof would be required. This would hopefully deal with residents who

had had to go into care homes etc and were living outside of the boundary. Councillors also agreed the regulations for the Cemetery and the woodland burial section.

#### **HIGHWAYS WORKING PARTY**

The Working Party met on 21 February and the Council approved the recommendations from that group. The repainting of the bollards at Broadway would be carried out by the Town Council. A request was to be made to the County Council to divert the funds for the North Road resurfacing scheme to resurfacing on Middle Drive in view of the poor state of repair of this road.

### ENVIRONMENT WORKING PARTY

The Working Party had met on 18 February and the Council approved the following recommendations made by the Group:

A quote for the planting works next to Waitrose was approved.

It was agreed to have some works carried out to one of the large planters at the top of Merton Way near to the CIU Club in response to comments made by the judges from Northumbria in Bloom last year.

Approval was given to obtaining quotes for various tree works as a result of the tree report received from the Council's consultant.

It was also agreed to carry out a survey of trees in the Council's ownership that were not in the Park.

### NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

Councillor Richard Dodd reported that the County Council's budget had been set and some £6m was to be used for roads and potholes. He reported that he was attempting to have the lay-by on Thornhill Road made into some parking spaces for users of the Merton Way shops. A further meeting was to be held soon. He expressed some concerns about parking on the corner of Ashbrooke Drive and this was to be examined to see what could be done.

# New parking bays to ease daily scramble for spaces

The lack of parking spaces on Thornhill Road has been a controversial subject which has led to demonstrations by concerned pedestrians who have accused some parents doing the school run of dangerous driving.

But the daily scramble for spaces on the congested Ponteland street will be at least a little easier for residents after the creation of 12 new parking bays.

Social housing provider Isos and Northumberland County Council have steered through the project, which has been delivered by Mears Construction and Groundwork North East. Local ward member Councillor Richard Dodd has also been a driving force behind the £57,000 initiative.

He said: "We have worked on this road for quite a long time, putting in a crossing and new lining and this is the final piece of the jigsaw to give the more senior residents the chance to be able to park directly outside their homes."

Having parked the car for the first time in the new bay adjacent to his home, Joe Faulder said: "This is much better for us now, being able to park right next to the house and not having to worry about finding a space or parking on a narrow, busy road."

Andy Kennedy, Support Services Manager with Isos, added: "We know the residents have been experiencing parking problems here for some time and so, in consultation with the local community and partnership with the council, we have provided these extra bays to ease the squeeze."

# Blackbird set to fly again

A pub company has pledged to put an historic Ponteland watering hole "back on the map" with a major investment programme.

The Blackbird, on North Road, was taken over and refurbished by the Washington-based Principle Leisure Group in 2010, but closed its doors again last year after PLG went into administration.

Now it has been taken over by the Burton upon Trent based Spirit Pub Company, which owns around 800 licensed premises in the UK including the Chef & Brewer, Fayre & Square and Flaming Grill brands.

Managing Director Chris Welham, in a letter to Ponteland Civic Society, said: "I am very pleased to say that we have taken the decision to invest in improving the pub and we will be doing this with an independent and very experienced operator.

"The pub will not be converted to one of our managed brands but rather a unique local pub. I am confident that the new operator will create a great place for all of the community of Ponteland and certainly put the pub back on the map.



"We are currently finalising the development plans, permissions and agreement approvals and hope that we can secure everything for April this year."

Planning and listed building applications on the building, which has origins going back to the 13th century and features including a Tudor fireplace, Jacobean players' gallery in the upstairs function room and an ancient tower, are currently awaiting decision by Northumberland County Council.

# Council receives more than 1,000 objections to 280-home green belt scheme Decision on application expected in July

# Controversial plans for a 280-home development on green belt land at Birney Hill have generated more than 1,000 objections to Northumberland County Council.

The £96m scheme also includes a community farm, commercial space, landscaping and open spaces, with 75 acres of land 'gifted' to the local community and managed by a community trust owned and run by residents.

Applicant Lugano Developments says the community trust will have access to funding of up to £10m to "enhance the social, economic and environmental wellbeing of the town".

A spokesperson for Northumberland County Council said: "We have received at least 1,000 responses to the consultation on the application by Lugano Developments Ltd for outline planning permission for land at Birney Hill Farm near Ponteland. We are progressing with the details involved in consideration of the application.

"We are currently planning to schedule a member site visit and public meeting for June, with a view to reporting the application to the July meeting of the West Area Planning Committee, subject to satisfactory progress with the application."

Ponteland Town Council held a special meeting on March 7 at Merton Hall to discuss the planning application, which more than 20 members of the public attended. The Town Council has lodged a formal objection to the county council on the following grounds:

- · It contravenes Green Belt policy
- It is premature
- It is inappropriate
- It is unsustainable.

## FLIGHT OF THE RED KITE EXHIBITION COMES TO ST MARY'S

A giant red kite mosaic with a 22m wingspan will be the focal point of an exhibition coming to St Mary's Church in May.

The artwork was created by Team Valley based Chromazone using 150 polystyrene tiles. It will be accompanied by textual information and images by professional photographer Kaleel Zibe showing community involvement in the Northern Kites Project.

The project was responsible for the re-introduction of 94 red kites in this core area between 2004 and 2009. In 2006 red kites began to breed in the region for the first time after an absence of 170 years.

#### County council planning strategy should protect farmland

In their new Core Strategy document, Northumberland County Council's vision and objectives for the future of our beautiful county focus largely on development and is weak on protecting the lovely open countryside that we all value. Surely this does not represent the views of the majority of the population?

Six of the eight objectives preferred by the county council promote development and there is no recognition of the importance of the agricultural economy or the need to maintain openness and separation between settlements.

The countryside is under enormous pressure from developers who are seeking to profit from the Government's eagerness to rescue the economy by creating development opportunities. Whilst appropriate development is clearly to be encouraged, the open countryside and productive agriculture is in great danger of being lost forever.

There is considerable doubt that newly approved development land would actually be developed in the short term. The market for housing, for example, is depressed not because of land shortage, but by the lack of available finance.

Developers are more likely to build up their land banks with new green field acquisitions, but delay development until the economy is stronger. These would then be developed ahead of brown field sites which are currently available, but compromised by market conditions.

All of us who care about keeping Northumberland open and green whilst encouraging development where it does not compromise this character, must let the county council know our feelings by responding to the consultation on the new Core Strategy.

In particular we should urge that its vision should recognise that Northumberland is a largely rural county with well separated settlements which is distinct from adjacent urban areas and that the continued use of productive farmland should be given a high priority and protected. This should also be supported by suitable objectives and policies.

## Developer's job claims don't add up

The proposal by Channel Islands developer Lugano to build 280 houses on virgin green belt land near Ponteland faces very strong opposition.

In order to get 'buy-in' from the local community Lugano support their large scale development proposal with the promise of 900 job opportunities.

The figures provided by Lugano are underpinned with the provision of 672 jobs during the construction phase of the Birney Hill development: "in a good market – sales would reach 30-40 dwelling units per annum".

Good market conditions would give us a development period of between seven and nearly 10 years; it would seem to be more realistic that we are looking at 67 construction jobs for each year of development as opposed to 672 total construction jobs over the life of the development phase.

It would appear that within the 'job opportunity promise' Lugano have included a 16% allowance for potential residents who will choose to work from home (144 out of 900 jobs) – they omit to mention that there is currently a good supply of high quality homes available to purchase in Ponteland. Those wishing to move into the area in order to work from home can, and will do so, without the need for the Birney Hill development.

The outline proposal includes establishing a community trust to manage commercial business space at Birney Hill; there is no indication of the type of business envisaged to enable a clear understanding that this has the potential to be a viable and sustainable proposition.

The trust will also manage a community farm project, employing up to three staff; this fails to acknowledge the inevitable loss and destruction of existing agricultural businesses and jobs should the proposed development go ahead. Unfortunately the prospects for a profitable community farm seem poor and have potential to be detrimental to the existing independent green grocers, butchers and the regular farmers market that are already established in Ponteland.

Whatever the number of jobs created, they will not be created only if Lugano's scheme proceeds. Job opportunities are not increased just because the development is on green belt land (brown field and green field sites are currently available that have been identified as suitable for development).

The construction of housing over and above the housing need is not justified; it would not represent sustainable development. The creation of construction jobs is not, and must never be, a justification for building on the green belt. Any housing development should be based on housing need and not developers' greed!

## Pub chain confirms plans for Blackbird Inn

In your December 2012 issue, R & M Tipping were rightly concerned about the future of the Blackbird pub – right in the middle of our Conservation Area and one of only two Grade II\* buildings in the Parish

Our ever-tenacious Secretary, Pat Cooper, has now got some information from Chris Welham, the MD for Spirit Leased Pubs. Whilst apologising for the delay he tells us that they have decided "to continue to invest in improving the pub ... it will not be converted to one of our managed brands but rather a unique local pub."

They hope to have all the plans and submissions in place for April this year and the Blackbird will "welcome back guests very soon"

The Tippings floated the idea that the Blackbird could have provided a community centre for the village and perhaps a home for the Town Council.

Maybe we have all missed the boat on that, but I would merely mention that the plans to rebuild Belleville House as a nest of apartments have recently been withdrawn, and there is no other use presently in sight for these former office buildings.

They also date back to 1841 and are in our Conservation Area – and have been vacant for several years. Without great modification they could provide accommodation for the Town Council, an information centre and more besides.

The large (but admittedly unattractive) industrial extension at the rear could house artists' studios and whatever else you care to think of – and there is parking for at least 36

cars. Is there an opportunity here?


## Isabella celebrates 103rd birthday

# Birney Hill proposals: your chance to see the detail

Local people are invited to see for themselves the planning application for up to 280 houses at Birney Hill, Ponteland. The documents, maps, reports and illustrations are all available at Ponteland library for anyone to find out more about the proposals for this £96m scheme.

Birney Hill offers huge benefits to Ponteland and the wider region. It will bring a remarkably low impact scheme – only 3.5% of the development site will be covered by houses – to the outskirts of Ponteland, while bringing more significant change by reviving the village through a multi-million pound investment in long sought improvements bestowed by a development trust.

It will create attractive new green spaces, growing areas, environmental education, outdoor recreation, play areas and a large community farm. More than 92 acres of land will be gifted to the local community for the benefit of generations to come in the largest example of its kind in the UK since the establishment of Milton Keynes' parks trust.

#### **COMMUNITY TRUST**

A key element of the proposals includes the implementation of one of the country's largest community trusts, with Lugano gifting over £16 million and 92 acres of land to residents of Birney Hill and Ponteland.

The community trust would also include £3m funding for a community farm with kitchen garden, urban allotments and a visitor centre, designed as an attractive, useful hub for residents and a destination in its own right. The community farm, located at the existing Birney Hill farm, will also include commercial and business space.

Birney Hill will build high performance housing to cut typical energy bills by 80% for a family house to £320 pa against the average £1600 pa for a property of similar size.

The overall design concept is to build on the best of local traditions, notably the prehighways engineering concept of placing homes sensitively within a landscape. Lugano proposes to offer innovations



within a package that will be comfortably familiar, including energy efficient design to the proposed 2016 definition of zero carbon.

The types proposed add to the mix of housing in Ponteland and Darras Hall by offering 70 properties suitable for smaller households (including many designed for potential downsizers) alongside a range of larger homes for growing families.

#### **GREEN VALUES**

The green values that lead the scheme echo the original thinking behind the Darras Hall development at Ponteland, which set out to integrate housing and horticulture.

Climate change and the ability of existing infrastructure to cope with increasing demands has been at the forefront of the proposals. Ponteland's longstanding flooding and drainage concerns will be tackled through innovative technology including a Sustainable Urban Drainage system collecting surface water from the site.

The most effective and up-to-date drainage systems would be incorporated into the

infrastructure at Birney Hill. Major longterm improvements together with porous paving, green roofs and reed beds address flooding issues head on, and also lead to improvements for existing residents in the

Importantly all of these solutions will significantly reduce the surface water run-off from the current agricultural fields meaning that the pace of surface water flows from the agricultural fields will be a fraction of what they are now when the new development is completed.

The planning application looks in depth at all aspects of the proposals, and includes reports about the impact of the scheme on the wider area. Noise, transport, access, bats, environmental impact, wildlife habitats, job and economic growth have all been studied in depth by independent consultants and all form part of the application. The scheme plans for enhancements to wildlife and biodiversity.

# Understanding living together

The words of Eric Hoffer, in the quote below, remind us that couples live together for a variety of reasons, some well thought out and some not. Even those based on love and understanding initially can sadly fall apart later in a society with increasing financial and emotional burdens and hurdles.

HUSBAND. Excuse me for shouting, but this myth lives on. Tell your friends and family. Spread the word! It was last a concept in 1753, no less than 260 years ago. In this age of twitter and faster forms of communication, it is shocking that it still persists. Until the government changes the law and recognises that married couples are now the minority, then couples need to protect themselves by contract and agreement.

A couple who have lived together do not have any right to be financially supported by the other simply by the length of time they have lived together. That may be fine for a young working couple but introduce children, redundancy, ill health and other facts of live and the picture can be much starker. The court may still consider claims on behalf of children but not unmarried partners.

The way the courts treat ownership of a family home for unmarried couples is complex and arbitrary. If there is a dispute then it can be vastly costly and involve delay. The recent Supreme Court case of Kernott v Jones in 2011 highlighted this. After a period of separation since living together the Supreme Court reduced a partner's share in a joint property to only 10%.

Lord Justice Wall spoke to us all saying; "this is a cautionary tale, which all unmarried couples who are contemplating the purchase of a residential property as their home, and all solicitors who advise them, should study."

## More than 30 drivers caught by new speed camera in first month

#### In the period between 14th February and 14th March we have had seven crimes recorded for the Ponteland area.

These break down to the following offences:

- two damages to motor vehicles
- one theft other
- one harassment offence
- three burglary dwellings.

The harassment and theft offences have been detected. Enquiries are ongoing in relation to the other offences.

Following the request last month for more vigilance from the public regarding burglary dwellings and thefts from motor vehicles I would like to thank those of you who have contacted us to assist.

It is however still important to highlight and remind you of the actions which would help us to prevent any further crime:

- If you see anything suspicious, either people of vehicles, please contact the Police. The smallest thing could help us to either prevent an offence or assist us to detect a crime.
- Take registration numbers of suspicious vehicles. Let us know where and when

you've seen the vehicle and what the occupants look like.

- Please lock your vehicles when you leave them. An offender has been targeting vehicles which have been left unlocked and taking items.
- Door locks. Your home security is very important and the first step in preventing a break in is by ensuring you have good door locks. If you have UPVC doors they have multi-lock systems but it's worth investing in a mortise lock if your wooden door only has a Yale type lock. Of course, a lock is only any good if it's locked which is another thing people sometimes forget to do.

Be vigilant and together we can reduce crime

Over the period of 14th February to 14th March the speed camera was utilised on the following roads with the attached results:

- Middle Drive out of 203 vehicles six were stopped speeding
- Darras Road out of 117, six were stopped speeding
- Western Way out of 367, 21 were stopped speeding

- Runnymede Road out of 15, one was stopped speeding
- North Road No vehicles stopped speeding out of 65 checked




