

With 131 classes to compete in, the tables at Ponteland Memorial Hall were all decked with entries in the fruit and veg, floral and handicrafts categories.

The children's section filled half of the lounge area, alongside a stunning floral

# Force receiving 400 non-police calls a day

# There were 25 crimes reported in Ponteland and surrounding area in August.

These break down to the following offences:

- Four burglary other than dwelling (Darras Hall, Ponteland and Stamfordham - pedal cycles and gardening equipment stolen)
- Three thefts (Darras Hall and Whalton notably a large wood chipper stolen)
- Two theft from motor vehicle (Ponteland and Medburn work tools and equipment stolen)
- · Three damage to buildings/dwellings (Ponteland)
- Five damage to motor vehicles (Ponteland)
- · One shoplifting
- Five assaults (a male and female were arrested following two assaults at Rialto's)
- · One racial offence
- · One public order offence.

#### Sexual offences

There have been concerns raised regarding reported sexual offences within the monthly crime figures. The reporting and recording of such offences are to ensure compliance with National Crime Recording Standards (NCRS) which I referred to in this report earlier this year. There has been no significant rise in reports of serious sexual offences.

#### When to call 101

Northumbria Police is updating its advice about when to call 101 in a bid to give the public a better service. The force receives over 1m non-emergency calls a year and around 15pc of those - the equivalent of more than 400 calls a day are about non-police matters including fly tipping, nuisance parking, injured animals, problems with mobile phones and scrap vehicles. 101 should only be used if you need a

police response, are a victim of crime or a witness to any non-emergency incidents. New detailed information pages have been added to the force website to help the public find relevant localised advice to avoid them having to call 101 at northumbria.police.uk/contact

#### Parking and traffic concerns

With the return to the school term, motorists are reminded to show consideration to other road users and residents. I would also like to praise the majority of motorists who have adapted to the loss of the main traffic lights from Callerton Lane onto Main Street in recent weeks, owing to nearby utility works. Police have ensured that the area has been monitored at key times.

#### **Community Speedwatch**

CSW volunteers monitored approximately 450 vehicles in the Ponteland area in August and 43 motorists were found to be exceeding the speed limit and received warning letters. Two motorists have received home visits by police and a driver has also been issued with a car seize warning, meaning if they are seen driving in a careless or inconsiderate manner on a further occasion within a 12 month period, their vehicle can be seized and the driver then charged for recovery and release. Any vehicle seized on three occasions within a year can be crushed.

# Community leaders boycott Dissington garden village events

Community leaders have boycotted a series of workshops held to involve the public in the formulation of plans for a 1,800 home 'garden village' near Darras Hall.

Ponteland Town Council, Ponteland Community Partnership, Ponteland Civic Society, Ponteland Green Belt Group and all four Ponteland county councillors turned down invitations to attend the events.

A three day workshop had been arranged by the Prince's Foundation on behalf of Dissington Estate owner Lugano Property Group and held at the Doubletree by Hilton Hotel at Newcastle Airport from September 12th to 14th.

It included a technical briefing, site visit and tour, and break-out groups discussing urban design, economic development, landscape/ecology, transport and architecture. There were also evening sessions held on September 11th and 26th.


Invitation letters said the process of preparing a locally-led masterplan was the next stage following Northumberland County Council's submission to the Government of an 'Expression of Interest' for the garden village on Dissington Estate, announced in July.

Called 'Enquiry by Design', it involves working closely with key stakeholders to discuss the design of the emerging scheme, collect local ideas and knowledge, and consider the key community issues of importance to all involved.

The outcome of the EbD will form the basis of a masterplan for Dissington Garden Village, which will be the subject of a planning application next year and include a comprehensive consultation exercise.

The community engagement activity is being run independently by the Prince's Foundation, a registered charity, with the support of the Dissington Estate.

In a joint letter to Ben Bolgar, senior director at the Prince's Foundation, Ponteland Town Council, Ponteland Community Partnership, Ponteland

Civic Society, Ponteland Green Belt Group and the Opposition Leader at Northumberland County Council Peter Jackson said they "cannot support this proposal in any way".

The letter claimed the Enquiry by Design would be "a futile consultation exercise" following numerous other consultations where the views of residents have been "completely disregarded".

They included the consultations linked to the county council's core strategy proposing significant release of green belt land for housing development, and Lugano's proposed 280-home scheme at Birney Hill which was the subject of a failed planning appeal last year.

Ben Bolgar responded to the snub. He said: "We are disappointed that members of the Ponteland community have decided not to attend the Enquiry by Design. While respecting their right not to participate, it appears they may have...incorrectly thought that by attending the design workshops that they would be seen to be supporting a planning application. That is not the

"Through a series of collaborative workshops held over three days, we hope to come up with ideas that will eventually inform a set of plans that will be the subject of a planning application (which) will then be the subject of full community consultation – where every member of the community will have a chance to say whether they back the proposals or not.

"We are involved in the Dissington

Garden Village proposals because we believe that by involving stakeholders at an early stage, we can make sure whatever application comes forward to be consulted on is a high quality one that the community have had a chance to input into."

Local organisations represented at the workshops included Ponteland Rugby Club, Northumberland Wildlife Trust, Northumberland Business Network and Northumberland College.

Ponteland resident Pete Newbigin, who also attended, said: "I wasn't really sure what to expect but I'm finding the EbD a really positive and useful process. We're exploring and debating all kinds of issues that affect development and it's full-on hard work!

"It's real collaboration. But I have to say it's very disappointing that people who should be here, people who represent the community, have just decided to boycott a process that has been proven time and time again to be of enormous benefit."

If approved, the garden village plans would include the provision of more than 500 affordable houses, delivery of a Ponteland Relief Road, enhanced community transport and infrastructure, and delivery of a flood alleviation scheme.

A decision on whether the Dissington scheme is one of 12 supported by the Government is due in October.

# Little miracle Olivia starts school

Little miracle Olivia Mawson who was born at 24 weeks weighing only 1lb 8oz is enjoying her first few weeks in school.

The three year old, born on July 22nd 2013 – the same day as the Queen's great-grandson and third in line to the throne Prince George – spent the first three months of her life in an incubator at Newcastle's RVI.

Mum Andrea had enjoyed a normal pregnancy for the first five-and-a-half months, but after a family day trip to Lightwater Valley on the Sunday she felt unwell and after returning home started to get pains.

With partner Leigh out working she called sister-in-law Karin, a nurse, who came straight round and called the maternity unit. They advised her to come in immediately, and within a few hours Olivia was born naturally.

Andrea, 40, recalled the events leading up to the birth: "It was meant to be one of the best days of our lives but actually turned out be one of the worst. The consultant said that 6 to 7 out of 10 babies survive being born this early but

not without a lot of complications - not great odds when they're talking about your baby.

"Olivia was born naturally at 2.19am on the Monday after I had just one injection of steroids for her lungs - we needed four in total for best results as her lungs were so immature. From that moment on we were told that we had stepped on a roller coaster living hour to hour, day to day.

"We didn't realise how true this was - especially the first few weeks. I was spending six hours a day at the hospital and then trying to spend time with our son Luke who was only two at the time and didn't know what was going on.

"We were very lucky as family and friends all pulled together looking after Luke to enable us to go to the hospital so much. After a few very scary moments such as stopping breathing and being resuscitated in her incubator and an initial heart problem thankfully she is got stronger and bigger every day. Finally three months later we were able to bring her home. She was on oxygen until she was one, but that was a small price to pay.

"We were very lucky as she has got no

health issues and is thriving. She has now been fully discharged and living her life like any other three year old. She's so full of life and energy, she's absolutely hilarious and got a great sense of humour. Luke adores his little sister and is very protective; she is exactly the same with him.

"We are forever in debt to the amazing people in the neonatal ward who helped us get through this terrifying time."

On September 8th Olivia, of Callerton Lane, had her first day at Early Years at Darras Hall First School – something Andrea and Leigh feared they may never see.

She said: "Thursday was a very emotional day, seeing this once tiny baby now a little girl going to her first day of school. It doesn't get any better than that - we were all very proud.

"We would like to praise the Tiny Lives charity, which keeps parents in accommodation at the RVI so that they can be with their babies at a very difficult time for any family facing what's ahead, and also pays for incubators and equipment for the babies."

# Popular parish priest Peter moves to Derbyshire

Popular parish priest Peter Barham is settling into his new Derbyshire home after taking over as Vicar of Allestree and Darley Abbey.

Rev Barham and his family had been at Ponteland St Mary's for eight years, and will be a huge miss.

Well over 150 people attended his final service, and there were

also farewell events with both Ponteland First – where every child had signed a card, and Richard Coates Middle School – where staff had bought Peter a hot air balloon trip as a leaving present.

The huge railway buff, who ran regular old railway film showings, was presented with an original of John Wilson Carmichael's 1832 book of etchings of the Newcastle and Carlisle line by churchwardens Elaine Nylander and David Butler.

Other gifts for Peter and his wife Julie included a cheque, theatre tokens, flowers, and a picture signed by most of the congregation who, along with some members of St Mary's and Milbourne Methodist Church, had a farewell supper with the couple at The Highlander.



A Ponteland mother-of-two is to launch her first book in October about her grandfather's heroic efforts during WWI which earned him the Military Cross Medal for exemplary gallantry.

Sarah Reay has spent four years writing 'The Half-Shilling Curate' about Reverend Herbert Butler Cowl, an Army Chaplain who went to France with the Durham Light Infantry and the Northumberland Fusiliers in 1915.

He was severely wounded during heavy enemy bombardment at the front. On his journey back to England he was placed in a cot bed aboard the hospital ship Anglia when she hit a German mine in the Channel. As a result of Herbert's actions that day, he became one of the first Wesleyan Army Chaplains to receive the Military Cross for exemplary gallantry.


Peter said they would find it hard to leave behind a county they have come to love: "I had done eight years in Ponteland, and enjoyed being in the North East. I explored many of the region's churches, walked Hadrian's Wall, and even bought a house in Hexham. However, Hannah is now in London and Harry in Sheffield, and we needed to be nearer them.

"Ponteland is the place where two of our boys - Theo and Gareth - are buried, so our time has been marked by their illnesses and deaths. We needed to make a new start, away from the painful memories, although we will always be grateful for the love and care that we received from so many.

"I am now Vicar of Allestree and Darley Abbey, on the outskirts of Derby. Allestree is an old church, surrounded by upmarket houses, and a large estate. Darley Abbey was one of the mill settlements set up in the 18th century along the River Derwent - so it has an old village feeling, with lots of new properties. I have two churches, with all the pleasures (and hard work) that that entails. The biggest change from Ponteland is that we have changed from Waitrose to Morrisons!"

Until Peter's replacement arrives next year his duties are being covered by Minister Christine Brown, church administrator Maureen Hodson, the church wardens and other clergy colleagues.

Strong opposition and enthusiastic support for the Dissington Estate garden village plan in this month's letters...

## Why we boycotted garden village consultation event

A number of residents and members of various community interest groups in Ponteland have received invitations to the Dissington Estate Enquiry by Design events (September 11th to 14th and 26th).

A number of groups that represent Ponteland residents subsequently met and following discussion this letter has been drafted to represent the response of the following to the Lugano Dissington Estate Garden Village proposal: Ponteland Town Council; Ponteland County Councillor Peter Jackson; Ponteland Civic Society; Ponteland Green Belt Group; and Ponteland Community Partnership.

Representatives of the above mentioned groups will not be attending the workshops. We cannot support this proposal in any way.

Since May 2012, this community has been subjected to 11 significant 'consultations' involving various developments proposed for our settlement. A further Core Strategy Major Modifications Consultation has been scheduled by Northumberland County Council (NCC) this autumn.

In addition to NCC Core Strategy
Consultations we have been consulted on:

- A Supplementary Planning Document for Ponteland
- Major modifications to the Core Strategy
- Ponteland schools reducing from a 3 tier to a 2 tier system and closing an Ofsted outstanding rated middle school
- A 'consultation' on closing dedicated leisure centre facilities and replacing them with a shared facility within the new schools complex resulting in reduced facilities and reduced access
- The Banks Group 'Ponteland Garden Village' proposal
- The Lugano 'Birney Hill Garden Village' proposal – a similar workshop, held June 2012 and hosted by Kevin Murray Associates on behalf of Lugano group.

The Lugano 'Birney Hill Garden Village'

workshop was attended by over 400 residents and a 116 page report was produced.

The NCC Core Strategy consultation statement in June 2016 acknowledges that Ponteland residents have contributed significantly to consultation responses (up to 89% of responses are from Ponteland residents across countywide consultations).

Numerous 'drop in' events held in Ponteland have consistently been extremely well attended; it can never be said that Ponteland residents have not engaged enthusiastically and passionately with consultations held to date.

The common theme running through all of these 'consultations' is that the views of Ponteland residents, who have engaged with the process and responded in such significant numbers, have been completely disregarded.

Unfortunately, it is the experience of many of the residents and representative groups in Ponteland that NCC appears to have a pre-determined plan that has the potential to destroy the character of Ponteland. We believe that 'consultations' are undertaken merely as a 'tick box' exercise.

As a result of NCC's scattergun approach to consultation, the residents of Ponteland are suffering from what can only be described as 'consultation fatigue'.

We fear, from past experience, that a 95% opposition will be reported as if it were a 'constructive meeting' and referred to much later as part of a successful 'consultation'; in the end the majority community view will be effectively ignored.

The eligibility criteria set by DCLG for the new garden villages states they should be free-standing settlements, preferably on brownfield or public sector land, and are in response to local housing demand.

This proposed development could never be described as a freestanding settlement. The Dissington development site is on green belt land, not brownfield land.

NCC suggests there is an objectively assessed need countywide for 'at least' 24,320 dwellings in the plan period. Based

on the 2014 ONS figures the estimated DCLG starting point for Northumberland is 11,367. NCC's surplus over the DCLG starting point equates to +114%.

This proposal therefore fails to meet the criteria set by DCLG.

This latest 'Garden Village' proposal is in addition to a significant amount of land in Ponteland already planned by NCC for removal from the green belt. This is strongly opposed by the community.

By opting not to attend this event, we intend no disrespect to the well-intentioned objectives of the Prince's Foundation when accepting this project. To cooperate with this workshop, we risk providing Lugano and NCC with evidence of community support, satisfying a DCLG criterion.

Not to consult could be interpreted as the community were apathetic to the development; please be in no doubt that the latter is simply not the case.

Given our experience and, as representatives of a significant number of residents, we cannot, regretfully, allow ourselves to once again be subjected to a futile consultation exercise.

community. That company has sponsored so-called consultation events such as your proposed event before and we do not feel that the community was listened to then and your event does not seem to be any different.

Unfortunately it is the experience of many of the residents and representative groups in Ponteland that there appears to be a pre-determined plan that has potential to destroy the character of Ponteland. In addition we believe that 'consultations' like this are undertaken merely as a 'tick box' exercise.

This view is confirmed by the shambolic arrangements of your proposed event. Not only have most residents not been invited but there seems to be no consistency as to who has been selected for an invitation.

The husband of Sally Allan has thanked dozens of volunteers who helped him plant 10,000 bulbs to form a bluebell wood in Ponteland Park in her memory.

Gordon Allan obtained permission from the Town Council to plant the bulbs in an area adjacent to the path that runs up from the footbridge over the Pont to Fox Covert Lane, about 50 yards from Tony's Corner, to be named Sally's Walk.

The father-of-three, who also has the backing of The Friends of Ponteland Park, urged volunteers in last month's Pont News to help him plant the 7,000 bluebells and 3,000 snowdrops and crocuses at a planting day on September 17th.

And the community responded, with more than 150 volunteers making short work of the bulb planting in the sun. Town Council contractors had prepared the ground in readiness.

Gordon said: "We had 10,000 bulbs to plant, which seemed an enormous amount, but we had about 150 people turn up and we had almost planted them all within the first couple of hours. It was a tremendous response from the community.

"One lady arrived on her mobility scooter aged 98. She said Sally always stopped to talk to her on the Broadway and was so friendly she just wanted to show some support, which was nice.

"The Party in the Party organisers supplied a marquee and gas boiler and Waitrose supplied refreshments – tea and coffee and soft drinks, tray bakes, sweets and biscuits. It was a real community event."

Sally's disappearance in the early hours of Boxing Day 2015 sparked national headlines and a huge search operation. Sadly the 59-year-old's body was found in the River Tyne seven weeks later. It is believed she walked ten miles to enter the river by the Swing Bridge on Newcastle Quayside.

Gordon had the idea to create the bluebell wood in her memory to bring a touch of spring colour to the park, as Sally loved bluebells and the couple would seek them out every spring.



# Cancer survivor completes gruelling 12-hour charity challenge

A Darras Hall man in remission from leukaemia has just completed a gruelling 12-hour charity challenge in the Lake District.

After being diagnosed with Chronic Myeloid Leukaemia aged 31 in 2010, Neil Douglass underwent a three month course of chemotherapy and now takes a daily dose of drugs to keep the cancer at bay.

Along with colleagues Steve Maddison, Dawn Harris, Leon James, Mark Collins, Terry Ward and support driver Scott Leadbitter from specialist plastics manufacturer RENOLIT Cramlington Ltd, the father-of-one set off from Penrith at sunrise on Sunday September 11th to take on the epic 'Race the Sun' challenge.

The stages involved a total of 50 miles of cycling, climbing Helvellyn and also kayaking for 3km. The team set off just



after 6.30am and successfully completed the race with 25 minutes to spare over 12-and-a-half hours later.

The aim of the challenge was to raise as much money as possible for Bloodwise, which supports research into finding a cure for leukaemia and other blood cancers, and the Solan Connor Fawcett Family Cancer Trust, which supports families through cancer diagnosis.

Team member Steve Maddison's wife Ali was diagnosed with breast



cancer 13 years ago just after her 30th birthday. Since then, she has experienced three recurrences and had a multitude of operations, the most recent being at the end of 2015 - completing her second round of chemo in March.

The flu vaccine is given free on the NHS to children aged six months to two years at risk of flu, adults aged over 18 at risk of flu, and everyone aged 65 and over.

Pharmacist Jessica Taylor is administering flu vaccines from mid-September until December, with a no appointment walk-in service four days per week.

# Village hairdresser celebrates quarter century

A popular village hairdresser who changed destination after being made redundant from an international travel group is celebrating his 25th anniversary.

Henry Pringle had a background in personnel management in the hotel and leisure industry prior to retraining and taking over the old 'Toll House Trimmers' – encouraged by his own hairdresser.

The decision was taken to retain the building name as 'The Toll House' even though the building was never the actual Toll House. The original, that would have taken a toll for the Jedburgh turnpike, stood on a site immediately in front of the now Lloyds bank building and was demolished when the road and Ponteland Bridge were widened.

The salon, which was originally part of the butcher's shop next door, was relaunched as Henry Robert Hairdressing in November 1991.

But the business has paid a heavy toll for its riverside location several times, as Henry explained: "Built on the river bank, the Toll House is liable to flooding from the River Pont. In my time here we have had flooding on three occasions - most recently in 2008.

"However, the most serious was back in November 2000 when we had over a metre of water in the salon. We were closed for only a week and fully back in action after only four weeks. During this time we received a great amount of help and understanding from both clients and the local community."

Aside from the flooding episodes Henry, 54, has fond memories of his time at the Toll House: "Over the past 25 years we have seen many people pass though our door. Those babies and toddlers back then have grown, some married and even with children of their own, bring in the next generation. In some cases we



have three generations coming to The Toll House.

"We have grown up, even say old, with many of our clients. I am proud to say that a number have been visiting since before I came along and still attend weekly. We aim to welcome all clients with warmth, friendship and professionalism, whether they are new to the salon, local area or have been part of our 'family' of clients over many years."
