Ponteland residents of all ages braved the wet weather to once again pay tribute to local service personnel who have died in battle over the last century.

The annual Remembrance Sunday service was held at the Memorial Hall following a parade from the leisure centre.

Those in attendance included representatives of the Armed Forces,

veterans, army and RAF cadets, Ponteland's churches, fire and police services, local community groups, Ponteland councillors, Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Northumberland Bryony Gibson and members of the public.

Ponteland Mayor Carl Rawlings, who laid a wreath on behalf of the town council, said: "I don't think the damp weather put people off because there was a big attendance for the service at the war memorial.

"The service was once again excellently conducted by Rev Peter Barham and the number of wreaths laid was the largest I can remember for the Ponteland Remembrance services that I have attended."

New crackdown will see fines for illegal school run parking

Telephone fraudsters

There have been a number of recent reports of spam emails and unsolicited phone calls where people have been asked to disclosed personal information or provide money or bank details. You can take some simple measures to protect yourself. Your bank or the police will never phone to ask for your four digit card pin, your online banking password, to transfer money to a new account for fraud reasons, or send a courier to your home to collect your bank card. Remember fraudsters may already have basic information about you in their possession. Do not click or open unfamiliar links in emails or on websites. Parking enforcement

There are regular complaints received about road safety outside schools, including speeding and inconsiderate parking. In

response the county council is introducing a parking enforcement vehicle to monitor school keep clear restrictions. Illegally parked vehicles will be issued with a Penalty Charge Notice.

In October 45 vehicles were stopped and checked in the Stamfordham Road and Callerton Lane areas in a joint police operation with HMRC, DVSA and NCC and two warnings were issued to motorists for minor light defects and seven vehicles were found to be using red diesel unlawfully and fines were issued to the owners.

Grand old lady of the Manor celebrates 105th birthday

For someone who was a sickly child, Kitty Stredder hasn't half done well!

For the Ponteland centegenarian has just celebrated her 105th birthday.

Her remarkable achievement was marked by special birthday cards from the Queen and actor David Suchet, a former pupil of her late husband James, and a surprise visit and bouquet of flowers from the Mayor Carl Rawlings as she enjoyed her big day with family and friends at Ponteland Manor.

Kitty (née Price) was born on November 10th 1910 in Falstone, where her father Gus was the vicar, but two years later moved to Pembrokeshire where she spent WWI. She remembers well Armistice Day, when she climbed up the church tower and saw all the naval ships in Milford Haven decked out in flags and bunting.

Moving again to Hertfordshire, Kitty was sent to boarding school in Bexhill, Kent, where the sea air was supposed to do her good – and clearly did!

She started, but never finished, nursing

training and having a taste for adventure, she secured a job as a school matron in Alexandria, Egypt, in 1935 and travelled out alone by train and boat.

James Stredder was teaching at the same school and after a whirlwind courtship they became engaged. They returned to England in 1937 and married in 1938 - a marriage that was to last until 1991 when James died.

Various teaching jobs took the couple to Edinburgh, Ramsgate and Tonbridge where James became a housemaster and Kitty managed a team of staff including cooks and matrons. In 1957, James was appointed Headmaster of Wellington School, Somerset, where they spent 17 very happy years and where the Poirot actor was a pupil.

Kitty was a great support to James and considered her job to be looking after staff wives and their families and to represent the school in the town. She always says: 'He did the gown while I did the town!'

This included WVS Meals on Wheels, being on the local hospital management committee and treasurer of the local baby clinic. In between she played a mean hand of bridge! Retiring in 1972, Kitty and James moved to Pembrokeshire, then Sussex, and finally to Hertfordshire.

In 1945, Kitty had a daughter, Diana, and now has two grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. In 2009, Diana and her husband Peter moved up to Northumberland to be near their daughter Vanessa, of Ingoe, and Kitty came too, back to where she started all those years ago.

Diana, of Humshaugh, said: "Asked recently what she has done in her life, she said it had been a very ordinary life when in fact to most people it sounds pretty extraordinary! Her interest in others, her generous and loving personality and her Christian faith has never failed her and she has made many friends throughout her life

"She says she has no idea what the secret is for such longevity but those that know her think it is the fact that she has such a positive attitude to life and can always see good in everything and everybody."

over joint campus plan

Opposition appears to be growing to Northumberland County Council plans to develop a 70-hectare green belt site for a new combined education and leisure campus and hundreds of new homes.

The authority has increased the allocation for housing in Ponteland for the period 2011 to 2031 in its revised Northumberland Local Plan Pre Submission Core Strategy and the accompanying Ponteland Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) by over 40 per cent to 900 new homes, including 126 which have already been built.

An estimated 400 units are planned for the sites of the current Ponteland middle and high schools, leisure centre and fire station, which will be relocated to a new 2600-pupil community campus as part of the development of the area bordered by Callerton Lane, Mayfair Gardens, Fairney Edge, Cheviot View and Rotary Way in Ponteland.

The others will be built on the former police headquarters site (310 homes) and on a new area of land allocated between Callerton Lane and Willow Way (180 homes). A five hectare site just off the airport roundabout will also be safeguarded for relocation of Meadowfield industrial estate.

The authority's Core Strategy drop-in event at the Memorial Hall on Saturday November 7th, where the plans for the future development of the town were on show to generate feedback, attracted 718 attendees. The council conceded that most were opposed, with only a minority in favour.

NCC said that aside from the co-location of the new schools, other key issues raised and comments made included:

- · residents' previous views had not been listened to
- there had been no consultation on the change in status of Ponteland from 'service centre' to 'main town'
- there was no justification for the loss of green belt and the number of new homes proposed for the town
- concern that the current infrastructure cannot cope with the existing level of development.

There were some people who did support the proposals for Ponteland as they considered there was a need for new development, but the council conceded these were "in the minority". The feedback forms both submitted at and following the event are currently being analysed.

NCC had 19 planning officers and three schools and leisure officers at the event, as well as chief executive Steve Mason, director of planning and economy Geoff Paul, councillors Andrew Tebbutt and Paul Kelly from the Local Development Framework Cabinet Advisory Group and four technical advisers. It has emerged that Karen Ledger, who was head of planning and housing, has now taken early retirement from the council.

Ponteland Green Belt Group manned a stand at the entrance to the Memorial Hall to gather support for its opposition to the green belt development plans and advise members of the public on the kinds of questions and issues which could be raised.

Governing body slams school relocation plans

Further opposition has come from the governing body of Darras Hall First School, set to be relocated to the new joint first, middle and high school building in 2019, which has issued a scathing indictment on the handling of that proposal to date.

In a letter to NCC chief executive Steve Mason, Chair of Governors Dr Andy Large claimed governors had "not been given any educational rationale for the relocation of (the) school".

The governing body claimed the move "will do irreparable damage to the community" and "will cause very significant and increased infrastructure and traffic difficulties for the schools".

The letter continued: "Governors recognise the extremely strong opposition to the relocation project as it currently stands from within the school and wider local communities...significant concerns remain and Governors feel the relocation project has been badly managed, with poor communication to the Governing Body and a lack of transparency around the overall Local Plan."

NCC was accused of "merely attempting to 'cash in' on our large site to realise their assets through providing a site for executive housing" and told "the scheme doesn't appear fully thought through...and in our view represents poor use of a one and only opportunity to use the Green Belt land".

The letter further accuses NCC of issuing a press release in advance of the public consultation which implied the school governing body's approval of the plans, nullifying their assurances to parents that no decisions had been made on the relocation.


The county council stressed that its priority was providing the best quality educational and leisure facilities and said it had carried out extensive consultation with both the schools and wider community. Selling the current school sites was the only way it could fund new facilities, the authority said.

Coun Scott Dickinson, business chair at Northumberland County Council, said: "The council's priority is ensuring that our young people have the best possible education. The proposal is to provide a brand new state of the art combined schools and leisure facility for the benefit of people in Ponteland.

"We have been working with the schools since May on this proposal and they have been directly involved in coming up with the design ideas; which include completely separate areas, including separate play areas, for each of the schools.

"We have been carrying out consultation with local residents as part of the core strategy and we will continue to involve the schools in the process. Following earlier feedback from the schools about the impact on traffic and access to the site, studies are already taking place.





"We have carried out extensive genuine consultation with the schools and local community in helping us to reach this stage and really welcome people's views. Once this stage of consultation is over we will review the proposal based on feedback. Unfortunately this is only opportunity available to us to provide these new schools; releasing land they are currently built on to fund these exciting new facilities."

Parents at Darras Hall First School have formed an action group to protest against the relocation plans and held a demonstration on Broadway on Wednesday November 18th.

In a statement issued by the group, mother-of-three Clare Lamplugh said: "I want my children to attend a school they can walk to safely and one that has strong roots within the local community where the children are nurtured and feel safe. We have this now and we don't want to lose it. I think moving the school will rip the heart out of our local community."

Parent Gavin Warrender added: "We are outraged by the council's proposal...we love the school and want it to stay where it is so our children can continue to walk to school. Many of us feel so strongly we want to have our voices heard together as a group so we are campaigning fiercely to raise awareness of the proposals and the need to complain."

The governing bodies at Ponteland High School and Ponteland Middle School did not wish to comment on the community campus plans.

The formal consultation period for the Northumberland Local Plan Pre Submission Core Strategy ran from October 11 to November 25.

This was the final opportunity for people to comment on the core strategy before it is submitted to a planning inspector for independent examination. Following this consultation the core strategy is scheduled to be submitted to the Government in March 2016 for examination, with adoption expected in autumn 2016. The final resting place of one of Ponteland Cottage Home's 'lost boys' was located during an awe inspiring visit by a local teacher and two pupils to the WWI battlefields.

As detailed in local author Muriel Sobo's book 'We will remember them', there are 16 Ponteland men who died in the 1914-18 Great War who are not commemorated on either the Memorial Hall obelisk or in St Marv's Church.

Their names are: Richard Simpson; Charles Burford; George Holmes; Philip McMasters; Christopher Stephen; Ernest Venus; Michael Ellison: Andrew Little; William Johnson; Ralph Johnson; William Ferguson; George Wilson; Henry Craven; Arthur Paterson; Charles Moor and Henry Moor.


The men had been residents at the residential cottage home, on the site of Bellway's new residential development Jameson Fields, which housed up to 300 children who often came from underprivileged backgrounds. Known locally as the 'Homers', the children attended Coates Endowed School and Ponteland Sunday School.

And during their visit to the battlefields of Belgium and Northern France, Andv Oglethorpe, Head of History at Ponteland Middle School, and Year 7 pupils Max Fawcus and Ellis Good resolved to try and locate the resting place of any of the Cottage Home boys.

But with more than 300 British cemeteries and memorials in the Western Front area alone, locating even one of the boys in a three day visit was challenging.

Andy, Max and Ellis attended the daily Last Post remembrance service at the Menin Gate memorial in Ypres, where Max was chosen from the tour party of over 30 schools to present a wreath with British Army escort Regimental Sergeant Major 'Rea' Perrin of the Duke of Wellington regiment.

The huge memorial has the names of over 54,000 men of the British Imperial Army who died in the horrific battles of the Ypres salient and who were listed as missing in action.

They were delighted to locate here the name of former Cottage boy RW Johnson of the Durham Light Infantry, who died during the infamous Passchendaele offensive on June 12th 1917, and reflected on an inscription on the Menin Gate: "He is not missing. He is Here."

They also found the memorial of Samuel Battensby, Northumberland Fusiliers, of Collingwood Cottage, Ponteland - another victim of Passchendaele - at Tynecot Memorial.

Andy said: "As part of the Legacy 110 project, the middle school is challenged to present its story to a minimum of 110 people. The idea of this is if each participating school presents to over 110 people it will equal the total of the 850,000 men lost in the Great War. So if you are interested in our story and want to learn more about what we saw on our visit we would be happy to come to you and deliver our presentation."

County council urged to shelve plans to relocate library

Users of Ponteland library are urging Northumberland County Council to shelve controversial plans to relocate its services to the town's leisure centre next year.

The council says it wants to close the library as part of its plan to make £44m of savings between 2015 and 2017 in response to central Government spending cuts.

It has pointed to successfully co-located and integrated library services elsewhere in Corbridge, Prudhoe, Wooler, Amble, Haltwhistle, Cramlington, Ashington, Seaton Valley and Blyth, and said there are also plans for joint library services in Alnwick, Berwick, Bedlington and Hexham.

Once the works have been carried out at the centre, there will be a single reception for library and leisure services. It is proposed to accommodate the books, public access computers and library advice service within the existing creche area, as well as utilising additional space in the foyer and corridor areas.

Plans are also being considered to include a creche service within the overall design, along with muchneeded improvements to the toilet facilities.

The authority said relocation will allow the library service to benefit from using the wider leisure centre building, enabling extended opening times as a result of new staffing arrangements and the introduction of improved self-service terminals.

Ponteland library is currently open 39.5 hours a week over five days and at the new site users will be able to access resources seven days a week.

But the announcement of the proposed library closure has been met with dismay by users.

Local author Muriel Sobo, of Beech Court, Darras Hall, said: "This absurd location within the sports centre is not fit for purpose. It would considerably reduce the offering of books and other library services. How could anyone work or read in such an environment?

"The library is an essential service well used by Ponteland people which we do not want moved. The dynamics of the community, built up over the generations, will be destroyed if it is moved."

The plans have also come under attack from Ponteland county councillor Peter Jackson, who said there is concern among the largely elderly population that the new location will be more difficult to get to on foot. He also questioned having a library next door to a noisy sports hall and swimming pool, and said it is already difficult to park at the leisure centre.

Coun Val Tyler, cabinet member for arts, leisure and culture, said: "The new developments in Ponteland will enable us to protect a highly-valued library service while integrating services in a way that makes them more accessible, more efficient to manage and sustainable, and which delivers value for money.

"Unfortunately, we have to make savings across all services because of central government cutbacks and this means changes to the way we deliver services, including library services."

Planned relocations of Ponteland library and schools are under attack in this month's letters...

Absurd new location for library is not fit for purpose

Northumberland County Council intends to move our library very soon to an area beside the swimming pool in the sports centre.

Yes, you read that correctly! Plans are afoot to put it in the foyer, the corridor and the crèche while they sort out further plans for the cut and paste job they want to do in Ponteland and move our schools and facilities from their present locations to sites off Rotary Way by 2019.

This is a hasty decision. It was not trailed in the Local Plan released to the press recently but in a separate press release on November 4th.

This absurd location within the sports centre is not fit for purpose. It is contrary to Policy 49 of the Core Strategy of the Northumberland Local Plan which states 'there should be strong resistance to the loss of community services and facilities un less an appropriate alternative is provided'.

What costings have been done for the necessary alteration of the premises and improved access? It would considerably reduce the offering of books and other library services.

What security would be in place to prevent 'disappearance' of books in such an open public space? Cars are needed to access the location and parking is already stretched. How could anyone work or read in such an environment?

Keep our library in place and serve the needs of Ponteland people who can easily reach this facility in the village centre. It is an essential service well used by Ponteland people which we do not want moved. The dynamics of the community, built up over the generations, will be destroyed if it is moved. Does the county council care?

We'd be better off sticking with present buildings

I went along to the 'drop in' held in the Memorial Hall on November 7th. The County Council has apparently decided that three of our local schools need to be replaced and proposals for the new buildings were to be on view.

In the event I was more than a little shocked to discover that the proposal was for all three to be housed within a single building. Children between the age of three and 18 all turning up at the same front door.

Darras Hall First School and Ponteland Middle School had each been reconfigured as a line of classrooms set either side of a corridor that branched off a longer corridor that gave access to the High School accommodation.

This is not an attractive nor indeed a workable combination and is scant reward for organisations whose efforts have resulted in them being judged to be 'outstanding' by the Ofsted school inspectors.

Children need to be able to identify, and be proud of 'their school' and hardworking teachers deserve to have any success that has derived from their efforts to be ascribed to their particular establishment.

This design had all the charm of a Russian barracks and was reminiscent of the discredited secondary moderns that were put up before the war and subsequently replaced by the more enlightened approach to school design that evolved in the fifties. What is proposed here is very much a backward step.

To make matters worse all three schools were to be banished to the eastern extremity of the village. The prospect of over 2,000 children all turning up at Dobbies roundabout at the height of the morning rush hour does not strike me as being a workable combination.

If this is all that can be achieved given current constraints then better to stay with what we've got. They don't look to be in too bad a condition.

Is car parking not important to county council planners?

As regards the Core Strategy and the planned huge increase in housing for Ponteland, I have been wondering just where the many hundreds of additional cars that this housing will generate will be able to park when visiting the village centre.

Ponteland centre is already overcrowded I personally cannot see where additional parking facilities can be created. However I am not a town planning officer.

Therefore I visited the NCC Core Strategy Pre-Submission Draft Consultation Event which took place in Ponteland on November 7th and I put my question re-additional car parking facilities in Ponteland to a very pleasant lady representing NCC named Jo-Anne Garrick.

She told me that the matter of additional parking in Ponteland had not yet been addressed and was still being looked at. I was surprised at her answer but chose not to shoot the messenger and quietly left.

On leaving the consultation event I thought to myself that it is surely incomprehensible for any organisation to invite members of the public along to an event to give their final comments on that organisation's proposals, at a time when that organisation itself is not aware of what its own proposals actually are.



PROJECTS REPORT

Skate Park/play area

A sign showing the new winter opening hours at the skate park and play area on Callerton Lane has been erected.

QUEEN'S 90TH BIRTHDAY CELEBRATIONS

The Council has agreed to incorporate a red, white and blue theme for floral displays next year to commemorate the Queen's 90th birthday. It is hoped that the beacon will be lit on the evening of April 21st and other suggestions include erection of bunting, involvement of the schools and other youth groups, a civic service at St Mary's and a firework display. Councillors were asked to submit their suggestions to Coun Ramsay, who has agreed to co-ordinate the events.

PROPOSED PARKING RESTRICTION ON THORNHILL ROAD

The County Council is consulting on proposed parking restrictions on Thornhill Road due to concerns raised on road safety during school drop off and pick up times. Normandy veteran receives Legion d'Honneur from French Government

Normandy veteran John Gillespie has been invested with the Chevalier de la Legion d'Honneur by the French Government at a ceremony at Durham Cathedral.

This honour has been awarded to all surviving members of the British Armed Forces who took part in the Normandy Landings and marked the 70th anniversary of June 6th 1944.

John landed on Gold Beach, Arromanche, on June 18th 1944, which also happened to be his first wedding anniversary!

John was born in 1920 and educated in Scotland, qualifying as a civil engineer at Glasgow University at the same time as his future wife, Ellen, was qualifying as a doctor. He was in a protected occupation when war started, building munition factories, but in 1942 he decided to join the Royal Engineers and trained for PLUTO (Pipe Lines Under The Ocean) – highly skilled and demanding work.



They sailed for France in June 1944 and built huge storage tanks on the beach, connected to networks of pipes, under extreme conditions, with only camouflage nets as protection. They were confined to the beachhead for about a month before


penetrating further south to Boulogne, laying pipelines which eventually pumped a million gallons of petrol a day from Liverpool to cross the Rhine at Emmerich.


They reached Germany in early May 1945 and were close to Belsen when VE Day was declared on May 8th.

John and Ellen and their four children later settled in Glasgow with the Clyde Navigation Trust, and moved to Ponteland in 1958 when John took a job with the Port of Tyne Authority. When he retired in 1983, John had been MD for 10 years. He was awarded an OBE in 1979.

The citation for the award of the Legion d'Honneur states: 'We owe our freedom and security to your dedication because you were ready to risk your life.' John feels this sentiment very personally since his younger brother, Bert, was killed flying Lancaster bombers.

John, who remains active, still writes a daily diary and is a member of Rotary. At the age of 95 he shows no sign of slowing up!





Christmas message

from the Reverend Peter Barham, Vicar of Ponteland

On Wednesday
November 11th I led
the children of Richard
Coates School in an Act
of Remembrance – and
they concentrated so
well you could have
heard a pin drop as we
kept silence together.

That evening the skies were lit by fireworks for Diwali – thank you for a wonderful display. Two nights later we had "Children in Need" on one TV channel, and



the events in Paris on the other. Who knows what will have happened in the days before this Christmas message is published.

It feels as if we will face Christmas in a very dark and dangerous world. Most of us are afraid – even though we know that Ponteland is remarkably safe, we fear for our children who live in London.

I don't know many people from the Muslim community, but my youngsters have a wide circle of friends, from a more multi-cultural world. They are frightened and angry at the hatred their friends are having to cope with.

I have compassion when I see the horrendous pictures of refugees fleeing across this world – and yet, what can I do? What should I do? I am frightened by the numbers, I am frightened by people who are different, I am frightened that I am not in control.

I am well aware that religion is a cause of hatred – men and women will do dreadful things in the name of their God. I am fed up of pointing out that non-religious men and women are also capable of doing dreadful things.

I am fed up of trying to justify the belief that faith is also a force for good. It feels a struggle to bring communities together, to get people talking, to believe humanity is best when it works and loves together.

On Remembrance Sunday morning we lit the candle by the War Memorial, just inside the door of St Mary's church. As I walked up the path for the evening service I thought "who left a light on?"

One little candle illuminated the darkness, lit up the church. On Christmas morning I will read the lesson from John's Gospel: "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has never put it out."

A £4m scheme to boost jobs and growth for rural businesses and communities in Northumberland has been launched.


The Northumberland LEADER Programme is open for applications and will provide grants to small businesses, farmers, foresters and communities for projects that create jobs and grow the rural economy.


Also singled out for praise were the five artists from Ponteland Rep who entertained everyone with songs from the up and coming show Oliver!


