





Ponteland's 'A team' off to top universities



Hard working Ponteland High School students are heading to some of the UK's top universities after securing top A Level results.

Over half the entries gained the top three grades (A*-B), with 24 students gaining two or more A* or A grades.

Among them were Bryony Clear Hill, who got an A* in biology and geography and A in mathematics and general studies and who will be reading Geography at Oxford. Beth Forsyth, who received an A* in biology and maths and A in further maths, chemistry and general studies will read Natural Sciences at Cambridge.

Ben Wainwright (A* in mathematics and physics and A in further maths and chemistry) is off to Imperial College to read Mechanical Engineering and will be joined there by Chloe Hall and April Covington who have both been successful in securing places to study Medicine, each gaining three A*s and one A grade.

Meanwhile Jordan Barnes is off to Lancaster to read Natural Sciences, having gained three grade As and an A*.

Other students will be heading off this autumn to study a range of courses including accountancy, architecture, electrical engineering, English literature, law, modern languages, primary education, pharmacy and psychology at universities across the country.

Headteacher Kieran McGrane said: "These excellent results are thoroughly well deserved and are testament to the hard work of our students, along with the high quality support of their parents and teachers. This year group have added real value to the school during their time in post-16 study and we wish them well as they progress to the next stage of their career and professional lives."

PROJECTS REPORT

West Road easy access

Negotiations are continuing with Northumberland County Council Highways to find a resolution to this issue.

Refurbishment of second timber footbridge

It is hoped that work will commence shortly. Advance warning signs will be displayed in the park.

Skate park

Verbal confirmation of planning approval for the skate park has been received and written permission is awaited. It is hoped that work could start in the near future once written approval is received.

BRAINSTORMING SESSION

Following a suggestion by Councillor Sue Johnson, a brainstorming session for Town Councillors was held on July 24th and a report of that meeting was circulated to the Council. The session dealt with issues such as improvements to the website and communication with residents. A number of suggestions made were voted upon. The most popular items related to conducting constructive sessions at Waitrose, the Coop etc together with county councillors, improvements to the website, involving residents in producing the wish list, councillors attending public events and the use of surveys. Councillors were asked to submit any suggestions relating to these items to Councillor Johnson and told work would continue on the items raised at the session.

NEWCASTLE AIRPORT - MASTERPLAN

Newcastle Airport had recently produced their third Masterplan which would cover the period up to 2030. A three month consultation period was underway which ended on 31 October 2013. A public meeting was to be held in Ponteland at the Memorial Hall on Thursday August 29th at 7pm with a roadshow held in the week commencing August 26th at Ponteland Library.

The Council agreed to establish a Working Party to examine the Masterplan comprising of the Mayor and Councillors Butcher, Greenwell and Rawlings to meet in time to submit a report to the October meeting. A full copy of the Masterplan is available in the office. See article on p8.

HIGHWAYS WORKING PARTY

Information had been received from the County Council regarding the re-consultation about the proposed 'No Waiting' restrictions at Middle Drive, Broadway and Darras Road and the prohibition of driving except for access to off street premises at Linden Way, Ashdale, Lynwood Close and Woodvale. Comments were required by August 19th and Town Councillors agreed they were satisfied with the proposals.

ENVIRONMENT WORKING PARTY

The Working Party met on July 29th and the Council approved the following recommendations:

- The damaged picnic bench in the park was to be replaced and a further bench suitable for wheelchair users would be situated further along towards the Darras Road bridge on the more level grassed area.
- A request for a dog waste/ litter bin on Western Way had been received via County Councillor Veronica Jones. A report had been considered by the Working Party and it was decided to not agree to this request at the present time.
- Councillors agreed to empty the five planters at Merton Way and refill with new top soil and membrane. A planting scheme would then be considered.
- The boardwalk at the Oxbow meadow is in a dangerous

condition and the Council noted the removal of the structure and endorsed the replacement at an estimated cost of £1,500. The appointment of a contractor was delegated to the Clerk.

Airport masterplan predicts £650m boost to NE economy

Bosses at Newcastle International Airport have published ambitious long term expansion plans which would see the transport hub support an additional 2,200 jobs and add another £650m a year to the regional economy.

The 2013-2030 masterplan highlights potential future development requirements, including extensions to the terminal, additional aircraft and car parking and improved

access, alongside the creation of additional offices, hangers and warehouses on the southside.

It envisages increases in air traffic from 62,200 to 87,500 and in passenger numbers from 4.4m to 8.5m.

The airport currently supports 7,800 jobs across the region and by 2030 this will rise to up to 10,000, according to the document, while the completion of the new Southside Development has the potential to deliver thousands more.

In 2012 the airport delivered £646m to the regional economy and by 2030 it is estimated that this figure will double to up to £1.3bn.

Chief Executive Dave Laws said: "We want to provide an improved airport, to encourage new routes and attract new customers. To do this we need to develop additional infrastructure, such as improvements to the terminal, better car parking and access, and the development of the southside, which will help diversify the airport business and secure new income sources.

"We've launched a consultation process in order to hear everyone's view on our plans, and once all the responses have been reviewed we will consider whether any changes need to be made."

As part of the masterplan consultation, the airport is organising a series of public meetings and roadshow events.




Please maintain your hedges and trees

Meet the Mayor...

It's a good job Peter Cowey is a keen jogger. For he certainly has a lot of running around to do as Ponteland Mayor. Pont News & Views caught up with him to find out just what his role entails.

His desk is piled high with lengthy reports to read – from Newcastle Airport's 2013-2030 Masterplan to county strategic planning policies. But as Mayor you need to be properly briefed before chairing important meetings with colleagues.

Coun Cowey spends up to ten working days a month on Town Council business, answering hundreds of emails, attending meetings and appearing at public engagements and community events.

As well as responsibility for parks, play areas, flower beds, allotments, bus shelters, dog

waste collection, gritting, bus shelters, bridleways, notice boards and seats, the authority has had to take on new roles from the County Council.

Last year it was public toilets; this year the management of Prestwick Cemetery.

Coun Cowey, a former IT manager who turns 70 in October, has to keep himself up to date with progress on all work and projects the Town Council is involved in, and other public and private sector activity which could affect the parish.

He has also recently taken on the chairmanship of a new working party on behalf of Ponteland Business Network which is tasked with setting up an independent community trust for the area which can bid for funding grants.

It's a far cry from a description he once heard of the Mayor's role as 'meeting once a month and turning up for the odd photo opportunity'. Coun Cowey said: "When this remark was made to me I decided to see for myself exactly how much time I spent working for the Council. I found I spent anything between six and ten working days a month on Council business, working mornings, afternoons, evenings and weekends.

"It feels a thankless task.
Occasionally you get a 'well done' but generally people only say something if they have a complaint. We have a hard working group of people at the Town Council who sit on a number of committees looking after many aspects of life within Ponteland.

"We are all unpaid and just try to keep the Council going in its mandatory duties and managing the extra responsibilities coming our way with no additional funding. Is it any wonder all 12 Town Council candidates were unopposed at the last election? "But we all enjoy serving the community, improving the environment, supporting local organisations and consulting with public and private sector partners such as the County Council and developers in the town's best interest."

Inconsiderate parking remains a problem

In the period between 12th July and 11th August we have had nine crimes recorded for the Ponteland area.

These break down to the following offences:

- One theft from a shop
- Five thefts
- One possession of drugs
- One theft from a motor vehicle
- Two assaults.

Enquiries are ongoing and arrests were made for the assaults, one of the thefts and the drugs offence.

Inconsiderate parking is still a problem in Ponteland. In April 2012 the County Council took responsibility for parking restrictions in Northumberland and it is overseen by their Enforcement Officers who will issue fixed penalty notices to vehicles and drivers committing offences.

Police officers no longer issue tickets for parking restriction offences but we do issue fixed penalty notices for obstruction. Please be considerate when you park your vehicle. Please don't obstruct the pavements, access to resident's driveways and drop kerbs used by wheelchairs and

pushchairs. Have a thought for the people who live where you're parking and consider how you would feel if someone parked across your road access.

Some of you may have noticed articles about the Ponteland Neighbourhood Plan or spoke to members of the steering group at the Party in the Park in June. This is your chance to have some input into the plans and possible facilities for Ponteland in the future.

There are numerous clubs in existence in the town for our mature residents but a clear lack of facilities for the younger element. We are awaiting the proposed building of the skate park but there is still no confirmed date for starting.

The Headmaster at Ponteland High School has allowed use of the school plaving fields so please encourage vour children to take advantage of this. Youth disorder in Ponteland and Darras Hall is quite low compared to most of the Northumbria Police area but we still receive calls so your assistance in this would be greatly appreciated.

If you have any positive ideas regarding other facilities, clubs, open ground, etc where we can provide something for the young Ponteland element please contact myself and I'll pass the details on to the Neighbourhood Plan team.
