

A number of arrests have been made for the above offences and some charges laid

Following on from correspondence received regarding burglary and crime prevention measures mentioned in last month's issue, can I clarify advice is to address routine activity if you are away from home for a length of time. This can include having a keyholder regularly visit and make the property looked lived in, fitting timers and alarms, and not advertising your absence on social media.

I would encourage residents to continue to look out for one another – especially elderly or vulnerable neighbours. Report suspicious persons or vehicles and be aware of cold callers.

There are various ways you can support policing, including:

· Community Messaging - a monthly

- update of crime, ASB behaviour and other campaigns in your area
- FarmWatch countywide news and updates including reports of suspect vehicles and appeals for information
- Community Speedwatch volunteer scheme providing a visible deterrent to speeding motorists who can expect a warning letter or visit from police.

Help shape the future of Ponteland by completing the Ponteland Housing Need Survey

The purpose of this survey is to assess local housing need within Ponteland Civil Parish to identify the range and affordability of new housing to meet those needs.

The questionnaire has been sent to every household in the Civil Parish, delivered with the February edition of Pont News & Views. You can also access it online at pontelandneighbourhoodplan.co.uk

By taking a few minutes to complete the Housing Need Survey now, your views and opinions can help to shape the type and arrangement of any new housing provided. Please complete the relevant sections, even if you have no current unmet needs, and return this document in the pre-paid envelope provided by March 14th.

The more responses we receive, the more useful and accurate the findings will be. Please be assured all the information given will remain confidential; individuals and households cannot be identified from any of the information you provide.

Why is this important, why should I get involved?

This is a key stage in the Neighbourhood Plan, giving you and your family the opportunity to influence the outcome of your own Ponteland Neighbourhood Plan, to help to resolve some key and potentially controversial issues.

Can it make a difference?

Yes, if everyone takes a few minutes to complete this survey, it will have a tremendous impact. All responses will be analysed and will be used as evidence in forming the Ponteland Neighbourhood Plan, which will directly contribute to the decisions that will be made about housing in Ponteland.

What is Neighbourhood Planning, and what purpose does it serve?

The Localism Act 2011 provided a new statutory regime for neighbourhood planning with Neighbourhood Planning Regulations as part of the legal framework to which any neighbourhood

plan must comply. Neighbourhood planning is a way of communities being actively involved with the future development of their local area. Neighbourhood Plans provide local communities with the opportunity to plan for their future needs within a clearly defined designated area. They give more power to communities by being involved at a local level in the planning system, getting the right kind of development based on local needs, and voted on by a local community referendum. This will enable those who live and work in a designated area to choose the type and range of new homes, offices and shops to be built and what they should look

Who is organising the survey and why?

The Ponteland Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, a team of local resident volunteers working on behalf of the Town Council, has organised this survey to identify local needs. This enables the local community to decide its own vision for Ponteland going forward and most importantly, to determine future planning policy in a way which is currently not permitted. However, legislation dictates that those policies will ultimately need to align with the broader Core Strategy for growth and development in Northumberland.

Who will analyse the results?

An independent survey analysis company has been engaged.

Will this make a difference?

Neighbourhood planning seeks to empower communities to manage and enable development in their local area. This is achieved by creating locally specific planning policies to manage development in their area or granting permission by legal order for sites that the local community would like to see developed in a particular way.

What has Ponteland Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group achieved?

For the past three years the Ponteland Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group has followed a process set out in the Neighbourhood Planning Regulations:

- · Identifying the scope of the plan
- · What it aims to achieve and include
- Collecting of appropriate evidence
- Consulting with the community, stakeholders and other consultees
- · Analysing comments
- Preparing draft topic papers including planning policies accompanied with community aspirations or projects
- Analysing evidence.

What it can't do?

A neighbourhood plan can't set standards for issues such as: green belt boundaries; housing allocations; housing numbers; highway matters or quality of roads. These are matters for the local planning authority and highways department at Northumberland County Council.

What is still to be achieved to complete the Ponteland Neighbourhood Plan process?

- · Review the evidence base to date
- Identify other work to be accomplished for a robust neighbourhood plan
- Proceed in consultation (six weeks) with the local community, stakeholders and other consultees
- Submit to Northumberland County Council, consultation period of six weeks
- If approved, an independent examiner is appointed to check for soundness
- If approved, plan will go to a local referendum
- If approved, the completed plan becomes part of the statutory development plan for the area.

Gaming guru Giselle Stewart has been awarded an OBE in the New Year's Honours.


Giselle, of Darras Hall, received the award for services to the computer games industry in the North East.



MINUTE'S SILENCE

The Town Council stood for a minute's silence in memory of the former chairman of the Parish Council Bill Cuthbertson, who had sadly recently died.

PUBLIC QUESTION

A letter and petition was received from a resident who asked the council to consider reinstating a late night bus service to Ponteland from Newcastle.

PRESENTATION BY NORTHUMBERLAND FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICE

Assistant Chief Fire Officer Mark McCarty and Ponteland Station Manager Paul Gowland briefed the Council on a proposal to replace the existing full size appliance at Ponteland with a smaller, cheaper vehicle offering better manoeuvrability. The ACFO was asked if this would result in a reduced service to Ponteland and the Council was assured that the smaller vehicle was capable of doing everything that the existing appliance did. The Council agreed to support the proposal.

GRANT APPLICATIONS

The Town Council agreed a grant of £200 following an application from Great North Air Ambulance for assistance towards the provision of the service, which had attended

four incidents in the Ponteland area in the last 12 months.

BUDGET AND PRECEPT FOR 2016-17

The Town Council approved the draft budget for 2016-17 and agreed to levy a precept request of £380,587 on the County Council, which represented a 2% increase on a band D property. This included £8,639 for projects and councillors were asked to submit proposals to the clerk by the end of January. A meeting will be arranged to decide on priorities. The Council also considered a report on reserves and it was agreed to increase allotments rents by £1 across the board. Cemetery fees and charges will soon be considered by the Cemetery Committee and a tree reserve will be established in April.

SUBSIDY FOR NUMBER 74 BUS SERVICE

The Town Council agreed to subsidise the Saturday late night service for the 74 bus from Matfen to Newcastle via Ponteland, Medburn and Stamfordham jointly with Stamfordham and Matfen Parish Councils at a cost of £95 per night. The County Council and operator Go North East will help promote the service, and there will be a review after 12 months.

FLOOD RESILIENCE PLAN

An action plan is to be prepared in response to a Flood Resilience Plan produced by Coun Adam Shanley to include advice for those at risk of flooding and the co-ordination of flood wardens.

PONTELAND LIBRARY

The Town Council received a report from Ponteland Community Trust asking for support in its efforts to retain the library in its current position and develop a community hub facility on the same site. The issue will be discussed again at the February meeting.

NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

Coun Jones reported that she and county councillors Dodd and Armstrong had met with officers from NCC regarding the library situation and a response was awaited. It is also proposed to relocate Morpeth library.

ADULT FITNESS PROPOSAL

The Council agreed to carry out a public consultation exercise on the installation of adult fitness equipment in Ponteland Park. Details are on the council website at ponteland-tc.gov.uk or can be viewed at the Council offices between 9.30am and 12.30pm Monday to Friday.


