## Blooming marvellous!

More than 40 businesses, schools, community groups and dozens of volunteers joined forces to ensure Northumbria in Bloom judges enjoyed a clean and colourful welcome to Ponteland.

The magnificent floral displays included a giant poppy on Coates Green in this, the 100th anniversary year of the end of World War One.

The bug hotel has been created by pupils from Ponteland Primary, Richard Coates School, Darras

Hall Primary and the Town Council with a sign created by Ponteland First School. It is in St Mary's Churchyard, a special entry in this year's Northumbria in Bloom awards.

Pupils also helped with planting barrels on North Road and planters at Broadway and Thornhill Road, while more than 30 volunteers helped on a litter pick day.

Ponteland secured a silver gilt award in the 'small towns' category in its first entry to Britain in Bloom last year, after five consecutive gold awards in the 'small towns' category in Northumbria in Bloom.

We are representing Northumbria in the small town category in the Royal Horticultural Society Britain in Bloom UK Finals 2018. alongside Morpeth (town), Durham (small city) and Tanfield (village).

RHS judges will visit again in August to measure the standard of floral displays and the general cleanliness of Ponteland and Darras Hall, compared to 75 other Britain in Bloom finalists. A list of businesses and organisations who have supported this year's entries is on p14.

## MP welcomes withdrawal of Clickemin housing plans

Ponteland's MP Guy Opperman has welcomed a developer's decision to withdraw plans for a 400-home development on green belt land at West Clickemin Farm.

Last month we reported that a date had been set for a public inquiry next January into the controversial plans for the 21-hectare site between the A696 at Cheviot View and B6545 Rotary Way, after they were called in by the Secretary of State.

Northumberland County Council had supported the proposals, which would have contributed £5.5m to the nearby schools and leisure scheme, under its previous Labour-led administration.

Its Strategic Planning Committee said it was 'minded to approve' the planning application in March last year but it had to be referred to the National Planning Casework Unit due to the size of the scheme and its location on green belt land.

However, after the now Conservative-led authority indicated it was revisiting the decision following its policy shift on green belt development – and the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government announced the public inquiry – Banks Property said it was withdrawing the plans.

Describing the call-in decision as "political", the firm's principal development planner Justin Hancock said: "The West Clickemin Farm site has long been recognised as appropriate for development of the type we are proposing, and our proposals for it were carefully developed over many years to allow for a great deal of information about the site and the wider local area to be factored into them.

"Throughout this process, we worked closely with Northumberland County Council's planning officers on all aspects of the project, and especially on securing a significant contribution that the scheme would make towards enhancing the educational facilities available to families in and around Ponteland.

"The County Council's newly-reached opinion that no private sector funding is required has undermined the current case for development at West Clickemin Farm.

"It is highly regrettable that, after so many years' work, we therefore find ourselves having to withdraw these carefully-planned and sensible-sited proposals, but with the Council's change of stance and its decision to return the planning application to committee, we

have been left with no viable option but to do so."


The decision was met with delight from campaigners who had opposed the plans. Ponteland Green Belt Group described the announcement as "great news for Ponteland residents".

And MP Guy Opperman said: "I welcome this decision as the right thing for Ponteland. We have said from day one our campaign has not been against homes, but about protecting the green belt.

"Ever since our very first battle at Birney Hill, I have remained hopeful that our campaign to protect Ponteland's green belt would succeed. Today is another good day for protecting our precious environment and preventing the urban sprawl into Newcastle.

"There were always clear and objective planning grounds on which this application to build on the Ponteland green belt should not have gone ahead. I am very pleased our arguments have been listened to."

But Mr Hancock added that Banks Property "still feel development at West Clickemin Farm is the most logical and sustainable site for development in Ponteland" and "intend to retain this site within our development portfolio".

### School celebrates five decades before relocation to new home

The 52-year history of a Ponteland school was celebrated with current and former pupils, teachers and parents before its relocation to a brand new building in September.

It opened as Darras Hall County Primary Infants School on September 12th 1966 with headteacher Miss Elsie Burt, and has had 22,000 pupils through its doors over the five decades since.

It has had several different names, including when it was split into two schools – Runnymede First

School and Greenlee First School – in 1972, later rejoining to become Darras Hall First School in 1985. Last year it was renamed Darras Hall Primary School as part of the local education restructure.

In the school's final week before closing for demolition, it held Journey through Time – a two day exhibition of memories and memorabilia from each decade.

Former pupils were able to have a final look around the school – to see inside the head teacher's office or sit at their old desk in the classroom – and there were performances from school choirs, the ensemble and the Glee club.

For some, the school has been more than just a place they attended as children

– former pupils Tara Pritchard and Jo Henderson are now teachers there!

Demolition of the upper school will begin in August, with two MUGAs (multi use games areas) created in its place during the autumn. The lower school will remain for the time being, with nursery and reception based there until they are relocated to the main school and the remainder of the old school buildings are demolished in 2020.

The new adjacent school building has been funded as part of a £50m three tier to two tier reorganisation of schools in the Ponteland area by Northumberland County Council.

This will also include a new £46m combined primary and high school and leisure centre, and extending, remodelling and refurbishing St Andrews at Heddon-on-the-Wall, Whalton First School, Belsay First School, Stamfordham Village First School, and the Ponteland First School building which Richard Coates Middle School will relocate to.

An open day is being held for pupils, parents and residents on Saturday August 11th from 10am to 2pm where the finished school, which will have a music studio and outdoor classroom on the roof, can be seen.

## Taxpayers face costly legal bill as garden village battle heads to court

Taxpayers face a costly legal bill as a bitter battle between a developer and local authority over plans for a 2,000-home garden village on the outskirts of Ponteland looks to be heading to court.

The Lugano Group, behind the proposed Dissington Garden Village, has issued a letter before action in respect of a claim reported by regional media to be worth millions of pounds against Northumberland County Council.

The dispute centres on the authority's policy change on green belt development following the election of a Conservative administration last year.

In March 2017 the Strategic Planning Committee said it was 'minded to approve' the garden village planning application. It should have then been referred to the National Planning Casework Unit for a ruling on whether it would be called in for decision by the Secretary of State, but this has not yet happened nearly 18 months on.

Lugano has made a series of allegations which the council has strenuously denied in two lengthy letters to the head of legal services, which include claims pressure had been put on senior planning officials within the authority to scrap the Core Strategy (long term planning blueprint for the county) and reverse the garden village decision.

Lugano alleges it has secured evidence including documentation obtained via a Freedom of Information request that there was an attempt to "unlawfully influence the statutory planning process" with cajoling, bullying and threats towards a senior officer who has since left the authority.

The firm said they had written to the Secretary of State asking him to intervene and had reported the matter to the Crown Prosecution Service. Calls for an independent inquiry into the claims have also been made by the Chairman of the Labour Party, Wansbeck MP Ian Lavery, Blyth Labour MP Ronnie Campbell and party colleague Dennis Skinner MP.

Now Lugano has issued formal legal proceedings against Northumberland County Council Leader Peter Jackson,



Chairman of the Strategic Planning Committee Coun John Riddle, and Chief Executive Daljit Lally OBE as well as against the authority itself.

The company has raised a number of allegations of serious misconduct in relation to the planning process and the handling of the planning application for Dissington Garden Village.

A report to the county council's cabinet meeting on July 23rd sought permission to indemnify all three named from the impending legal action, requesting an initial £10,000 indemnity for each, with further indemnities in tranches of £15,000 for each for the purposes of obtaining independent legal advice and representation, to be funded from general contingencies.

As well as - but not linked to - the Lugano legal action, the conciliation service ACAS has advised the council that a former employee is proposing to make, as yet, unspecified employment claims against both Coun Jackson and Mrs Lally personally.

The report by Legal Services Manager Liam Henry states: "Clearly the obtaining of separate legal representation incurs a cost, and given the circumstances of both matters, where no evidence to substantiate the claims has been produced to date, although in the Dissington matter the developer's solicitors maintain that this exists, it is considered reasonable for the Council to consider granting an indemnity in respect of these members and officers for the purposes of separate

legal representation; as the actions complained of by the developers are actions which were undertaken by the three persons named in the course of their duties with the Council and when they were exercising functions on behalf of the Council."

It continues: "...if a Court finds that if all of any of Cllrs Jackson and Riddle, or Mrs Lally behaved improperly, illegally and outside their authority in relation to the developers, then the Council is entitled to be refunded all costs paid out under the indemnity."

Lugano Group chairman Richard Robson said: "These matters are of the upmost seriousness but unfortunately to date we have not had any assurances from the Council that our concerns have been properly addressed.

"Accordingly and with regret, we have no option but to commence formal legal proceedings against the authority and individuals concerned. We have engaged a leading international law firm, Pinsent Masons, along with a specialist QC and have now served a formal 'letter before claim'."

A county council spokesperson said: "We are taking legal advice with regard to correspondence from the Lugano Group. As previously advised, we believe that the council has acted lawfully and reasonably throughout this process. We continue to work with Lugano on their live planning application for Dissington Garden Village."

## Tributes paid to popular ex-politician

#### Tributes have been paid to a popular Ponteland Alderman who has died aged 91.

Sheila Campbell MBE, of Ridgely Drive, represented the people of Ponteland East on the former Castle Morpeth Borough Council for 18 years and was also a parish councillor.

The former teacher retired from the borough council in 2005 and then from the parish council in 2007 to spend more time visiting her two sons and three grandsons in London and Derbyshire.

But she kept busy in a number of roles, including Guide Movement Ambassador, cub pack leader and President of Castle Morpeth Disability Association where she continued her support of disabled people after 20 years teaching at the Northern Counties School for the Deaf in Newcastle.

On retirement from the Borough Council 13 years ago the Liberal Democrat, who had been Mayor of Castle Morpeth in 1997-98, received praise from all sides of the council chamber. Then Council Leader Alan Sambrook described her at the time as 'one of the most outstanding councillors within the borough' and said 'a void will be created by her departure which will take some filling'. Former borough Lib Dem Leader David Parker said on her retirement she had championed the cause of people with disabilities and 'made a real difference'.

In 2009 Alderman Campbell MBE attended the official reopening of Morpeth's 13th century Chantry following flood damage in her capacity as member of the Bagpipe Liaison Committee. She was pictured sharing a joke with the visiting Princess Royal.

Interviewed after the Royal visit, she joked: "The Princess Royal spoke to me and saw my name badge, and I pointed out that there was no such thing as an 'Alderwoman' – try saying that quickly, it doesn't sound very flattering!"

Coun Peter Jackson, Leader of Northumberland County Council, was also a former borough council colleague. Speaking after hearing news of her death, he said: "Sheila Campbell was both

a colleague and a friend for many years on Castle Morpeth Borough Council.

"I have fond memories of her as being very open and interested in all that was going on in the community. She was enthusiastic in all that she did. She was very involved in village life and very much had the interests of Ponteland at heart."



#### GRANT APPLICATIONS – NORTHUMBERLAND CITIZEN'S ADVICE BUREAU

The Council considered a grant application from the Northumberland Citizens Advice Bureau regarding a proposed service in Ponteland for a half day each fortnight. This followed a presentation by the Northumberland CAB at the June meeting. After considering the information provided and the statistics of usage relating to Ponteland, the Town Council agreed not to proceed with a grant at the present time.

#### NORTHUMBERLAND LOCAL PLAN

The County Council is consulting on the Northumberland Local Plan from July 4th until August 15th. A report outlining the main issues relating to Ponteland was considered by the Council, which agreed that councillors would submit comments to the Clerk who would formulate a response for their consideration and submission to NCC by the deadline date.

This report is based on the minutes of the Ponteland Town Council meeting held on July 11th.

#### Falklands veteran rises to the challenge

A Falklands veteran has successfully conquered his mammoth mountain challenge and raised nearly £5,000 for mental health charities.

John Mew, 60, completed the ultimate SAS selection test, the grueling 24km Fan Dance Race in the Brecon Beacons where participants run over the Pen Y Fen, the highest mountain, not just once but twice – and with a full 25lb pack on their backs.

His time of just under six hours was clocked on one of the hottest days of the year where temperatures in the sheltered valleys beneath the peaks registered more than 30 degrees.

The money will be shared between the Armed Forces charity SSAFA and Forward Assist, the specialist veteran's charity based in Dudley, Northumberland.

John, from Dinnington, said: "The soaring temperatures made it even harder and there were times when I thought I would not make it but I knew I had to keep going. At the finish I was physically and mentally exhausted but elated. I would like to thank everyone who has supported me. It is hugely appreciated and I know the money will help others affected by mental health issues.

"Taking on this challenge gave me a target and a focus and the chance to give back to what so many people have given to me".

John was on board HMS Coventry in 1982 when it was hit by three Argentine bombs and sunk within 20 minutes with the loss of 20 crew members and nearly 30 others injured. He has suffered from anxiety and depression and was only recently diagnosed with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

John served in the Royal Navy for 12 years as a physical training instructor, ship's diver and as a member of the Portsmouth Command Field Gun Crew.

He was also named in July as a runner-up in Premiership Rugby's BREAKTHRU Achiever of the Year Award after completing a 12-week men's health programme with Newcastle Falcons Move Like a Pro scheme.

Taking part in the weekly sessions have been a key driver in John taking a more positive view on life and to become more physically healthy.

The awards are supported by the All Party Parliamentary Group on Rugby Union as community programmes continue to transform lives on and off the pitch.

#### Railway line eco project wins regional award

An environmental project which has seen Ponteland's old railway line transformed into a wildlife corridor by community volunteers has won a regional award.

The two-mile long former railway track from Rotary Way south to Newcastle Airport was built in 1901 and ceased operation in the 1960s.

It needed significant reinstatement work as the track had narrowed significantly over time with waterlogged potholes and overgrown vegetation which had drastically reduced accessibility.

Work included litter picks and pruning days, planting of new trees and wildflowers, design of interpretation panels, and reinstatement of hardcore.

The project was featured on BBC Newcastle's Garden Mania programme and is supporting the town's Northumbria in Bloom and Britain in Bloom award entries.

Ponteland Community Partnership entered the Old Railway Line project



for the LOVE Northumberland awards and was 'highly commended' in the urban category. Members received the award from Her Grace the Duchess of Northumberland at a ceremony compered by BBC's Carol Malia at Alnwick Garden.

PCP Chairman Alma Dunigan thanked landowner Ward Bros for reinstating the hardcore, the Community Foundation for

funding and all the volunteers involved.

Ponteland Middle School pupil Ben Campbell received an Outstanding Individual award, after almost single-handedly encouraging the school to recycle paper and cardboard over the past four years.

The Community Partnership receive the award from the Duchess of Northumberland.



## Warning as shoppers targeted by thieves stealing cash

Last month I provided advice to be aware and vigilant of door to door fish sellers; this month I would like to make the community aware of the increase of thefts from people out shopping.

In the last few months police have received reports of thefts where victims are targeted in supermarkets whilst they are shopping.

The method being used is that a victim enters a supermarket, places their bag in a trolley and whilst distracted shopping their wallet/purse is stolen. These crimes are literally taking place within seconds, with offenders leaving the scene immediately.

Unfortunately for some of these victims large quantities of money have been stolen, therefore I ask for everyone to be particularly vigilant when shopping.

Please keep your bag and valuables on your person, as opposed to being left in a trolley, and where possible avoid carrying large amounts of cash. If you notice someone acting suspiciously please contact a member of staff or the police.

#### Anti-social behaviour

Over the last few weeks there have been fresh reports of antisocial behaviour, particularly in the centre of Ponteland. Police have taken positive action where appropriate; this has included one youth being interviewed for causing criminal damage, one Community Protection Notice warning letter being issued and 10 letters issued informing parents their child has been involved in anti-social behaviour.

The Neighbourhood Policing team held an assembly at Ponteland Middle School prior to the break-up of the summer holidays to send out a clear message of the impact and consequences of anti-social behaviour.

Anti-social behaviour is unacceptable and therefore I request the support of the community that you ensure you know the whereabouts of your child and that they understand they are
