

Kirkley hosts national tandem rally

More than 250 tandem riders from as far afield as Germany and Holland attended a national rally at Kirkley Hall.

Last month's event was the first time The Tandem Club's UK National Rally has been held in Northumberland since 1990, when it was hosted by Corbridge.

The week-long rally included daily rides of up to 70 miles, a treasure hunt, and evening entertainment including a last night ceilidh and hog roast. Members stayed in a makeshift campsite on a field in the grounds in tents, caravans and campervans.

Publicity officer Peter Weeks said:
"Northumberland really is an excellent area for cycling. We found the roads empty and drivers generally considerate to cyclists and tandems. The rides went out in different directions each day and always had some suggested destinations and stops to provide interest for those who like to mix tandeming with sightseeing. We enjoyed an excellent rally."

The Tandem Club was formed in the UK in 1971 to provide unobtainable spare parts and technical advice on maintenance, and now boasts a worldwide membership of more than 5,000 enthusiasts.

Three men reported for illegal door-to-door sales

There were 27 crimes reported for the Ponteland and surrounding area in July. These break down to the following offences:

- Two burglary to dwelling (Darras Hall). No items stolen.
- One burglary other than dwelling (Darras Hall). Pedal cycles and gardening equipment stolen.
- Seven thefts (Darras Hall, Ponteland and Belsay). Personal belongings taken from bags when left unattended.
- Two theft from motor vehicle (Ponteland and Darras Hall).
 Work tools and equipment stolen.
- · One make off without payment (Ponteland).
- Two damage to buildings (Ponteland).
- One arson (Callerton play park).
- Two shoplifting (Sainsburys).
- · Two assaults.
- · Three sexual offences.
- One public order offence.
- One communications offence.
- One breach of non-molestation order.
- One fraud.

Following last month's article can I thank those residents who contacted police about door to door sellers. As a result of prompt reporting, three men were stopped on separate occasions in the area, items were seized from them and they have been reported for summons. Products that are taken from the sellers are either disclaimed at roadside or forfeited at court and are then donated charity.

Telephone/internet scams

Residents are reminded to be alert to unwanted telephone calls or emails from dubious companies or persons. Recent scams have involved a male purporting to be from the Metropolitan Police stating they have prevented or intercepted unauthorised

access to your bank account and then ask for your bank details to confirm. Police will not ask for any financial or banking details over the phone.

Others will claim to be contacting on behalf of internet security, utility companies or financial organisations. Put very simply they are after your cash or access to it. Please do not disclose any personal or financial details and do not be tempted to click on a link in an email if dubious of the origin.

Reports of online fraud can be made to your internet service provider. Fraudulent calls can be reported to Action Fraud 0300 1232040. Consider signing up to a call barring service to prevent such calls.

Community Speedwatch

Community Speedwatch continues to gather momentum in the Ponteland area. There will be a further recruitment of CSW volunteers in September.

Volunteers are given training and the equipment to allow them to go out as a visible deterrent to motorists speeding in the area. Motorists found to be exceeding the speed limit will receive a warning letter. Should a motorist receive a third warning letter or the speed recorded is at a grossly excessive speed, then officers will visit the driver at home and outline future consequences to their driving.

CSW volunteers monitored approximately 450 vehicles in the Ponteland area throughout July, with 46 motorists found to be exceeding speed limit receiving warning letters or spoken to by officers at the roadside. One motorist has also received a home visit

Best ever GCSE results at Ponteland High School

Ponteland High's A* students have achieved record GCSE results for the school and improved A level scores.

More than a third of students achieved an A or A* in GCSE Maths and more than a quarter an A or A* in GCSE English, and more than three-quarters achieving an A*-C in both core subjects.

The results showed:

- 15% of students achieved 9 or more A*-A grades
- 30% achieved 5 or more A*-A grades
- 51% achieved 5 or more A*-B grades
- 35% achieved the English Baccalaureate suite of qualifications, well above the national average
- 81% achieved A*-C in English Language/Literature
- 86% achieved A*-C in maths.

There were many success stories for the school's A level students too, with Joe Burrin and Andy MacGowan both achieving three A* grades, Katie Thirlwell receiving two A*s and an A, and Elliott Barker, Megan Daniels, Molly Hall and Olivia Taylor receiving an A* and two As. Lauren Davies, Daniel Elsender, Sasha Hodges and Ellen

Stephenson all scored three A grades.

Overall, there was a rise in the average points per entry score:

- · 23% of all grades were A*-A
- 49% of all grades were A*-B
- 76% of all grades were A*-C
- 99% overall pass rate.

Many of the school leavers are heading off to university, with others starting Foundation Degrees, high level apprenticeships or entering the workplace.

Andy MacGowan has been rewarded for his straight A* performance with a place at Oxford reading Engineering, while Joe Burrin is studying Maths at Bath University. Megan Daniels is studying Liberal Arts at Durham, Elliot Barker is studying Economics at St Andrews and Olivia Turner is taking Medicine at Queens, Belfast.

Headteacher Kieran McGrane said: "These results are incredibly pleasing and truly reflect the hard work and effort on the part of our brilliant students and committed staff. It is great to see such a large proportion of our students achieving the very highest grades at a time when exam standards are becoming ever tougher.

"In the current climate these are outstanding outcomes and I am very proud of our staff and students."



Former Pont schoolgirl LJ Ross releases latest novel

A former Ponteland schoolgirl turned international bestselling author has released her latest thriller.

LJ Ross launched the fourth in the DCI Ryan series – Angel – at the Angel of the North, Gateshead. The first, Holy Island, shot to the top of the Amazon charts upon release while follow-up publications Sycamore Gap and Heavenfield are still regularly in the top ten.

Louise, who writes under the pseudonym LJ as a thank you to her husband James for his unstinting support, is a former Darras Hall First School pupil.

She gave up a lucrative career as a regulatory lawyer in the city to become an author, and a chance comment to her husband during a train journey along the East Coast to Edinburgh led to her writing Holy Island.

LJ's first three books were mainly based in Northumberland, with grisly murders taking place in Holy Island and on Hadrian's Wall, while DCI Ryan's latest outing is heavily set on Tyneside.

Gordon Allan has obtained permission from the Town Council to plant 10,000 bulbs in an area adjacent to the path that runs up from the footbridge over the Pont to Fox Covert Lane, about 50 yards from Tony's Corner, to be named Sally's Walk.

The father-of-three, who also has the backing of The Friends of Ponteland Park, is urging volunteers to help him plant the 7,000 bluebells and 3,000 snowdrops and crocuses at a planting day later this month.

Gordon explained: "The plan is to plant a small bluebell wood to bring a lovely touch of spring colour to the park. Sally loved bluebells and the pair of us would seek them out every spring. The 10,000 bulbs should provide an eye-catching display in 2018 and beyond about the time of her birthday.

"Having purchased the bulbs I have perhaps rather family and the community to plant the bulbs. In return the council have agreed to prepare the site.

"Planting will take place on Saturday September 17th from 10am and go on until all 10,000 bulbs are planted! If people have a bulb planting dipper please bring it along, but don't worry there will be a large number on site for you to use. Please also bring any gloves or pads to support vour knees.

"We will have a tent on site to provide free refreshments - tea, coffee, herbal tea, biscuits etc."


The shock disappearance of Sally Allan in the early hours of Boxing Day 2015 sparked national headlines and a huge search operation.

Your letters

The County Council's plans for new leisure facilities come under fire in this month's letters...



It is difficult to understand the County Council's approach to the sport and leisure consultation. Both the Council's preferred site and proposed shared facilities are being imposed on Ponteland residents.

Residents' alternative suggestions have been totally ignored throughout the numerous stages of the minimal consultation. This consultation period is only three weeks and coincides with the school holidays, and does not provide Ponteland residents with an appropriate opportunity to make an informed response.

The existing facilities serving the village include a leisure centre with sports hall, changing rooms, gymnasia, squash courts, a cricket pavilion with bar, and a dance studio. Adjoining this is a 20-metre fourlane swimming pool, with ancillary pools for infants and for disabled persons.

There is full size league soccer pitch for Ponteland United FC, and pitches for Ponteland Rugby Club, together with the Ponteland Cricket Club ground, are conveniently grouped around the leisure centre. Players use the changing rooms and other facilities within the building.

While it is accepted that the leisure centre, built in 1974, is in need of some level of improvement, the same does not apply to the pool - not built until 1991. It is an attractively designed modern facility, well capable of another 25 years of useful life.

To attempt to incorporate all these various elements within a new school complex on a shared use basis would result in a significant downgrading of existing provision.

No information is given as to the split of time of use between public and schools, and whether all existing daytime classes and sessions for the general public will continue to be held in the day as at present.

We consider that the interests of the local community are best served by expanding the existing sports and leisure facilities where they are, retaining the existing swimming pool and upgrading the leisure centre on its present site.

We are opposed to the incorporation of this wide range of local community sports and leisure facilities within a building complex whose prime function has to be the education of children.

Leisure plans would have "devastating effect" on local sports clubs

Your August edition invited views with regard to future sport and leisure provision in the village.

Ponteland currently enjoys a wide ranging spread of sporting activity. We have Ponteland United FC, an FA Charter Standard community soccer club with the first team playing in Division 1 of the Northern Alliance League and 30 or more junior sides.

Ponteland Rugby FC is a similarly active local organisation, a Rugby Union Club with three senior fifteens playing in the Northern Division, five junior teams, a girl team and six minis for the under 11s. They have three full size rugby pitches on the existing sports field.

Beyond the soccer and rugby pitches, the cricket ground with its imposing pavilion is home to Ponteland Cricket Club, with the first eleven playing in the Northumberland and Durham Senior League and five senior and four junior sides.

The layout plan indicates that, rather than rebuilding on the school land, they are proposing that the village sports facilities that these various clubs currently enjoy be swept away, along with the leisure centre, the pool and the children's play area, with the cleared land utilised to accommodate a new school.

Cricket is to be given a narrow strip of grass between a couple of football pitches while the other sports clubs would be required to share the new school playing field. The school land is to be sold off for housing development.

Such sweeping proposals would have a devastating effect on the provision of sport in Ponteland in both the short and longer term.

If there has to be a new school there is sufficient space for it to be located on the existing school land, thereby leaving the village sports facilities relatively undisturbed.

Sketchy plans a terrible waste of public money

Were you away on holiday at the beginning of August? Then you almost certainly missed the opportunity to 'have your say' on the County Council's latest proposals to demolish the present pool and leisure centre!

The new plan is to reprovide these, together with library facilities, within a new site for primary and secondary schools. There will be so-called 'shared access' for the general public, via a new entrance on Callerton Lane

As one of maybe only a few persons who managed to scrutinize the rather sketchy draft plans on view at the Leisure Centre until August 11, I noted the existing leisure centre car park and children's playground and skate park will all disappear while the bridleway/cycle route towards Rotary Way will be diverted.

None of these issues appears to have been addressed, or adequate replacements for the loss of these assets considered. Yet the County Council appears to be presenting this overall scheme as a "fait accompli".

I agree absolutely with John Hague's opinion in last month's issue that the demolition of our present very attractive swimming pool is a terrible waste of public money, but want to highlight some of the other benefits, currently enjoyed by Ponteland residents, that are also under threat, if this scheme goes ahead.

GRANTS

The Council approved a grant of £150 for Community Action Northumberland, and of £5,500 for youth services in Ponteland. Councillors have asked for a meeting with the County Council to discuss the planned youth activities for Ponteland in more detail.

HIGHWAYS WORKING PARTY

A recommendation by the Highways Working Party, which met on July 15th, to submit a request to the County Council for a Traffic Regulation Order to prevent all overnight parking in the public car parks in Ponteland was approved. The Council also agreed the Local Transport Plan submission for 2017-18 to be sent to NCC. The top three priorities were: raised bus stops along the A696 and main bus routes; new footpaths including kerbing where required at Eastern Way, The Rise, Errington Way, Marian Way and Western Way; and installation of hoop bike bollards at the top of Merton Way to improve pedestrian safety.

ENVIRONMENT WORKING PARTY

The Council agreed a recommendation by the Working Party which had met on July 18th to supply two seats and a bin for an area identified at the Eland Estate. It was likely that these would be moved from the library site when it closed. The installation of a modified lighting system at the Pele Tower that was also able to change the colour of the lighting was also approved.

PONTELAND LIBRARY

The Town Council had written to NCC seeking clarification regarding the moving of the library from its current site to the Leisure Centre. A response had been received that confirmed the library would be moving in mid-September. There was no information available as yet regarding the use of the site once the library had moved.

NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

Coun Dodd stated that there was little to report from the County Council during August. The Town Council had recently written to NCC with queries regarding the recent consultation on the Proposed Major Modifications to the Core Strategy. The response confirmed that NCC wanted to work with the Town Council and the Neighbourhood Plan Group regarding their proposals for education, leisure, community facilities and housing. The letter also confirmed that

there would be a further consultation exercise in the Autumn regarding a Supplementary Planning Document for Ponteland.

MAYOR'S DIARY

A list of events attended by the Mayor in July and August together with a list of forthcoming events had been circulated. The Mayor referred to the opening of the National Tandem Rally at Kirkley Hall on Saturday 6 August and stated that he was pleased to have been involved in this Event, which attracted cyclists from all over the country and Europe. (See article on p3.)

DOG FOULING

In an attempt to deal with the problem of dog fouling mentioned in a recent edition of PNV, the Town Council has acquired some dog waste bags. These are available from the office free of charge for a pack of 20. This is a trial being carried out by the Town Council to see if this helps to reduce the problem of dog fouling in the area.

This report is based on the minutes of the Town Council meeting held on August 10th.

Please maintain your trees and hedges

Ponteland Town Council would again remind residents to cut their hedges and trees back to the profile as shown on the sketch.

This year the trees and hedges have grown exuberantly and hard pruning will be required to keep footpaths clear for pedestrians and roads clear for double decker buses as well as high sided vehicles.

As can be seen from the attached photo, many verges, paths and roads are obstructed and it is house owners responsibility to cut their hedges and trees back to the profile as shown. Please do help the community and do your bit.

The Town Council would also like to thank those residents who regularly cut the grass outside their properties. It helps the council and really does smarten up the appearance of the community.

Minister in 1,200 mile pilgrimage to Rome

If you did a demanding job for 26 years and then had a three month sabbatical what would you do? Climb Everest, explore canals in a narrow boat, swan around on the Riviera – almost too much choice!

Tim Thorpe, the Methodist minister in Ponteland, was faced with this decision. So he chose to walk over 1,200 miles across Europe on the Via Francigena or Pilgrims Way from Canterbury Cathedral to Rome!

And he even found a friend to walk with him and share the agony and ecstasy. Tim knew Chris from 40 years ago when he was his best man so the plan incubated for about six months and came to fruition over May, June and into July.

Tim loves walking but found the journeys which start and end in the same place just a bit boring. He relished the unknown of how or when they would eat or sleep and the unpredictability of weather and venues for a night's rest.





It was a pilgrimage with a destination. But it was no soft option. They crossed France from Calais to Lake Geneva in Switzerland and then the Alps over the Saint Bernard Pass into Italy, through Tuscany and the Italian Lakes to Rome.

Yes, of course they got blisters, but you deal with those. However Chris had to take a couple of days out in France since his feet were badly affected by the very wet conditions while Tim continued

on his own. That was a low point for him and he did think of turning back. It didn't happen and they went on to average around 20 miles a day.

Strangers could be angels! One evening in France they reached a village at 8 o'clock but there was no campsite to pitch their tent, just three dodgy hotels. They sat on the pavement in despair when a guy appeared from over the road, invited them in for a meal, gave them a bed for the night and sent them on their way next morning. He had done the pilgrimage and spoke good English!

Weather was unpredictable and at times extreme. In France in May they walked through torrential rain and their feet suffered; walking over the Alps they experienced deep snow and by the time they reached Italy they were starting at 4.30 in the morning when the temperature was already 24 centigrade and reaching up to 40 during the day.

Tim is back in the pulpit for another two years before he retires. He managed to lose 20 pounds and looks very fit but what an adventure! We are just in awe of his achievement.








Flower show this weekend

Ponteland's Callum Chick was also there, fresh from being part of the Rugby World Championship winning England under-20s team, having scored a try in the final.


The tournament followed a fun day held in July, with stalls

New underground cables to improve Ponteland's power supply

Work has started on a £1m investment in Ponteland's electricity supply network.

Northern Powergrid is installing 7.5km of 20,000 volt underground cables along a section of the A696 to improve reliability of supply – replacing the overhead power lines that currently deliver power to Ponteland.

The new 11,000 volt cable from the primary substation at Newcastle Airport, and a new 20,000 volt cable from another substation at Kingston Park, are being installed alongside fibre optic pilot cables for system communication and telemetry purposes.

The route from Cheviot View crosses the River Pont, following the road to the junction with Darras Road before turning left and going to the Ponteland South substation, which is located adjacent to the Waitrose store.


Alister Gregory, project engineer at Northern Powergrid, said: "We're significantly upgrading the power supply to ensure the network is less vulnerable to severe weather. The overhead power lines that currently supply Ponteland will remain in place and act as a back-up supply.

"As with any construction works there will be some disruption to traffic, but we're making every effort to minimise the impact. Where possible, our contractors are using trenchless technology to install ducts and cabling, with re-instatement work carried out as quickly as possible.

"We hope that residents and commuters will bear with us while we make this significant investment to ensure that Ponteland has a reliable, resilient and robust power supply for many years to come."

The improvement works are due to be completed by mid-March. The company has directly contacted residents who live along the A696 route. Courtesy boards will remain on site during all phases of the construction.

Huge blades bring centre of Ponteland to a halt

The middle of Ponteland came to a complete halt one July day to allow the passage of three turbine blades on their way to be assembled as part of a 16 turbine wind farm on the Ray Estate near Kirkwhelpington.

I saw this once but it has been ongoing this summer as the blades are transported from Blyth and eventually up the A696 to their destination.

The Ray Estate belongs to Lord Devonport, the third of that name, originally created in the 20th century for political service. It was bought by Devonport in the 1950s. The previous owner was Sir Charles Parsons, the famous northeast inventor and industrialist who is buried in Kirkwhelpington churchyard beside his wife.

The size of these turbine blades is unbelievable; in the photograph the front of the carrier is on the bridge and the rear stretches past YOLO's!

There were at least six escort cars with flashing lights rushing about to control the traffic since it was all stopped to allow these giants to pass. In all, parts for 16 turbines passed through Ponteland to form another wind farm near Sweethope Lough on the Ray estate of wild moorland and sheep farms; a beautiful part of our county, windswept and lonely!


