

# Ponteland couple pedal for prostate

A Ponteland couple are taking on a 600-mile charity cycle ride to raise funds for a Freeman Hospital fund.

Solicitor Andrew Morgan and his school teacher wife Claire will cycle from John O'Groats to Ponteland in September in a fundraising drive for the hospital's Urology & Oncology Fund.

Their inspiration for the marathon 17-day ride has come from a major health scare for Andrew last year and Claire's impending retirement after 30 years of teaching. Andrew, 54, a partner at Nicholson & Morgan, was diagnosed last year with prostate cancer but happily had a successful robotic prostatectomy operation and is recovering well.

Claire, 55, is retiring at the end of July, having spent the last 21 years at Darras Hall First School. The start date for the charity cycle ride – September 2 – would have been her first day back at school next term.

Andrew said: "I found out about my prostate cancer as a result of my older brother who was diagnosed with the same disease 12 months before me. He has had exactly the same operation as me and I am pleased to say that he has made a good recovery as well.

"I only went to get a check up because of that and I am quite sure that I would not have done so otherwise. Part of the aim of this campaign is to try and get as many men as possible who are in their late 40s and early 50s to go and get checked out. In the first instance there is a very straightforward PSA blood test which can be carried out at a GP surgery."

The couple, from Darras Road, will average around 35 to 40 miles per day on their route through Scotland before being joined by friends Lesley Adams, Jane Sym, David and Judith Allan, Dan and Joyce Whaley and David and Rachel Tilley in Edinburgh for the final few days.

#### PROJECTS REPORT

#### River bank repairs

This work will be carried out in July.

#### Street information signs

Further requests for advertising on the back of the paper maps had been received.

#### Repairs to second timber footbridge

The order for this work has been placed and the work will be carried out between July and the beginning of September.

#### Annual Audit for 2012-13

The Council approved the Audit Return for 2012-13 which had to be submitted to the Council's external auditors by 15 July.

#### Memorial Hall project

The Council considered a report relating to the proposal to build new offices at the back of the Memorial Hall. Planning permission has been received and approval was required to obtain firm prices from a quantity surveyor in order to ascertain how much the project would cost and to carry out a cost benefit analysis. It was agreed that alternatives should be examined and it was agreed to defer this decision until September to allow examination of other premises.

#### Millennium Bridge cleaning

The Council had been seeking quotes for painting and cleaning of the Millennium Bridge. The quotes received were felt to be too high and a report was considered which outlined the results of a recent inspection. This showed that there was a need for immediate cleaning work and it was also necessary to clear the concrete of algae and the like. The Council agreed to have the work carried out this year and obtain approval from the Environment Agency if necessary.

#### Monitoring of slope at Fox Covert

Concerns had been raised about the stability of the slope above the river wall

at Fox Covert Lane. An inspection had been carried by the Council's consulting engineers and no obvious sign of movement could be observed. However, in view of the concerns raised, it was suggested that a monitoring system be established, initially at six monthly intervals. The Council approved expenditure of £2,350 to enable this monitoring to be carried out this year and it was noted that there could be annual expenditure in subsequent years.

#### **COMMUNITY NEWSLETTERS**

The Council registered their objections to a proposal relating to community newsletters like Pont News & Views which would mean that it could no longer be published. They also agreed to write to the Prime Minister, Mr E Pickles MP (Department for Communities and Local Government) and the local MP Guy Opperman seeking reconsideration of the proposal.

#### **TOWN COUNCIL WEBSITE**

Councillors were asked to submit suggestions of what they would wish to see on the Council's website.

#### **CIVIC SERVICE**

Councillors were reminded that it had been necessary to postpone the Civic Service scheduled for 19 May due to low attendance figures. This had partly been due to the proximity to the elections and also clashes with other Ponteland events. A report was presented by the Deputy Mayor requesting the Council to consider various options in relation to the event which included continuing with the service in its present form, having a church service with afternoon tea, holding only a church service or cancelling altogether. It was agreed to cancel the service altogether after a nine to three vote in favour of the cancellation

#### NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

Councillor Peter Jackson reported that following the elections there was a new administration at the County Council and

he assured the Town Council that he and his colleagues would be working hard to ensure Ponteland received a fair share of services from the County Council. The next few months would be a busy time with the Core Strategy and with certain planning applications being considered in July/August time. He agreed to keep the Council informed about when these meetings were being held. Councillor Jackson also reported that discussions were ongoing in relation to the crossing control at the Darras Hall First School and an advert was to be placed in Pont News & Views for a part time post to carry out this work. Councillor Jones reported that she still had an interest in the Ageing Well project and she reported on the 'Step into Spring' event held in Ponteland recently that had been well attended. She also reported that the local County Councillors were allocating some of their allowance towards a new 14 seater bus with disabled access for use as the Hopper bus but also to be used by schools etc.

#### **MAYOR'S REPORT**

The Mayor reported on a very successful Party in the Park event held on Sunday 9 June. He reminded Councillors that the annual bowls match with Ponteland Bowling Club would be held on Friday 14 June. The Music in the Park event is to be held on Sunday 30 June and Councillors were asked to volunteer to help out on the day. The Mayor reported on an idea he had for a display at the Memorial Hall the week before Remembrance Sunday in 2014 for families to display their medals and memorabilia of their relatives who fought in the First World War. It was hoped this could be open to the public and it would also be very interesting for the schools.

# British Eventing comes to Kirkley

Organisers of the first in a series of planned equestrian competitions at Kirkley Hall said it was a hit with competitors and spectators alike.

The new British Eventing One Day Event, held on Sunday June 9, saw riders from as far afield as Scotland and Yorkshire competing in the three disciplines of dressage, show jumping and cross country at BE80, BE90 and BE100 level.

Vice Principal of the Kirkley Hall campus, Marcus Clinton, said: "We were delighted with the inaugural running of the Kirkley Hall Horse Trials. We were blessed with fine weather and big crowds turned out to enjoy the competition.

"The event went very well - we were full with entries and everything ran extremely smoothly. It was a pleasure to welcome so many riders from Northumberland and surrounding counties including many from Scotland and Yorkshire.

"We have received very good feedback, particularly about how wonderful the cross country course rode and looked and the lovely atmosphere on the day. It was good to see so many local people enjoying watching the competition and visiting Kirkley."

The Northumberland College venue's first Affiliated Dressage event follows on Saturday June 29 and will see competitors compete on a new indoor riding surface in what will be a monthly fixture.

Marcus, a British Show Jumping Association Judge, added: "The new events will form part of a regular show calendar. They will provide the opportunity for riders of all levels to compete and develop, as well as supporting youngsters and emerging talent which is central to the college's mission."



### PONTELAND MP DONATES BOOK PROCEEDS FOR BRAIN TUMOUR RESEARCH

Ponteland's MP Guy Opperman has donated the first royalties from his book on prison reform to the NHS hospital which saved his life from a brain tumour.

The MP presented Neil Kitchen, the consultant neurosurgeon who operated on him, with a cheque for £650. The surgeon treated Mr Opperman at the National Hospital for Neurosurgery and Neurology at Queen's Square in May 2011.

The cheque handover was made in the Central Lobby in the House of Commons, Westminster, on the exact spot where Guy had collapsed on April 26th 2011 due to an undiagnosed meningioma. Guy raised the money out of the proceeds of his book, Doing Time, which was published in 2012, setting out his ideas for helping to reduce reoffending amongst prisoners.

Guy said: "My first royalty cheque has come through and I have always made it clear that I would be handing over all the proceeds to the National Brain Appeal. All proceeds from book sales, after printing and publishing costs, are going to this wonderful charity that supports brain tumour research."

Mr Kitchen added: "Guy has made a full recovery and it is wonderful to seeing him looking so well. It is also good to see him continuing to support the research and work of the neurosurgery team at the National Hospital. We will put the money raised to good use."

#### Developing a vision for the future the key focus for Ponteland Business Network

#### The key focus of the newly formed Ponteland Business Network is on developing a vision for the future.

The Steering Group, with representatives of 20 businesses, is taking an in depth review of the aspirations for business facilities and resources, housing, schools and education, health facilities, transportation, environmental considerations, public services, infrastructure, leisure and recreation and tourism required.

Once the process is completed, expected in late June, the objectives of the group will become clear and thus enable a strategy to deliver.

Part of the strategy will be to provide input into the Neighbourhood Planning Group to ensure a positive contribution from the business community whilst ensuring a balanced approach from all parties. The Network has had assurances that the Neighbourhood Planning Group will be more conducive and receptive to opposing views to the No Campaign re residential planning and steps are being taken to seek those with expertise that can add value and thus contribution.

PBN has already sought and gained clear information and guidelines on the planning process in early June and after a blind survey, an overwhelming majority of the Steering Group support the initiative to instigate the setting up of a Community Trust, hopefully initially funded by Lugano Development Company.

It is hoped that work can commence in contributing to the Neighbourhood Plan and the Community Trust during the month of July.

PBN is keen to engage with the identified 663 businesses in the area and although names and addresses are on record it is hoped that these businesses will come forward with their contact details. From current responses it is clear that business people are also welcome and encouraged to participate.

Regular correspondent Muriel Sobo challenges the Town Council to improve its communication and consultation in this month's letters...

#### More consultation and debate needed

Congratulations to our five new Town Councillors - Sue Johnson, Lesley Noble, Christine Greenwell, veteran Richard Dodd and young Adam Shanley!

Now six men and six women so why are the mayor and his deputy both men? Equality would give a position to each sex.

What will be our Town Council's programme for the next four years? We never read any manifestoes, the councillors make no pitch to the electors and we are left entirely in the dark. Last year they collected £336,000 from our Council Tax and we have no say in how it is spent.

Let us have some democracy, some consultation, some debate and then perhaps there will be fewer blunders in the future. In this last year the council has spent more than £7,000 on an unwanted path to open onto the West Road in a very dangerous position despite protests from Friends of the Park and others.

They have altered the sculpture on Coates Green so much that it is now composed of three different kinds and colour of stone and is a visual disaster. There are others.

Take a look at how other town councils consult their electors. Keswick got Lottery money to hand out questionnaires in a variety of public places as well as online and from the responses will formulate a five year plan. They have a population of just over 7,000.

Hexham is promoting an impetus for change through the local press and activists. Morpeth is an historic market town and is seeking residents' opinions and input into the town's future. If our council consulted with the residents before landing the finished plans in front of them we would be further on with a number of different projects.

The Nathaniel Lichfield plans for regeneration in 2005 gave four options but our Parish Council together with Castle Morpeth Borough Council decided on the nuclear option of demolition and it resulted in the biggest turn out for a public protest meeting in Ponteland. It never got off the ground.

The next episode in 2009 was to vote for a preferred option from two proposals for regeneration so we voted for the least bad with the promise of community consultation. There were obvious flaws such as a community hub and the building of yet another care home on the library site and there has been no consultation with anyone, community, shop owners or leaseholders or even the County Council by the developer. That proposal has now possibly turned to dust.

The Town Council spent months last year, 2012, concocting a Town Plan without any input from residents so that the public meeting to approve the plan turned into a very definite refusal with the Mayor and Councillors pilloried for their efforts. Always back to square one.

Another plea. Websites vary enormously but Ponteland Town Council's is not user friendly. Factually inaccurate on the history, almost all the information has to be accessed through another website but the one bit of information, the latest planning applications, that we need to read regularly, is not available anywhere.

Why is the cover of the latest Pont News not shown on the home page and then it can be clicked on immediately from there? Many people say they don't get a copy delivered since they live out in Prestwick or on farms so this would be an alternative. For an idea of how it could look check out Morpeth Town Council's website. It is both informative and welcoming. A good website, easy to use, visually interesting and updated frequently is a must.

#### Interesting ideas worth considering

Mrs Sobo is known for her work in the community and I always read her views on Ponteland with interest. Her letter contains some interesting ideas and I am replying on a personal basis.

There is an explanation why no manifestos were issued by candidates for the Town Council.

The Conservative Party fielded 12 candidates for the Town Council election that was due to take place on May 2. Each candidate wrote an election address and leaflets were made ready for distribution. No other party, however, put up a candidate and nobody stepped forward as an Independent. The County Council ruled therefore that there was no election contest and the 12 candidates for the Town Council were elected unopposed.

The election address leaflets containing candidates' views and urging residents to vote were not distributed because there was no contest to vote in.

The names and contact details of the Town Councillors who were elected unopposed are already on the Ponteland Town Council website but I like the suggestion that more information about councillors could be made known and that further research of residents views could be considered.

Town Councillors are all volunteers with Ponteland's interests at heart. The Town Council meets on the second Wednesday of the month, the meetings are open to the public and are attended by residents and journalists. The minutes of the meetings are available to the public on the website and in Ponteland Library. In addition, a report based on the minutes of the Town Council meeting is printed in Pont News.

Further information about the Town Council is provided by the Mayor in the Annual Report to the Local Electors. Residents are welcomed at the meeting and expenditure is referred to in the report.

#### Lack of consultation claims unfounded

As to the apparent lack of consultation, may I draw attention to the way that three significant items have been and are being dealt with?

The Merton Way Regeneration brief was developed by Ponteland Community Partnership, approved by the community, the developer selected by the community and endorsed by the Town Council. Its further progress has been obstructed mainly by the County Council.

A draft local plan was prepared by the Town Council presented for comment by the community, rejected and withdrawn.

A Neighbourhood Plan Group has been established by the Town Council with many representatives from the community and is actively seeking information from and the views of the community. This has been, is being and will be reported through the pages of Pont News. The resultant document will be approved or rejected by a referendum.

The Mayor's annual report sets out many of the activities of the Town Council, its vision, its aims and future plans. This can be read online and for anyone attending the annual meeting a hard copy was available. Minutes and agendas are available online for both the full council and the planning committee, which are always open to the public.

Copies of Pont News go by post to houses not covered by deliveries.

The opportunity is available every four years for the community to express its views on the way the Town Council affairs have been conducted. We were returned unopposed.

This response is my personal view and is not from the Council.

#### Closing schools full of 'outsiders' could address traffic chaos

Could I respectfully invite the Chief Executive of Northumberland County Council and Guy Opperman MP to see the dangers the school run traffic cause Ponteland residents before anyone is killed by this situation?

I have been campaigning and emailing my concerns to both for over three years now and there have now been almost 30 near miss incidents involving children on Thornhill Road that I am aware of.

Councillor Richard Dodd has recently funded a partial yellow line, time restrictions and residents parking bays on Thornhill Road. I would again like to personally thank Richard for this work which I am sure is greatly appreciated by all of Ponteland's residents.

However I would argue that a large proportion of cars have simply moved higher up Thornhill Road and into other streets such as Kirkley Drive, Beechwood Place and Ashbrooke and Rowan Drive as a result.

I counted the cars driving up Thornhill Road past the one way junction at the shops on 5th March at school times and there were a staggering total of 502 vehicles! The above mentioned streets suffer the same problems at school times as the Meadow Court resident wrote about last month. An ambulance recently couldn't get down Kirkley Drive at school time, and if a fire engine were ever needed at school times lives would be endangered.

Why can these school run dangers not be robustly tackled in the same manner as by North Tyneside Council, which warns drivers, fining them and, if they commit the same parking offence within 12 months, they risk having their vehicles towed away.

Is it time to close one first school and one middle school in Ponteland as we presently have 1,590 out of area pupils in our five schools. These out of area pupils attending our schools do not in my opinion benefit local residents in any way whatsoever, but this ongoing situation endangers lives, when cars mount, drive and park on our paths, fail to stop at our crossing, and obstruct local streets.

Another option could be for some of the considerable sum of money these out of area pupils bring into the education system (almost £4,000 per pupil I believe) to be invested each year into additional parking spaces and on safe drop off points etc.

Come on Northumberland County Council, I would argue that you have a duty of care to address this situation and a starting point would be a site visit would it not?

## Warning after spate of burglaries

In the period between 12th May and 12th June we have had 11 crimes recorded for the Ponteland area.

These break down to the following offences:

- two damages to shops
- one theft
- one fraud
- six burglaries to houses
- one theft from shop.

Enquiries are ongoing in relation to the offences.

In the last few weeks we have seen the beginning of a spate of burglaries to houses. Four of these burglaries occurred on the same night, in the early hours. This would suggest a team of travelling criminals have visited Ponteland from out of town.

These opportunists look for easy targets, open doors, ground floor windows or open garages. Please ensure you lock your doors before going to bed on an evening; the easier we make it for them, the more they will return.

If you see anything suspicious please report it to the police on the first occasion possible. The sooner we respond, the better chance we will have to catch them or prevent them from coming back.

We have had some incidents regarding dogs not being kept under control or on their leads.

You know your own dog and how they react to people or other animals so it is your responsibility to keep them under control. No one wants to see their animal injured or killed through someone else's inconsideration.

#### WARNING OVER ROGUE DOORSTEP TRADERS

A fresh warning has been issued about doorstep fish sellers believed responsible for distraction burglaries.

The cold callers have been targeting areas like Ponteland with a high population of elderly residents and use intimidating sales techniques.

The fish is often misdescribed, mislabelled or unlabelled, overpriced and sometimes underweight. Often, they will empty out a consumer's freezer of other goods, fill it with their fish and charge several hundred pounds for doing so.

There may be links to distraction burglary type incidents, as they often enter the consumer's home by offering to take the fish inside and traders have been reported to have taken blank cheques from consumer's cheque books.

Northumberland County Council Trading Standards is working closely with Scambusters and is urging members of the public to be vigilant and report:

- details of any traders cold calling or door knocking in an area
- details of any vehicles linked to the sellers, registration numbers, logos or sign writing, make/model/colour of vehicle
- · descriptions of traders seen
- leaflets or flyers handed out
- any labels or markings on the packs bought on the doorstep
- method of payment as cheques, card payments and bank transfers can be traced
- any paperwork left.

## Church exhibition charts rise of the red kite

A project responsible for the re-introduction of nearly 100 red kites to the region was the subject of an exhibition at St Mary's Church.

A stunning glass kite was accompanied by textual information and images by professional photographer Kaleel Zibe showing community involvement in the Northern Kites Project.

The project was responsible for the re-introduction of 94 red kites in this core area between 2004 and 2009. In 2006 red kites began to breed in the region for the first time after an absence of 170 years.
