## Academy trust set to take schools out of local authority control

Five primary schools are set to join forces with Ponteland High School to create a multi academy trust independent of local authority control.

Belsay First School, Darras Hall First School, Heddon St Andrews CE First School, Ponteland First School and Richard Coates CE Middle School have all joined the High School in a six week consultation with parents.

The other schools in the Ponteland Schools Partnership - Stamfordham First School and Whalton CE First School - have not taken part in the consultation but can enter discussions about joining the MAT in future.

The move to create the

multi academy trust follows the controversial decision last year to restructure from a three to two tier system which this autumn sees all six first schools and Richard Coates CE Middle School convert to primary schools which will take in three to 11-year-olds and the High School expand to take in Year 7 and Year 8 pupils from September 2019.

A huge majority of the 1,200+ parents who took part in the restructure consultation opposed the changes and took part in a campaign and demonstrations last year.

Ponteland Community Middle School has already made an individual application for academy status, and is not involved in the two tier restructure. In a letter to parents, Ponteland Community High School headteacher Kieran McGrane wrote: "You may be aware of the announcements by the Government making it clear that it wants all schools to become academies, or have a plan in place to become an academy.

"The preferred structure is a Multi-Academy Trust (MAT), which is where a group of schools/academies join together and form a single trust company with a single board of directors who are responsible for the strategic running of the trust and are accountable for the trust.

"The Department for Education, Ofsted and the Regional Schools Commissioner are all supportive of MATs as are all three main political parties. There is also an increasing body of evidence demonstrating clear benefits when groups of schools work collaboratively within a MAT arrangement.

"An academy receives its funding directly from the Government and does not have any money withheld by the local authority to fund its services.

"During the consultation period on school organisation last year we were clear about the educational advantages of moving to a primarysecondary model. Since that time we have continued to work closely with our partner first/primary schools and believe that now is the right time to consider forming a multi academy trust.

"Our preference would be to form a MAT that reflects the primary-secondary nature of our schools thus providing a clear structure and platform upon which to build. We believe that this is the most appropriate structure for a MAT as it enables the trust to plan for a child's journey from nursery/reception right through to A levels."

Meetings have been held at each of the six schools during the consultation and a decision will now be taken by each governing body on whether to proceed and submit an application with partner schools to he Department for Education (DfE).

The county council is currently reviewing all capital spending plans inherited from the previous Labour administration, including a planned £57m investment in education and leisure facilities in Ponteland which would see a new combined primary and high school and leisure centre, new primary school in Darras Hall and improvements at other schools.



# Girls' football team plays at Stoke City's bet365 Stadium



A Ponteland girls' football team played in a Premier League stadium after winning through to the national final of an international tournament.

The players from Ponteland Community Middle School were among 32 primary school teams who competed in the English Schools' FA Danone Nations Cup National Finals held at Stoke City's bet365 Stadium.

They won the district competition, the county competition and made the final of the North of England competition to get through to the national finals – from the 6,000 boys' and girls' teams entered last September.

The Year 5 team comprised Zara Naughton, Olivia Brown, Bethany Hickman, Jessica Doyle, Erin Buckland, Jemima Aspinall, Ellie Winter, Izzy Robson, Katy Bullock and Brooke Williams.

Darren Alcock, English Schools' FA National Competitions Manager said: "It is an outstanding achievement for the teams that have reached the National Finals of the English Schools' FA Danone Nations Cup.

"Over 6,000 school football teams entered this competition for boys and girls back in September. We have already been lucky enough to witness some tremendous examples of skill, teamwork and sportsmanship along the way. The memories created for the young players involved will last a lifetime."

The Danone Nations Cup is the world's biggest international football tournament for 10 to 12-year olds. From England to Indonesia, China to Mexico, 2.5 million boys and girls in 32 countries participate each year.

## Chief Executive leaves County Council after Tories take control

The change of political leadership at Northumberland County Council after the May local elections has resulted in the immediate departure of the Chief Executive.

Steven Mason, who had been with the council for nearly 15 years working in a number of financial roles, had been chief executive for the past three years.

The announcement of his departure "to pursue fresh challenges" was made within hours of Ponteland Conservative Councillor Peter Jackson being voted in as the authority's new leader at a meeting of the County Council.

The Conservatives took 33 of the 67 seats at the May elections, with Labour taking 24 seats, and are running a minority administration with

the support of independent councillors.

Mr Mason, who lives in Darras Hall, said: "It is with sadness that I have decided to leave the Council after nearly 15 years' service to the residents of Northumberland.

"During my time the Council has faced many challenges, most notably local government reorganisation and the impact of cuts in local government funding over an extended period of time.

"The Council's approach and direction will change significantly following the

recent County Council election and it is an appropriate time for new managerial leadership at a time when the political leadership has changed with a radically different agenda."

Coun Jackson thanked Steven for leaving a strong and stable organisation which would give the new administration time to agree new priorities.

The current Deputy Chief

Executive Daljit Lally will be the interim Chief Executive while the Council makes arrangements for the appointment of a permanent replacement.

The Council said in a statement: "Following the formation of a new administration at full council it has been agreed Steven can leave immediately to allow a smooth transition to a new Chief Executive."

## New area councils to devolve decision making to local communities

A new system of local democracy will allow communities across the county "to create their own futures", the new Conservative leadership has pledged.

Northumberland County Council has created five new local area councils which can make decisions on planning applications, road spending and petitions.

Ponteland will be served by the Castle Morpeth local area council, which will meet bi-monthly to consider planning applications, road spending and petitions.

Council leader Peter Jackson said: "We want to work with communities to help them create their own futures, rather than impose large projects or developments on them. These new local area councils are one way to develop a better future for the whole county.

"We want to be clear this is not a return to district councils, but about bridging the gap between an autocratic, centralised county council and communities. We value the work that town and parish councils are doing and wish to work closely with them, bridging the gap with a county council some see as distant and unengaging."

The move will provide savings of £250,000 over the next four years from reductions in councillors' allowances. For times and dates of the area committees go to the 'meetings' section on the front page of the council website at northumberland.gov.uk

## MP's honeymoon period continues

Ponteland's MP Guy Opperman had two reasons to celebrate after a hugely successful general election campaign.

Not only did he record the highest vote share in the Hexham constituency since the 1950s – he also got married!

The snap election caught out many – including Guy and his partner Flora Coleman, who clearly did not expect to spend the first few days after their wedding on June 2nd together on the campaign trail.

The MP said: "There are only two MPs that can say they got married during their general election campaign, and I suspect there are fewer still who can say they

spent their honeymoon campaigning! I am in a select group of two with Clive Lewis, the Labour MP for Norwich South.

"Locally, I am pleased to have secured an increased percentage vote and the highest Conservative vote share in Hexham since the 1950s. With the election over it's now time to get back to work for the Hexham constituency as your local Member of Parliament."

A Boundary Commission review which would have seen Ponteland divided by two new constituencies – Hexham &

Morpeth and Newcastle upon Tyne North West – as part of moves to reduce the number of MPs from 650 to 600, had not been agreed in time for the election.

The controversial plans would have meant a Northumberland MP represented one half of Darras Hall's Eastern Way and a Newcastle MP the other side.

Mr Opperman saw his share of the vote increase by 1.4% to 54.1%, but his majority was cut from 12,031 to 9,236 with a 3.9% swing to the Labour Party.



#### Double award means two trips to the Palace for Rachel

A Darras Hall teenager enjoyed two visits to Buckingham Palace in a week after securing two top national awards.

## Plans for new temporary fire station withdrawn

Plans for a new temporary fire station have been withdrawn pending a review into the whole £57m education and leisure scheme in Ponteland.

Northumberland County Council had lodged the planning application in May, which described the development as: "Temporary fire station on the leisure centre site to comprise of a two storey modular building and single storey appliance bay. The existing caretaker's flat shall be reused by the Police Service as part of the temporary relocation."

Twelve full time employees would have been based at the new station, with 14 car parking spaces.

Last month newly elected Conservative council leader Peter Jackson pledged a full review of the £57m education and leisure scheme proposed for the Callerton Lane site, which includes two schools, the leisure centre and fire station.

A county council spokesperson said: "The application for a temporary fire station has been withdrawn. All capital projects are currently under review by the council. The outcome of this review will be announced in due course."

# Entries sought for 40th annual Flower Show

#### **CO-OPTION TO THE COUNCIL**

Following agreement at the last meeting to fill the vacancy on the Town Council in the South Ward the Council agreed to co-opt Mrs Karen Overbury to the position of councillor. Mrs Overbury joined the meeting following this approval.

#### **GRANTS - HOLY SAVIOUR CHURCH, MILBOURNE**

The Town Council agreed the annual grant of £350 to the church which would be spent on grounds maintenance works in the churchyard.

#### **ANNUAL AUDIT OF ACCOUNTS 2016-17**

The Council considered and approved the Annual Return which must be submitted to the external auditors by 30 June 2017. A copy of the internal auditors report was also considered. He had no issues to draw to the attention of the Council.

#### AIRFIELDS OF BRITAIN CONSERVATION TRUST (ABCT)

The Council had been contacted by ABCT regarding a suggestion to place a plaque at Ponteland airfield. They had stated that an airfield had been in operation off Limestone Lane which operated between 1916-1919 as a military night landing ground for 36 Squadron. They suggested installing a plaque somewhere within Ponteland itself at a location to be suggested. The organisation would pay the associated costs and possibly the services of a local monumental stonemason but if planning permission was required this cost would likely have to be met by the Town Council. The Local History Society has been contacted and is very interested in the idea. The Council agreed in principle to proceed with the installation of a plaque at a location to be decided following discussions with the Local History Society and clarification of any potential costs.

#### REQUEST TO HOLD A CHRISTMAS MARKET IN MERTON WAY

Ponteland Rotary Club requested permission from the Town Council to hold its Christmas market in Merton Way this year on December 2nd. It was felt that this location may attract a higher footfall and would mean that portable toilets were not required. The Rotary Club is in discussion with a company regarding the use of covered marquees in case of bad weather and had taken some soundings from Merton Way traders and the county council which appeared to be favourable. The Town Council does not own Merton Way so could not grant permission but agreed that this may be a better location.

#### **ENVIRONMENT WORKING PARTY**

The Council agreed the following recommendations put forward by the Working Party, which met on May 22nd:

- Not to proceed with the Green Flag project for the park following an analysis which had identified a number of areas where the park did not meet the criteria, such as the provision of toilets.
- The Town Council should be represented at the Britain in Bloom awards being held in Llandudno on October 27th.
   The Environment Working Party was given delegated authority to decide on attendance.
- Approving a request from the No. 1 Gym in Ponteland to hold a boot camp in Ponteland Park at no charge. This would be on a seasonal basis and an assurance had been given that benches in the park would not be used by participants. It was agreed to review this after three months.
- Replacing the tidy bear bin with an ordinary litter bin if required following vandalism in the play area at Callerton. The damaged seat and picnic bench to be replaced with recycled plastic alternatives in accordance with the Council's policy. Installation of CCTV is also being investigated.

#### NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

Councillor Dodd reported on the meeting held at County Hall on May 24th. Councillor Peter Jackson was elected as Leader of the Council and Councillor Veronica Jones was given the portfolio for Adult Well-Being And Health. Councillor Eileen Armstrong had been appointed as Chair of the Castle Morpeth Local Area Council and Councillor Dodd had been elected as Chairman of Business. He stated that the new administration had many issues to resolve and they were currently working though these. The first meeting of the Castle Morpeth Local Area Council was being held on Monday 19th June at 4pm at County Hall. This Council includes areas within the former Castle Morpeth district and would deal with local issues relating to these areas. The joint meeting with NCC and parish and Town Councils will be held in October. Councillor Jones reported that the grass verges had been cut for the first time in several years and the trees that had been felled at County Hall had been replaced. She also reported that the planning application for the temporary fire station at the Leisure Centre had been withdrawn.

Councillor Armstrong said Local Area Councils wanted to work closely with parish and town councils in their area although she stressed that the county council could not bring back the former district councils in Northumberland. Budgets will be determined for each local council and there will be discussion with parish and town councils about how these budgets were spent. They will deal with local planning decisions although major applications would still be decided by the Strategic Planning Committee. Applications for up to 100 houses would be determined locally. County councillors for Ponteland will still be holding surgeries on the first Saturday of the month at Waitrose between 10am and 11am. Town councillors are welcome to attend

#### **MAYOR'S REPORT**

The Mayor reported on his first duties since he took on the role in May and forthcoming events. He thanked everyone who had been involved in the organisation for Party in the Park which had been a great success.

# Bridleway project shortlisted for regional award

### Ponteland's bridleway project has been shortlisted for a regional award.

The community initiative has been nominated for the Best New Project category in the LOVE Northumberland Awards.

Eligible projects need to be less than one year old and fit the campaign's aim 'To promote improving the environment of the county'.

During February and March a community drive to give the bridleway between Callerton Lane and Rotary Way a revamp took place. Fifty residents of all ages from 10 different organisations turned up to give their support to the project, organised by Ponteland Community Partnership with the support of the NCC Area Countryside Officer.

They planted 75 trees and reinstated over 60 wild flowers. Now all this work has been done the final part of the project was to complement the communities' efforts with two educational interpretation pedestals to be manufactured and installed just in time for the Britain in Bloom judging at the beginning of August.

The research has been completed with the assistance of the Local History Society, Wildlife Group and Friends of Ponteland Park, who have all supported the Partnership to provide the

material for the interpretation pedestals which portray our local railway heritage.

## Kirkley Hall Farm hosts International Sheep Dog Society Trials

Kirkley Hall Farm welcomed 50 dogs and their handlers from the International Sheep Dog Society for a Northumberland Heat Open Sheepdog Trial.

The event - the first Northumberland Sheep Dog Society Trial in eight years to be held at Kirkley Hall - saw shepherds from as far afield as Scotland to Manchester come to compete.

During the competition, dogs were guided through a series of commands to complete a variety of tasks that reflect their everyday work with a pack of sheep.

Each competitor started their race with 100 points and for every mistake made during the run judge Stuart Wallace - a well-known shepherd from the Borders region - deducted points.

The six top placed competitors of the day who

secured the most points were awarded with national points, meaning they will now stand a chance of qualifying in the International Sheep Dog UK Finals.

Kirkley Hall Farm Stocksman Michael Stephenson, who organised the event, said: "It's great to put Kirkley Hall Farm back on the map for these sorts of events, which are important in the farming community."

The 190-acre Kirkley Hall estate, along with 1,314 acres at Carlcroft Farm, provide a valuable hands-on teaching resource for students studying on Northumberland College's various land-based courses including agriculture and horticulture.

The farm runs as a commercial farming operation with sheep and cattle livestock as well as arable farming operations, providing financial returns to the college.

Hundreds object to plans for another housing development

Hundreds of objections have been lodged against plans for another large housing development in Ponteland.

The Hellens Group is planning to build 187 homes on land between Callerton Lane and Willow Way, from Callerton Court to Edge Hill, at the eastern edge of Darras Hall.

A mix of two, three, four and five-bed houses are proposed for the 22-acre site. They include 60 apartments for over 50s within a two storey complex with communal facilities, 50 3-4 bed houses for downsizers, 50 family homes, 17 bungalows and Dutch bungalows, and ten plots for sale for self builds.

The Washington-based developer says the proposals are "in keeping with the emerging Northumberland Core Strategy" and will include affordable housing and extra care facilities including ground floor ancillary retail.

Pont News first revealed Northumberland County Council was allocating the site for around 180 homes back in October 2015 when the authority published its revised core strategy.

Hellens held a six hour public exhibition at Ponteland Memorial Hall in February and an eight day online consultation which was later extended by a week. The firm, which had promoted the event and online consultation via a household leaflet drop, lodged a planning application with the county council in March.

As we went to print, NCC had received 919 objections to the planning application, with just one submission in favour.

Since the application was lodged there has been a change in political leadership at the county council, with the new Conservative administration signalling it does not believe there is any justification for development of the green belt for new housing.

New council leader Peter Jackson is also hoping to be able to amend the core strategy to reduce the current proposed housing allocations and release of green belt land for development.

The authority is awaiting news on a potential Government call-in for the 400-home scheme by Banks Property for Clickemin Farm. The 2,000-home Garden Village scheme proposed for Dissington Estate has not yet been referred to the National Planning Casework Unit due to an outstanding objection by Highways England. NCC said it was 'minded to approve' both planning applications in March.

No date has been set as yet for the determination of the Hellens planning application.
