

BBC Newcastle presenter Colin **Briggs and MP Guy** Opperman enjoyed afternoon tea as they opened a new charity shop and tearoom in Ponteland.

As well as offering sustenance and refreshments, the Tynedale Hospice premises at the former Nichol's Bakery in



Merton Way will also serve as a drop-in centre for clients and a place where people can meet and talk with hospice staff and volunteers.

Together with the shop, which sells donated clothes, books and bric-a-brac, the tearoom will help raise much needed funds for the charity.

Now 20 years old. Tynedale Hospice provides palliative care. help and support for people with life limiting illnesses. The NHS provides less than a fifth of its required funding, so it relies heavily on donations and fundraising activities including its retail operations.

Pont tennis tournament attracts young players from the south coast

A children's tennis tournament held in Ponteland attracted entries from as far afield as Hampshire. But winners included two local players Emily Allison and Alastair McLeod. Nick Clark reports.

The 11th Ponteland Junior Open Tennis Tournament, sponsored by Horton Grange Country House Hotel, was held at Ponteland Tennis Club and Ponteland Middle School.

The numbers were up on last year with 135 entries and attracted quite a few higher ranked visiting juniors from Yorkshire, Durham, Cumbria and as far afield as Hampshire. This tournament gives the local players a chance to pit their skills against good visiting players on their own doorstep and for some it was their first taste of competitive tennis.

The events ranged from U8s to U18s and most had a playback or consolation draw. The Ponteland players performed well and won two events - Emily Allison won the U10 Girls' and Alastair McLeod (pictured) won the U8 Boys' Singles.

James Dodd was the runner up in the U10 Boys' Singles, having beaten some higher seeded players, and Isabella Goodall was the runner up in the U9 Girls' Singles. Francesca Burrin was 3rd in the U14 Girls' Singles, which followed her recent form by winning the Club U14 Road to Wimbledon Final and playing in the County final.

Meanwhile Gabriel Rodda, 13, won the Ponteland Tennis Club Final of the National U14 Road to Wimbledon competition against William Capps. He then went on to win the County Final, which meant he qualified to play at Wimbledon in the National Finals on August 11th - 16th.

REQUEST FOR INFORMATION

The Town Council has been asked to consider including some additional names onto the War Memorial located outside of the Memorial Hall. Costs have been sought for inclusion and the final decision rests with the Trustees of the Memorial Hall who are owners of the Memorial.

After carrying out some research, it was found two of the names were listed on other memorials locally and elsewhere, however one of the gentlemen concerned did not appear to be listed on any memorial.

There were often reasons for this, however the Council felt that it was right to include an article in Pont News & Views to see if anyone had any information regarding the following gentleman who had lost his life in WWI. Private Joseph Davison of the 1st/4th Battalion of the Northumberland Fusiliers was killed in action on 15th September 1916. He was born in Newburn and was the son of John and Margaret Davison of Dalton, Northumberland. Before enlisting he was a farm worker before going to France in November 1915. He was only 20 when he died.



Vehicle checks catch travelling criminals

In the period between July 14th and August 14th we have had 12 crimes recorded for the Ponteland area.

These break down to the following offences:

- Three shoplifting
- One public order offence
- Five thefts
- One possession of cannabis
- One assault
- One damage to motor vehicle.

The investigations into these crimes have been greatly assisted by prompt reporting by local residents, with five detected are ongoing in relation to the others. Northumbria Police continue to use many tactics to prevent and disrupt rural crime.

In recent weeks, the local Neighbourhood Policing Team joined forces with partners from DVSA (Driver Vehicle Standards Agency) and HMRC (Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs) to check vehicles and make sure motorists had the correct paperwork.

The operation resulted in a number of prohibition and warning notices issued at the roadside. Also a number of vehicles were found to be using rebated fuel.

These operations are aimed at preventing criminals - such as thieves and burglars - travelling around the area, and ensuring those flouting road safety regulations and laws aren't putting other road users in danger.

As well as improving road safety, it helps us gather information about vehicles travelling into the area so we can prevent criminals coming here to commit crime. Please continue to help us by reporting suspect vehicles and people.

Entering the 126 classes in the show is quite simple. Schedules are available at a number of outlets in Ponteland including the Library and Post Office and in the neighbouring parishes.


Entries are open to residents of Ponteland and adjoining parishes, children attending all schools in the parishes and to members of organisations in Ponteland.

My shame at telling tourists we have no village centre any more

Several weeks ago I and two of my friends were walking through Merton Way when we were asked by three day visitors from Yorkshire where Ponteland town centre was.

Can you imagine our embarrassment when we could not say that we have a town centre? We pointed out the park and the church but where is our centre?

I have belonged to Ponteland for most of my life, having visited here as a small child and cycled here from Hazlerigg as a teenager. Eventually through the Methodist Church I met my husband who came to live in Ponteland as a baby in 1931.

We married in 1955 and both of our daughters went to the village schools. As a child and as a young married woman I can remember a community. We had two sweet shops, a hardware shop, and a wool shop where you could buy your children's Ladybird clothes, wool and sewing equipment. There was a green grocers, a haberdashers, a butchers and a grocery shop on the main road.

Before going under the bridge across the Main Road we had a shop which sold electric goods and where you could have your equipment repaired. Where the park gates are now was a cobblers and a cycle repair shop. Also of course was the famous ice cream parlour belonging to Miss Smith.

Main Street was always busy and you could rely on hearing the latest gossip. The men met in either the Diamond or the Seven Stars and put their bets on at the barbers. It was a village.

This was all before Merton Way shops arrived.

Our family still say we are walking down into the village. But it is dead. Seven hairdressers, goodness knows how many places to eat, but no town or village centre. The riverside which used to attract parents with their children is overgrown; the play area is on a main road.

Please Town Council or whoever is responsible get your finger out and do something. You are allowing more and more dwellings for the better off elderly to be built but nothing here for them.

An elderly long time resident remarked to me recently 'I can't even buy a vest or a pair of knickers without going to Newcastle'. I hereby rest my case but even my family wonder at the enormous changes for the worse.



Ponteland residents have the opportunity to help shape the future of the parish through a new Neighbourhood Plan being prepared by a group of seven volunteers and five councillors on behalf of the Town Council.

The Neighbourhood Plan, if adopted in a local referendum, would have the power to influence local planning and the future needs of the community - in conjunction with national and countywide planning policies.

The local community was consulted in February and November 2013, with detailed questionnaires appearing in this publication and on our website to enable residents and businesses to express their preferences, views and priorities with regard to a wide range of planning related matters.

The data obtained from over 400 responses on each occasion has been used, along with other available evidence and more detailed analytical research, to establish a clear vision and objectives for the future of Ponteland. You now have the opportunity to tell us whether you endorse our vision and objectives or feel that we have got it wrong!

Ponteland Neighbourhood Plan Group members will be available at the sessions to answer questions on the neighbourhood planning process.

There will also be displays and interactive sections for each of the eight topic groups:

- Conservation & Heritage
- Drainage & Flooding
- Housing & Affordable Housing
- Education & Youth Activities
- Natural Environment
- Transportation
- Healthcare & Care of the Elderly
- Retail Business & Employment.

What is neighbourhood planning?

Neighbourhood planning was introduced through the 2011 Localism Act and gives local communities the opportunity to influence and define how their area should grow and change. In Northumberland, neighbourhood planning must be led by town/parish councils.

What can neighbourhood planning do?

Neighbourhood planning powers can be used by town/parish councils to guide and shape development in a defined 'neighbourhood area'. This includes influencing where new homes, shops and offices should be built and saying what those new buildings should look like, in line with national planning policy and the Northumberland Local Plan.

Five stage process for developing a Neighbourhood Plan

- 1. Area designation: the application by Ponteland Town Council, which included a map of the proposed neighbourhood area and why it is appropriate for neighbourhood planning purposes, was approved by Northumberland County Council in June 2013.
- 2. Preparing and publicising the plan: this includes establishing community aspirations and priorities, identifying a vision and objectives, and publicising and consulting on the plan.
- **3. Submission:** to include a map of the area, draft plan, statement on how it meets basic conditions, consultation statement. The plan will be publicised by NCC for at least six weeks.
- 4. Independent examination: Neighbourhood development plans must be examined to test whether they meet certain legal requirements before they may be put to local referendum and adopted by the council. An independent examiner will recommend whether the plan should be put to a local referendum.
- 5. Referendum: NCC, where recommended, will organise a local referendum. For the neighbourhood plan to be adopted it must receive majority support from the local community. If more than 50% of the Ponteland respondents vote in favour of the plan the council must adopt it as new planning policy.

Great-grandmother dies peacefully on 100th birthday

Mary Aynsley Robson was born to Thomas and Agnes Storey in Ryal on 2nd August 1914, the eve of the Great War.

Despite the war, the General Strike and the great depression, Mary told of an idyllic childhood on the farm with her brother and sister, Wilson and Ellen.

One in a long line of strong-minded women, she decided on her first day at school at the age of five that Harold Robson was the man for her. Sure enough, on 15th February 1936 when she was 21, they were married - proving that she did have some patience once upon a time!

They went on to have Hugh, Betty, David and Francis in their 14 years of marriage, before she was cruelly widowed in 1950 at the age of 35. Life was very hard for her then, but she had a will and a determination that few can match.

There may not be many people left who knew Harold, but she kept his memory alive with some wonderful stories, and he would have been so proud of the love she showed to their children, grandchildren, great grandchildren and all of their families.

On moving to Ponteland in 1970, she soon became a well-known figure in the village. She would walk for miles, never passing anyone without a friendly word. She joined the Townswomen's Guild and became a volunteer at the over-60s club in Merton Way, a role which she continued well into her 70s even though she was

always helping the old folks, never one of them!

She attended St Mary's Church, Ponteland and Holy Saviour, Milbourne for many years, and never turned down an invitation to a dance.

Mary lived a simple life and took her greatest pleasure in the simple things. All she ever wanted was the company of her family and friends, something she achieved with the greatest of ease.

She even made new friends in her final days at the Freeman Hospital. She was determined to reach her 100th

Childhood meningitis scare inspires Kate to take on Kilimanjaro

A university student who had a meningitis scare as a child is to climb Mount Kilimajaro to raise funds for research into the condition.

Kate Fisher was just 11 when she was admitted to hospital for tests by doctors who feared she had the deadly disease. Fortunately the results were all negative and she made a full recovery from her symptoms.

Now 19, Kate is studying Neuroscience at the University of Nottingham and has decided to raise awareness into meningitis – an inflammation of the lining of the brain and spinal cord which can strike suddenly and kill in just hours.

She said: "I start the climb on September 4th and it will last approximately five to six days. It's not only going to be physically challenging due to the incline, but more so because of the altitude sickness that I will most likely experience. I'm aiming to raise £3,000.

"So far to raise money I've travelled to various cities across the UK and undertaken street collections. I've also held pub quizzes, car boot sales, a bake sale at Ponteland High School and meal events. Two events held at the Rendezvous in Ponteland were particularly well supported, with 50 to 60 local residents attending and raising $\mathfrak{L}725$.

"Raffle prizes were kindly donated by local companies, including Ponteland Leisure Centre, Hooker & Young, SPA Beauty Rooms, Q Hair Design & Beauty, Jan's Kitchen, Taylors Pharmacy, Plants Plus and Martins Newsagents.

"As well as donations from friends and family I've also received donations through collection boxes in Martins newsagents and Ponteland High School reception. Ponteland Rotary Club have also assisted me with my fundraising. The support I've received from the residents of Ponteland has been amazing."

The Tanzanian trek is not the first charity venture Kate has taken on; in 2012 she completed the Great North Run for 'Mind' and has done cancer runs for years including two during the past month. At university Kate is also a representative for Karnival, the largest student run charity organisation in Europe.

Recalling her own meningitis scare, Kate added: "The thought that I may have the disease was extremely frightening. Thankfully the test came back negative, but that day made me really appreciate the good health that so many of us take for granted. Also as young adults are at high risk of contracting meningitis I felt



it was relevant to help raise money for the MRF charity and raise awareness as I'm a young adult myself."

100 years of banking comes to an end at landmark branch

The Nat West branch at the junction of Darras Road and Main Street closed its doors in July, ending 100 years of banking from the premises.

The fine building was opened in 1914 for Barclay and Company Limited after a presence in the village since 1904 as a branch of Newcastle, perhaps operating from a couple of rooms.

The two storey bank was built on a plot of land costing £337 and included the manager's house which today houses offices. The manager not only had a free house but also free coal and gas!


One of the men commemorated on our War Memorial, Captain Andrew McCreath worked at Barclays at some period before the war

It was necessary for the branch to relocate to a modern location; by 1970 a new concrete building was opened on Main Street and still serves customers today. Nat West took over the 'old' building in 1972.

Expansion by the banks at the beginning of the 20th century is being replaced by downsizing in the 21st century in the new post financial crash climate of increasing internet banking.



A class students head off to university after top exam results

Hard working students made their parents and teachers proud as Ponteland High School achieved another set of top class A-level results.

Vijay Mahal is off to Prague to read Medicine after receiving three As and a B grade, while Jack Heslop is staying closer to home to study Engineering at Durham after achieving an A* and two A grades.

Other high fliers include Caroline Garner and Emma Scott who both gained A* and A grades.

Ponteland High headteacher Kieran McGrane said: "We are very pleased with

this set of results, which are in line with what we accomplished last year. Our students, supported by their teachers and parents, have achieved very high standards and I hope this will spur them on to further success in years to come.

"What makes their achievements even more impressive is the change to the qualification system that eliminated the opportunity to sit exams in January. They only had one chance to take them, whereas students in previous years had the option to re-sit some of their exams in the summer."
