Would you like to become a Police Cadet?

The following 36 crimes were reported between January 1st and February 9th for Ponteland and the surrounding area:

- three burglary dwellings
- · eight burglaries (other than dwellings)
- · seven thefts (largely from unsecure outhouses)
- · three shopliftings
- nine criminal damages including five on Main Street where items have been thrown at passing cars
- two public order offences with racial aspect (one offender identified and under investigation)
- · one dangerous dog offence.
- one fraud
- two assaults.

Anti-social behaviour

There have been 30 reports of anti-social behaviour in the Ponteland area between January 1st and February 9th. Northumbria Police has taken positive action in all incidents where offenders have been identified, alcohol seizures have been made and a number of Dispersal Orders issued directing offenders to leave a certain area, otherwise face arrest. We continue to conduct highly visible patrols in these areas.

Would you like to be a Police Cadet?

Volunteer Police Cadets undertake a four year training programme and meet once a week during school term time – normally on a mid-week night. Each week you will be trained in a different subject. Your training will also include police topics, sport, and Duke of Edinburgh expeditions. After completing 10 weeks of induction training you attend a special Attestation evening where you will take the Cadet Oath in front of your family and friends.

As a Police Cadet you will help and assist in the community by being involved in stewarding local and high profile events

such as town shows, the Great North Run, Pride Events, and Mela.

You will also become involved with the Neighbourhood Policing Teams, undertaking activities including: attending events to offer crime prevention advice; test purchasing; neighbourhood patrols and leaflet drops.

Police Cadets are taught basic knowledge in a variety of policing activity such as law, definitions of robbery, burglary, theft and public order, the Police and Criminal Evidence Act, along with arrest and custody procedures.

Cadets are taught how to be disciplined and independent regarding how to clean and maintain high standards in uniform. You will present yourself professionally at events and cadet weekly meetings.

You will also have the opportunity to visit different units in the police service, such as the Air Support Unit, the Marine Unit, Mounted (Horses), Firearms Unit, and Forensic Unit. You will also take part in the Duke of Edinburgh Award and have the opportunity to go on expeditions.

Homes for downsizing among benefits Garden Village will bring

The lack of affordable housing and suitable homes for downsizing are two of the biggest problems facing people living in - or aspiring to live in - the Ponteland area.

Young people after leaving home find themselves unable to afford to live near their parents who, in turn, often cannot find smaller properties to downsize to once their children have 'flown the nest'.

The Dissington Garden Village scheme offers a solution to both long standing problems.

Not only will it create 600 affordable homes, but also 'key worker' accommodation will be offered at 30% below market value to employees working in schools and health services within Ponteland – many of whom currently commute into work.

Further provision is to be made in the development of lifetime homes, with a specific commitment to the building of bungalows to facilitate downsizing.

Two long awaited infrastructure

improvements which will also be delivered by the Garden Village scheme are the Ponteland relief road that has been proposed, deferred, and postponed for over 40 years, and a new flood alleviation scheme.

New medical facilities, a new primary school and the creation of around 2,000 jobs from employment opportunities on site including an Innovation Centre that will stimulate investment in skills, education, and research targeted at the built and natural environment, are also earmarked.

In all, there will be £90m of support for key infrastructure funded by the uplift in value of the 210-hectare site from planning approval for development. There will also be an estimated £40m annual spend from residents in the local economy.

Additionally, there will be more than 200 acres of accessible open space and new sports facilities.

We have been very pleased at the response to our public consultation over recent weeks and months, which has seen hundreds of residents, businesses and stakeholders attend a range of events and presentations at our Prestwick Park offices.

We have enjoyed meeting and talking to everyone and the feedback received has been invaluable in the further refinement of the project.



Plans revealed for another housing development

187-home scheme proposed off Callerton Lane

Plans have been revealed for another large housing development in Ponteland.

The Hellens Group is planning to build 187 homes on land between Callerton Lane and Willow Way, from Callerton Court to Edge Hill, at the eastern edge of Darras Hall.

A mix of two, three, four and five-bed houses are proposed for the 22-acre site. They include 60 apartments for over 50s within a two storey complex with communal facilities, 50 3-4 bed houses for downsizers, 50 family homes, 17 bungalows and Dutch bungalows, and ten plots for sale for self builds.

The Washington-based developer says the proposals are "in keeping with the emerging Northumberland Core Strategy" and will include affordable housing and extra care facilities including ground floor ancillary retail.

Pont News first revealed Northumberland County Council was allocating the site for around 180 homes back in October 2015 when the authority published its revised core strategy.

Hellens held a six hour public exhibition at Ponteland Memorial Hall on February 2nd and an eight day online consultation which was later extended by a week to February 10th.

The firm, which had promoted the event and online consultation via a household leaflet drop, said it intends to lodge a planning application with NCC in February or March.

D-day looms for housing, education and leisure schemes

Major planning decisions on the future development of Ponteland are due to be made within the next few weeks.

Two Strategic Planning Committee meetings are being held at County Hall. Morpeth, on March 7th and 15th where the following planning applications are set to be determined:

- Dissington Garden Village -2,000 homes
- West Clickemin Farm behind Cheviot View - 400 homes
- £57m education and leisure development off Callerton Lane
- New 1,900 sq m primary school off Middle Drive, Darras Hall.

A planning application for another 187 homes off Callerton Lane (see p7) is due to be lodged soon and another proposal for 27 one and two-bed apartments on the former Ponteland Library site is due to be determined imminently.

The county council cabinet has approved the submission of the

Northumberland Local Plan Core Strategy Draft Plan to the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government for Independent Examination, which was pending ratification of the Full Council on February 22nd as we went to print.

The controversial long term planning blueprint for the period 2011 to 2031 which proposes the release of land for the three major developments above has sparked hundreds of objections during various consultations held over the past two years on different drafts.

Among the issues raised is the projected increase in housing in the county of 26.340 - 126 per cent higher than the Government's own starting point from local projections of 11,634. More than 3,000 of these new homes would be in the Ponteland area and 228 hectares of green belt land would be released for development.

The report to the NCC Cabinet meeting on February 16th said the Garden Village's 2,000 homes will not be included in the calculation of Northumberland's five year housing land supply, a key change to the core strategy which Ponteland Town Councillors challenged at their February meeting.

An NCC spokeswoman said: "Councils are required to assess their five year housing land supply position against their most up-to-date objectively assessed need (OAN).

"The Dissington Garden Village is being promoted through the emerging Northumberland Core Strategy as an opportunity to provide additional housing numbers over and above OAN in line with the objectives of the Government's prospectus on garden villages, published in March 2016, which sought to significantly accelerate the supply of housing nationally.

"On this basis, delivery of housing units at Dissington falls outside of the council's five year housing land supply calculations."

The timetable for the Core Strategy is submission to the DCLG in March, with examination in mid to late summer and adoption this December.

If the county council is 'minded to approve' any of the three major schemes they would be referred to the National Planning Casework Unit, which can either confirm that NCC can make that decision or say that the Secretary of State wishes to 'call it in' and take the decision.

Localism being ignored in favour of commercialism

Oh dear, here we go again! More mayhem from the laughable buffoons at Northumberland County Council.

Is the council throwing planning applications about in the style of a muck-spreader in the hope that one or more of them will stick? It clearly has difficulty in devising any sort of coherent strategic approach to development across the county as a whole and Ponteland in particular.

As such it seems to be adopting a "spray and pray" approach to planning. Does it perhaps hope to prevail by the sheer volume of ill-conceived proposals in this seemingly endless war of attrition on the beleaguered residents of Ponteland.

There isn't the need for the cumulative housing volumes proposed, there are no special/extraordinary circumstances that warrant use of green belt land, the local infrastructure cannot cope and the increased risk of flooding is courting disaster.

Consequently, the residents feel under siege from developers in cahoots with a council looking at the money to be made by exploiting the village. How on earth can this collection of outrageous schemes be justified when there are plenty of brownfield sites available but being ignored?

The authority's willingness to ignore inconvenient aspects of legislation, such as the School Organisation Regulations 2013 and the wishes of residents, indicate it is either incompetent or incapable of formulating a plan that meets genuine requirements, sits within national guidelines and stays within the law.

Northumberland County Council is ignoring localism in favour of commercialism and promoting greed

over need. Its behaviour towards the residents of Ponteland begs the question: is Northumberland County Council fit for purpose?

The assault on our village by developers must be stopped

Ponteland county councillors have been delighted with the support from local residents who have written in with objections to the three major planning applications for development in Ponteland; at Clickemin, the schools and leisure complex and the so called "Dissington Garden Village".

These applications together total over 3,000 houses as well as the destruction of the green belt both in and surrounding Ponteland. The plans for the new school and leisure complex will mean diminished and restricted sport and leisure facilities.





Blood biker meets Lions

At a recent meeting of Ponteland Lions Club the members found out a lot they did not know about Northumbria Blood Bikes.

Blood Biker Nigel Barlow explained that although they have only been in existence for just over three years their work has grown rapidly.

Blood Bikes operates all through the weekend and from 7pm to 7am each weekday; effectively when the Blood Transfusion service is not in operation.

Growing from servicing the needs of Gateshead's QE Hospital, the service now transports blood to where it is needed for all the hospitals in Northumberland and Durham. It also links in to the Great North Air Ambulance Service and Cumbrian colleagues.

Northumbria Blood Bikes is reliant on donations and is completely free to NHS trusts. Starting with three bikes, they now have ten bikes plus four cars and an ex-NHS van.

The bikers and their associates are volunteers and the riders and drivers all have Advance Biking or Motoring qualifications. Petrol costs alone for the fleet run at £2,500 each month.

Ponteland Lions has made a donation of £200 to Northumbria Blood Bikes.

DETAILS OF VARIOUS PLANNING APPLICATIONS AND CONSULTATIONS

A list of planning applications and consultations that had been ongoing since December was presented to the Council for information. The Town Council had met all of the deadlines for responses.

PONTELAND NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The final draft version of the Ponteland Neighbourhood Plan following the recent Pre Submission Consultation in November was circulated to councillors for approval. Subject to a minor amendment, the Town Council approved the final draft version which is being submitted for Northumberland County Council (NCC) to publicise prior to an independent inspection.

HIGHWAYS WORKING PARTY

There were no recommendations to approve from the Working Party's meeting on January 13th but the proposed modifications to the car park at the back of Merton Way shops were discussed. Coun Dodd reported that he had most of the funding in place to be able to carry out this work and he hoped the Town Council would be able to offer some funding towards landscaping works etc. There will be a public consultation carried out by NCC before work is started.

ENVIRONMENT WORKING PARTY

The Council approved various recommendations from the Working Party meeting on January 23rd including proceeding with six park signs subject to sufficient funds being available to complete the project at the year-end. The Council also agreed to revised fees for memorial seats and picnic tables which would cover all of the council's costs. The cost of a new recycled plastic seat, plaque and 10 year lease would be $\mathfrak{L}1,125$. This included the cost of the seat, a plaque, 10 year maintenance cost, a sum for asset replacement and

administration costs. An extension of the lease for a further 10 years would be £500. It was agreed to introduce a new charge for placing a plaque on an existing recycled plastic seat that did not currently have one. This charge would be £690 for 10 years. It was also agreed to move two seats that were felt to be surplus to requirements in their current position and the West ward councillors were asked for their opinion on whether a seat should be installed at Medburn. The appointment of a landscape consultant to provide a planting scheme for the sensory garden planned at Coates Institute was also approved and it was agreed to carry out

some tree work at one of the allotments.

Coun Dodd reported that he was still in discussions with officers at NCC about the problems at a particular spot on the A696 where there had been a recent fatal road accident. Coun Jackson reported that the County Council were in the process of agreeing their budget for 2017-18 and this would be discussed at a Council meeting on February 22nd. It looked likely that there would be a huge expansion of the capital programme. An allowance was to be included to start the relief road and the flood works for the Dissington application. The final version of the Core Strategy was to be discussed by Cabinet and there was a suggested amendment not to include the proposed housing numbers for the Dissington application as part of the calculation for Objectively Assessed Need (OAN). The reason for the exclusion amendment is not clear to the Town Council. Concern was also expressed about the suggestion that the fire station in Ponteland was not to be replaced. Councillors also expressed concerned at the rising level of capital debt, the proposed authorisation level of expenditure and the felling of trees at the County Hall site.

This column is based on the minutes of the Town Council meeting held on February 8th.

Councillors approve final draft of Ponteland Neighbourhood Plan

Thanks to the community and stakeholders for taking time out to respond to the Pre-Submission Consultation held from November 1st– 16th.

The analysis of the responses was completed after the New Year, allowing amendments to be reviewed into the final draft of the Neighbourhood Plan.

This was presented to the Town Council at its February 8th meeting and, subject to a minor amendment, this document was approved for the next stage.

What happens next?

- Submission by the Town Council of the final draft plan to Northumberland County Council for publicity – Feb/March 2017
- Examination of the plan by an independent examiner spring/summer 2017 (examiner recommendations may require amendments to the plan)
- (Subject to passing examination) Neighbourhood Plan proceeds to Referendum – autumn 2017
- Neighbourhood Plan 'made' (brought into legal force) by Northumberland County Council – autumn 2017.
