Darras Hall mum takes on London to Paris cycle challenge

A Darras Hall mum-of-two is saddling up for a London to Paris cycle ride to raise cash for a charity which funded a friend's lifesaving operation.

Angie Cohen-Clark will join old friend Alli Dufosee and her pal Sallie Taylor for the 300-mile ride at the end of July.

Alli – who hails from Ponteland – now lives in Wiltshire where she settled with her husband Sean, who has recently endured two years of gruelling treatment following a diagnosis of multiple myeloma.

Sean was medevaced out of Afghanistan and given three weeks to live but, thanks to a successful bone marrow transplant courtesy of the Anthony Nolan Trust, he is now well on the road to recovery.

With Alli and Sallie, who lives in Holland, looking for an unusual way to mark their 50th birthdays this year, the idea came about to undertake the cycle ride for the charity. The trio have set a target of $\mathfrak{L}13,500$ and have so far raised more than $\mathfrak{L}2,000$.

The ride starts at 7am on Wednesday July 29th at Blackheath Common, and day one sees the three cycle to Dover, where they will take the 4pm ferry to Calais before a short ride to their overnight hotel stop.

Days two and three are of similar duration -80 miles - but day four is shorter at 69 miles, and they hope to arrive at the foot of the Eiffel Tower at 4pm on Saturday August 1st.

Angie, 53, of Eastern Way, said: "I have never taken part in any serious cycling ever, neither had I planned to - I find myself in a state of panic most days and awake most nights! But this is my way of letting my friends know how much I care about them and how much I want to help.

"The Anthony Nolan Trust is a pioneering charity that saves lives of people with blood cancer. Every day, the charity uses its register to match remarkable individuals willing to donate their bone marrow to people who desperately need lifesaving transplants.

"Every potential lifesaver costs Anthony Nolan £100 to recruit, test, screen and maintain on the register. They receive no government funding. So, please do what you can to support let's make a difference."

Top civic award for retiring Ponteland policeman

A Ponteland policeman who retires this summer after 30 years' service has received a top civic award.

PC Rob Anderson has been given this year's Meritorious Award by Ponteland Town Council for his service to the community.

Rob started his career in September 1985 at the age of 20 at Dishforth Police Training Centre before taking up his first post in North Shields in January 1986.

After six years he transferred to Morpeth where he stayed until November 2000, also covering Ponteland and working at the Police House with the attached office in Stannington as a Neighbourhood Officer.

His next move saw him in Blyth before he joined the Police Unit which covers the Metro system for six years. After short spells in Hexham and Bedlington, in 2009 he transferred to Prudhoe which now also covered Ponteland.

Rob's final move saw him based at Ponteland Police Station, later taking over the Neighbourhood Beat Manager's job in 2012.

Away from the beat, father-of-one Rob lives in Hexham and enjoys his lifelong hobby of wargaming, supporting AS Roma and his great love of Northern Soul music.

Following his retirement in September he plans to expand his wargaming businesses Reiver Castings and Northumbrian Painting Services – manufacturing wargames figures and other related items such as scenery and books – and travel to Italy regularly.

Rob said: "I was overwhelmed by the award I was given and certainly didn't expect it. I've tried my best to help as many people as possible while I've been in Ponteland and I see this type of posting as my chance to give something back to the community.

"I've enjoyed my time here and the residents of Ponteland have made it all the better by the assistance they've given while I've been here and by making me welcome.

"I've been lucky enough to have good support from my colleagues at the Police (and Fire) Station, in particular Jon Gray, Lee Davison, Paul Cotterill and Jill Ruddick and it's

been difficult at times with the changing structure of the service but I will miss it.

"It's been great to work with the Town Council, ISOS Housing, Ponteland Community Partnership and all of the schools too and I have fond memories of them all."

Presenting the award, an engraved pen set and a framed certificate at the April meeting of the Town Council, Mayor Carl Rawlings said: "Rob has an air of authority and is known for a direct but fair manner. He is an approachable policeman who communicates well and he works hard to keep Ponteland a safe and pleasant place to live.

"Although he does not look old enough, we are told that it is time for Rob to retire as a policeman. It is people like Rob who contribute time and effort that make Ponteland a desirable place to live and so it therefore gives the Town Council great pleasure in presenting this small token of appreciation to Rob Anderson."

Witness appeal after sharp rise in assaults

Executive flats plan approved on appeal

Controversial plans for a block of executive apartments in Ponteland have been approved on appeal by a planning inspector.

Galliford Try's house-building division Linden Homes appealed after their application for the five-storey block on the western part of a site at Mill House, off West Road, was turned down last year by Northumberland County Council's west area planning committee.

The site, which borders Ponteland Park, was previously developed with offices for Galliford Try.

Committee members said that the scale, design and massing of the proposed building was inappropriate and the application had not sufficiently addressed parking and highway safety issues.

More than 50 objections were lodged by local residents and organisations including Ponteland Civic Society, the Friends of Ponteland Park, Ponteland Town Council and the 1st Ponteland Scout Group, with



concerns including drainage and flooding issues, impact on wildlife, noise and light pollution.

In the appeal decision notice, planning inspector Mark Caine rejected the objections on design, environmental impact and highway safety grounds.

He said: "I do not consider that the proposal's contemporary design, appearance, size, scale and massing would be so conspicuous as to result in a dominant, incongruous, alien feature that would be out of keeping with Ponteland or its park setting."

Mill Rise will comprise 18 executive apartments - with three penthouses on the top floor. Site preparations will begin in May with construction fully underway by the summer and the first apartments ready in spring 2016.

Linden Homes' Head of Sales Kate Brooks, said: "We are delighted that this project has been awarded planning permission. This carefully considered scheme will be delivered sensitively and with as little impact on the local area as possible."



A Darras Hall schoolgirl has had her first book published – aged just 11.



One of Ponteland's most prestigious streets is being trashed by selfish builders, according to one long suffering resident writing to this month's letters page.

18 months of noise, litter and selfish parking at the hands of mansion builders

I live on one of the few sharp bends in Darras Hall and since September 2013 I have lived next to a building site.

I have suffered workmen starting work at 7.30am making terrific noise and creating dreadful mess. There have been diggers, deliveries, stone grinders and small armies of workmen and their vehicles.

The noise and mess caused by their stone grinding has to be endured to be believed. Early morning deliveries and the never ending traffic are frightening. The workmen park wherever they feel is easiest for themon both sides of the road on the verges and on the pavement and often blocking our driveway.

This part of Runnymede Road is a sharp bend so traffic enters this bend completely blind, unable to see oncoming traffic entering the bend from the opposing direction. This causes many problems and near misses.

They also park on the pavement, sometimes making it necessary for pedestrians to walk in the road on this blind corner. This is so dangerous for people with prams, buggies or trolleys.

The noise, the selfish parking and the abundant mess is not the only inconvenience; the workers also throw litter around. Building material packaging, food wrappers and drinks cartons are all to be found strewn around adjacent houses and the pavements and verges.

When are we going to stop this relentless conversion of houses into mansions by people who seem to then put them on the market soon after completion? So many of these houses seem to stay on the market, so why do we allow these speculative developments to continue?

We are long suffering ratepayers who will be left with blocked gutters and the destruction of our verges when the developers have moved to their new project.

The monthly Town Council meeting was preceded by the Annual Town Meeting held at 7pm attended by some 15 residents and all 12 Town Councillors. The Mayor presented his annual report for 2014-15 and he also presented the Meritorious Service award to PC Rob Anderson, the Neighbourhood Beat Manager for Ponteland, who is retiring later in the year. PC Anderson was presented with a gift and a certificate from the Town Council and he was thanked for all of his hard work and commitment to the area over the past few years (see article on p6). The meeting ended with several questions from those in attendance.

GRANT APPLICATION – PONTELAND YOUTH SERVICE

The Council approved a grant of £5,500 for youth service work in Ponteland in 2015-16.

APPOINTMENTS SYSTEM TRIAL FOR TOWN COUNCIL OFFICES

The Clerk has been asked to devise a system that would allow for open access to visitors to the office on some days and appointments only on others. This would be introduced for a trial period of three months, after which the success of the scheme and feedback from visitors would be discussed.

VE DAY CELEBRATIONS

Following discussion of a report listing various suggestions to mark the 70th anniversary of VE Day, it was agreed flowers would be laid at the oak on Coates Green that was planted to commemorate the original VE Day on the afternoon of May 8th and the beacon would be lit on the top of St Mary's church that evening. It was hoped that the bells at St Mary's Church would be rung at 11am on Saturday May 9th. Schools are also being contacted to see what they had planned to commemorate the day.

It was also agreed to contact local organisations to encourage them to mark the event, and any organisation organising an event open to the whole community would receive a small contribution from the Council.

HIGHWAYS WORKING PARTY

At the Highways Working Party meeting on March 13th members agreed four new permanent speed indicator signs at Cheviot View (both northbound and southbound), Ladywell Way and North Road. They also agreed the older existing Vehicle Activated Signs were removed for assessment and repair before being redeployed in the remaining six areas. Costs of these repairs will be met from the existing budget.

ENVIRONMENTWORKING PARTY

The Town Council agreed the following recommendations from the Environment Working Party which met on March 16th:

- Installation of metal plates on the three picnic benches in the park subject to their suitability on recycled plastic and to costs being obtained.
- The adoption of a three year rolling programme for the work of the Environment Working Party which would feed into the budget process and provide a schedule of work for three years.
- Placing one of the large rocks at Fox Covert Lane on one of the lower planters at Merton Way. Suggestions of contractors who could carry out this work would be looked into.
- The provision of a stone marker and plaque next to the U3A memorial tree in the park.

•••••

CORE STRATEGY

At the March meeting the Council agreed to write to Northumberland County Council with questions on housing numbers, possible review of

numbers and green belt deletions. The Mayor and the Clerk have since had a meeting with the Head of Planning and a Locality Officer where the various questions were raised. A report summarising the responses received was circulated to councillors. Any further action would be considered at a later date.

NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY COUNCIL

Coun Dodd reported that one or two complaints had been received about the changes to the car park at the back of Merton Way which would be discussed at the next meeting of the Highways Working Party. Coun Dodd will also be visiting all of the businesses in that area.

AGEING WELL MEETING

Coun Greenwell submitted a report of a meeting held on March 23rd. The Step into Spring event would be held on Saturday May 9th at 9.30am at St Mary's Church hall and free refreshments would be available. A new website pontelandageingwell.org.uk had been set up by a High School pupil and had been very well received. There were another nine towns and villages holding their own Step Into Spring events based on the Ponteland model. See advert on p18.



The former England striker urged the staff and pupils to achieve their dream of a new AW surface in a visit back in January 2013, and returned to cut the ribbon at the opening ceremony on April 15th.

U18 Netball


