



# Sixth anniversary celebrated with announcement of expansion plans

Ponteland dental practice Higgins & Winter is to expand into neighbouring premises to create a third surgery.

Work is about to start on a knock through to the former Rowlands Accountants offices next door, which will also see a new scanning suite, patient consulting room and additional office space and staff facilities on the first floor.

The announcement coincides with the sixth anniversary of the takeover of the Bell Villas dental practice from John Hallam by dentists Kevin Higgins and Richard Winter in late 2011.

The initial building works created two state-of-the art surgeries, an imaging suite, dedicated sterilisation room and a larger open plan waiting room accessed from a new front entrance.

But Kevin and Richard saw the opportunity, following the takeover of Rowlands and the accountancy practice's subsequent relocation to Seaton Burn, to further expand to meet growing patient demand for both dental and cosmetic services.

Permission for the change of use was granted at the end of November by Northumberland County Council.

Richard said: "This expansion will enable us to offer an enhanced, personalised patient experience. Patients undergoing complex dental procedures and facial aesthetics will now have a dedicated treatment coordinator guiding them through their treatment."

As well as the expansion plans, the practice is also investing heavily in the very latest technology. A new addition is the Itero Element® scanner which shows your smile transformation without the need for dental impressions being taken.

Kevin added: "With the additional capacity afforded by a third surgery we will also be able to offer more services and more flexible appointment times."

The practice will operate as normal during the building works next door, which are due to be completed in the Spring.

#### Anti-social behaviour update

There has been a reduction in the number of reported incidents of anti-social behaviour over the past month.

There has been ongoing multi agency work, with partners from Northumberland County Council, Ponteland Town Council, Youth Services, Ponteland Community High School and member of the local community meeting regularly.

On November 28th an environmental assessment was undertaken of the park, play area and Merton Way to identify areas that could be improved, for example the cutting back of branches to open up any dark areas.

A further meeting was held on December 4th at Ponteland Leisure Centre where Youth Services provided a comprehensive update of their engagement with young people over three weekends in November.

Overall the young people just wanted to be outside and meet with their friends. The majority, when offered options, were disinterested in having any type of formal provision.

It has been identified that Merton Way shops is an area where young people congregated in large groups, predominately as a meeting place and to buy food from local businesses.

Northumberland County Council has installed a temporary CCTV camera to run alongside the existing CCTV system to obtain evidence for any reported incidents of disorder or criminality.

#### Turf cutting ceremony marks start of school build

Pupils, staff and councillors joined building contractors at an official event to mark the start of building work on the new Darras Hall Primary School.

Galliford Try has been appointed as the official contractor for the £5.8m project, which will see a two-form entry primary school building created to replace the school's existing building.

The new school building, which will be completed in time for the start of the new academic year in September 2018, follows the decision by Northumberland County Council to reorganise schools in the area to a two tier primary and secondary system of education.

Coun Wayne Daley, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Children's Services at NCC, said: "Today marks the start of building work on a school build for Darras Hall Primary School.

"We want every child in Northumberland to have the best possible educational opportunities and this investment will help to provide the best possible learning environment."

Cliff Wheatley, Managing Director of Galliford Try North East and Yorkshire, added: "We look forward to working with Northumberland County Council to provide the high-quality new buildings that local children deserve."

## Neighbourhood Plan is legally adopted

Decisions on planning applications in Ponteland Parish will now have to meet policies in the Neighbourhood Plan following its legal adoption.

The plan was 'made' (the legal terminology) by Northumberland County Council at its Cabinet meeting on November 23rd, meaning it is now part of the statutory development plan.

Planning decisions must now be made in accordance with the policies in the plan, unless material considerations indicate otherwise.

The adoption follows the Neighbourhood Plan referendum in September where all residents of the parish who were registered to vote were able to have their say.

Overall, 2,730 people voted, a turnout of 29.5%. With only 101 people voting 'no', there was a majority 'yes' vote of

96.3% in favour of making the Neighbourhood Plan.

The plan was prepared by Ponteland Town Council through its Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, with support from Northumberland County Council's planning officers.

The Town Council engaged with the community through extensive communication, consultation and engagement between 2012 and 2017 to produce the plan, which addresses issues local people have identified as important in the area.

It comprises 32 planning policies which have been developed to address spatial planning and land use issues identified by the local community; including

the built and natural environment, the local economy, housing, flooding and transport.

Coun John Riddle, cabinet member for planning at Northumberland County Council said: "The planning policy framework in Northumberland is being strengthened by the adoption of neighbourhood plans like this one.

"This is the fourth plan to be made and there are around 20 others in various stages of preparation across the county. The council is pleased to provide significant support to local groups in preparation of their plans."

Coun Alan Varley, Mayor of Ponteland, added: "Ponteland Town Council is

delighted that the plan has been 'made' and wishes to express their sincere thanks to the Ponteland Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group members who put in so much time and effort on the Council's behalf.

"Thanks must also go to the planning officers at the county council, who were there to offer support and guidance when needed."



#### PRESENTATION BY NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY COUNCIL YOUTH SERVICE

Two representatives from NCC's Youth Service attended to discuss recent engagement activity with young people following disorder problems. They had spoken to youths in various outdoor locations in Ponteland on three consecutive Friday evenings to see if they would prefer to participate in arranged weekend evening activities. The offer was declined with young people saying they already had sports through the week and just wanted to meet up with friends. Councillors told the Youth Service representatives incidents of anti-social behaviour and criminal damage were regularly reported to them. The issue is to be discussed with neighbouring town councils, police and the youth service to try and identify a way forward.

#### **GRANT APPLICATIONS**

The Council approved the following grant applications after consideration: £1,500 - Dalton Village Hall; £450 - Diamond Inn for the New Year's Eve firework display; £250 - 2018 Ponteland Beer Festival in 2018; £250 - Sport Tynedale.

#### PONTELAND NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The Council agreed to terminate Ponteland Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group in accordance with the terms of reference following confirmation from the County Council that the Plan was now 'made' and had been brought into legal force. The Plan now forms part of the statutory Development Plan for the Ponteland Neighbourhood area which covers the civil parish of Ponteland. The Council formally thanked the chair and members of the steering group for their hard work and dedication over the last five years.

#### NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

Councillor Richard Dodd reported that additional resources were being provided to speed up the Core Strategy process. He said plans for the proposed new combined schools and leisure complex are out for consultation and work has started on the new Darras Hall Primary School.

This report is based on the minutes of the meeting of the Town Council held on December 13th.

#### Volunteers wanted for next phase of bridleway revamp

Volunteers are once again being sought for the next stage of the revamp of the former railway line from Rotary Way towards the airport.

Work will restart, weather permitting, during January and February and help is needed with tree planting in the Spring.

Ponteland Community Partnership, which is coordinating the bridleway revamp project, has been successful in obtaining tremendous support from local volunteers and organisations. They include the Community Foundation serving Tyne and Wear and Northumberland, the Local Environmental Action Fund, Ward Bros, and Northumberland County Council's Countryside Officer.

In November, 22 volunteers started work on the revamp of the old railway line. So far, this section has had the first litter pick and pruning back of trees and shrubs to allow the footpath to be widened to two metres - close to the original width of the old railway line.



This is a section not as well used by local residents and the plan is to bring it up to the same standard as the route from Callerton Lane which was revamped last year and is now a wildlife corridor.

The aim is to encourage residents and visitors to enjoy this rural setting with a more diverse usage than at present. It is hoped that by including information on the distance between pedestals, in steps, it will encourage its use as part of keeping fit or as part of a medical recovery programme for those who find they are in need of more exercise.

Volunteers are doing most of the manual work with Ward Bros donating manpower, equipment and materials to replace a fence and levelling and treating the surface to improve drainage in an area that is usually wet.

The Local Environmental Action Fund

from Community Foundation is funding publicity, website development and three educational interpretation pedestals.

The community partnership is working with members of the Local History Society, Wildlife Group and Friends of Ponteland Park with research for the displays and the NCC Countryside Officer has contributed three perch benches, to be located close to the display pedestals.

One hundred trees are to be planted early in the new year and Friends of Ponteland Park will also be donating 100 wild flowers to be planted at the end of the project.

# £20m investment helps Newcastle Airport land national award

### A £20m investment has helped Newcastle International Airport land a national award.

For it has been named 'Airport of the Year' at the North of England Transport Awards.

The airport was presented the title at a glittering ceremony in Leeds by BBC Breakfast presenter Steph McGovern, after beating tough competition from Doncaster Sheffield and Liverpool John Lennon airports.

Recent upgrades across the airport include a state-of-theart radar system, gate area modernisation and new terminal flooring – all of which were key factors in securing the title.

Digital signage, free premium wifi, self-service bag drop and a new World Duty Free Express store have also been introduced in a bid to ensure the highest standards of passenger experience.

The North East's largest airport, which was also voted Britain's best airport for a second successive year in the summer, also saw the five millionth passenger pass through the terminal for the first time since 2008, with passenger figures set to be the highest in a decade as 2017 comes to a close.

The growth in passenger numbers has seen winter sun destinations in particular, such as the Canaries and Balearics, record their busiest 12 months on record.

Nick Jones, Chief Executive at Newcastle International Airport, said: "I'm delighted that Newcastle has been named 'Airport of the Year'. We've had a fantastic 2017, with multi-million pound investment in upgrades throughout the airport and more than five million passengers passing through the terminal for the first time in a decade - it's really been a year to remember."

The North of England Transport Awards was launched last year by the Transport Times in a bid to bring the industry together to celebrate its achievements in providing efficient, high quality transport services across the region and reward and encourage innovation and excellence.

Newcastle International has been shortlisted as 'Airport of

the Year' at both years' ceremonies. It supports 18,900 jobs, including 3,450 on site.

# Parents show support for middle school's expansion plans

Dozens of parents attended a meeting to hear plans to extend Ponteland Community Middle School to take in three additional year groups.

and Prudhoe.

The proposals would see the school change from the traditional middle school intake of children aged nine to 13 to pupils aged nine to 16, up to GCSE exams, with the first Year 9 intake in September 2019.

There is also the potential for a lower school up to Year 4 to follow later.

The announcement of the launch of a consultation into the plans followed a warning by the headteacher of Ponteland High School that he could not guarantee places for pupils who did not enter at Year 7 under the new two tier system brought in by Northumberland County Council, but instead applied to join at Year 9 after leaving PCMS.

Kieran McGrane said the high school would have to fill its Year 7 intake with pupils from outside Ponteland to take the place of any who opted to join the surviving middle school, which became an independent academy after parents objected to the two tier restructure which would have seen it close.

PCMS, now run by the Board of Ponteland Academy, announced a six week consultation in November which included the stakeholder event at the school on December 4th.

This could mean dozens of children having to travel to secondary schools outside Ponteland, in Newcastle

Headteacher Dr Caroline Pryer said 50 people attended the meeting, where they were shown architect plans for building works to create additional accommodation including new classrooms.

Her presentation highlighted the school being positioned 111th for KS2 SATs in the Sunday Times list of the top 250 state schools, and comments in a recent parents' questionnaire.

A parent of a Year 5 pupil at PCMS, who asked not to be named, contacted Pont News to offer his support to the Academy's expansion plans.

The father said: "As consumers, voters and parents, we are constantly told we should have choice. In reality, most were happy with the choice of first schools, middle schools and high school we had. Hey ho - we now must deal with what we have. Given we are where we are, the solutions are pretty obvious.

"Ponteland Academy (the former middle school) wants to extend its age range to GCSE. Make it happen. Money is being found for every other school and parents have voted in large numbers to keep faith with this high achieving school, so let them have the funds to do it.

"As parents caught in the middle of all of this, we were left with few options as to where to have our children educated. This is a mess of your making (Northumberland County Council and the High School), not ours or the children's - we voted against it in huge numbers. Our children continue to get good grades.

"Does anyone really want to see them being bussed out of the village to add their statistical success to schools in another authority? There is a place for both an extended Ponteland Academy and the new High School. This creates both choice and capacity.

"Decision makers - do the right thing and sort this out for the benefit of the children and the people of Ponteland."

A planning application for a £46m combined primary and secondary school and leisure facility on the site of the current leisure centre is expected to be considered by county councillors early in the new year.

Meanwhile six schools in the Ponteland Partnership – Belsay Primary, Darras Hall Primary, Ponteland High, Ponteland Primary, Heddon on the Wall St Andrews Primary, and Richard Coates CE School – are joining forces in a new Multi Academy Trust.

She added: "Asif spent the last two weeks of his life at the Marie Curie Hospice. The staff there treated him with great care and dignity and provided us support at a very difficult time."






