



Council officials are investigating the flytipping of dog waste at a picturesque bridge over the River Pont.

As these shocking pictures show, what would appear to be the owner of a number of dogs or possibly a dog related business has been throwing a range of waste over Dissington Bridge near Medburn.

The rubbish strewn across the water includes large empty packs of dog food for puppies, junior and adult dogs, poo bags and even a dog carrier.

Johanna Dubois from Darras Hall, who walks her dogs in the area, reported the flytipping to Northumberland County Council.

She said: "It's obviously someone who has lots of dogs, or perhaps a kennels or another dog business. It's horrible, the mess is just hideous."

A county council spokesman said: "This has been brought to our attention on a couple of occasions by members of public who walk this area. We have referred this incident to the Environment Agency with it being within watercourse, and an Environmental Enforcement Officer has been to the location and will be visiting local properties to see if they know anything about this very concerning incident."

County council denies acting unlawfully to derail garden village plans as receivers called in

Claims that the Leader and Chief Executive of Northumberland County Council acted unlawfully to derail a 2,000-home development on the outskirts of Ponteland have been vehemently denied.

Lugano Dissington Estate Limited has served a High Court writ against both the authority and its Leader Coun Peter Jackson, Chief Executive Daljit Lally and the Portfolio Holder for Planning, Housing and Resilience Councillor John Riddle, claiming nearly £10m in damages.

The firm alleges that delays to the planning process caused by "outrageous and arbitrary conduct amounting to misfeasance in public office" by all three have led to serious financial loss and damage.

The particulars of claim set out an alleged chain of events which have led to a breakdown in relations between Lugano and the county council since the local elections in May 2017 which saw a new minority Conservative-led administration take charge.

The previous minority Labour-led administration had signalled support for the Dissington Garden Village scheme, entering into a Planning Performance agreement with Lugano in April 2016 after the Government invited expressions of interest (EOIs) for garden villages. This EOI was submitted by NCC in July 2016.

A hybrid planning application was submitted to NCC in December 2016 for a 2,000-home garden village, which the authority's Strategic Planning Committee said it was 'minded to approve' in March 2017. The following month the Homes and Communities Agency granted £75,000 to NCC to support the development of the project.

The expected process to follow was the completion of a Section 106 legal agreement and the referral of the application to the National Planning Casework Unit as a significant green belt departure, for a decision on whether it was to be called in by the Secretary of State for determination.

The change of leadership at the council led to the withdrawal of the Draft Core Strategy, the long term planning blueprint for the county, which had been submitted to the Government for examination. The replacement Draft Local Plan removed proposals in the previous Core Strategy to delete more than 400 hectares of green belt land including on Dissington Estate, paving the way for new housing development.

The writ alleges that Coun Jackson "wilfully and dishonestly misled" a meeting of the Full Council in July 2017 by stating that the delay caused by withdrawing the Draft Core Strategy would only be two to three months when he had been advised it would be 18 months to two years.

It further alleges that "improper and unlawful pressure" was placed on the then Head of Planning by Coun Riddle and Ms Lally to change the recommendation of the report on the DGV planning application when it came back to committee for redetermination – a result of the changed policy on green belt development.

Defence papers submitted to the High Court on behalf of the authority and the three named individuals categorically deny all the allegations about bullying and misleading councillors and state "... the claim against the Council is... bound to fail".

They also point out that the planning application has not yet gone back to the Strategic Planning Committee for redetermination and that Lugano did not challenge the withdrawal of the Draft Core Strategy by judicial review.

The former Head of Planning left NCC in March 2018. Former Chief Executive Steve Mason had previously left in May 2017 with a compensation payment of £370,000, citing a new political leadership with a "radically different agenda".

Lugano Dissington Estate Limited had purchased the 2,537-acre estate, which has 19 residential properties and six farm steadings, for £18m in 2007 and borrowed £25m in 2016 to discharge debt on the purchase and fund ongoing work promoting the scheme.

The writ claims the credit agreements were entered into with the expectation outline planning permission would be granted by October or November 2017. It states that the estimated value of the estate on receipt of outline planning permission or the adoption of the Core Strategy would have been £190m.

Confirmation of a date for the High Court hearing has not yet been given and both Lugano and NCC say the planning process continues.


In a further twist, Dissington Estate tenants have received a letter saying fixed charge receivers had been appointed for Lugano Dissington Estate Ltd and all rent payments were now to be made to the receivers.

The appointment was made by Topland Jupiter Ltd, the company which Lugano Dissington Estate Ltd entered into a credit agreement with in 2016.

In a statement, Lugano
Developments Ltd said: "The
letters issued to tenants of the
Estate relate to a loan arrangement
between Lugano and our lenders.
The correspondence is as a result
of the lender calling in a technical
clause on the loan document and
discussions are ongoing relating
to the longer-term re-financing (of)
The Estate.

"It is important to emphasise that this has no material bearing on our ability or determination to pursue our case against the individuals on whom we have served proceedings. Indeed, the only likely impact will be to increase the associated damages claim against the parties concerned.

"Lugano Dissington Estate continues as the entity leading in relation to both the Garden Village project and the legal proceedings."

MP slams bank branch closure decision

A decision by Barclays Bank to close its Ponteland branch at the end of January has been slammed by the town's MP.

Guy Opperman said the branch, which is to close on Friday January 25th, was "crucial to Ponteland and the wider community", with more than 150 customers entirely dependent on it.

"Alongside the local county councillors, I have requested an urgent meeting with Barclays in the near future to seek answers, and ask them to reverse this decision," the MP said. He claimed the closure, which will leave the nearest Barclays branch in Westerhope, will mean a journey of more than 40 minutes by public transport and added that access to banking will become even more difficult for those based in more rural areas.

The latest announcement follows the closure of the Barclays branches in Rothbury and Wooler in early November. Last year, Barclays also closed its bank in Amble, while Alnwick lost its HSBC and Yorkshire Building Society branches, and the Bank of Scotland closed in Wooler.

Recent figures from the Office for National Statistics showed that almost a third of the UK's bank and building society branches open in 2010 are now closed, which equates to nearly 6,000 local branches. Around 60 branches are now closing every month.

Consumer group Which called the trend "alarming" and said many people were left without proper access to services. But banks said their branches were losing customers as more people banked online.

In response to the latest bank closure, Newcastle Building Society has delayed plans to refurbish its Darras Hall branch, which had been due to close for around two months at the start of 2019 as part of an ongoing investment programme across its branch network.

The Society decided to push back its plans to create a new open plan branch with improved meeting spaces for both customers and local community groups until later next year, to minimise disruption to local access to financial services.

Customer director Stuart Miller said: "While we're keen to upgrade what's on offer to customers in Ponteland as soon as possible, we felt that the temporary closure of our branch at the same time that Barclays is choosing to move out of the area would cause too much inconvenience all round, so we'll now be keeping things as they are until later in the year.

"We'll let Ponteland customers know once the rearranged dates for the branch refurbishment have been confirmed, and will look forward to introducing them to our modern, open plan branch design later next year."

Ponteland wins Britain in Bloom gold award

Young and old come together to mark 100th anniversary of end of WWI

Young and old from
Ponteland came together in
a set of village events on and
around Remembrance Day,
which this year marked 100
years since the end of the
First World War.

Ponteland Town Council organised a range of activities for all ages, including a war poster competition for school children, grants for tea parties in old people's homes, paying for commemorative kneelers in St Mary's Church, poppy planting throughout the village, Silent Soldiers at the Memorial Hall (one funded by Castle Wardens Lodge) and in the five churches plus Lest We Forget work in schools.

The council's tribute began on November 3rd with a dedication ceremony at the Memorial Hall for a memorial bench donated by the North East War Memorial Project.

A special children's service was held on Friday November 9th attended by pupils from Ponteland Academy, Darras Hall Primary, Richard Coates Primary, Ponteland Primary and Ponteland Private Nursery. Crosses with the names of the 40 Ponteland men killed in the First World War were planted in St Mary's Garden of Remembrance. After the ceremony, wreaths were laid on the three Commonwealth War Graves in St Mary's Churchyard.

The church was open all weekend for residents to see the impressive Remembrance displays.

The Remembrance Day Parade from the leisure centre to the War Memorial was held on Sunday November 11th, with representatives of the Armed Forces, Guides, Scouts, Boys' Brigade, Police,





Fire and Rescue Service and many other organisations led by Deputy Lord Lieutenant Caroline Pryer and the Mayor, Alan Varley.

A special order of service had been produced with pictures of the winning war posters designed by Ponteland and Darras Hall pupils. Two Ponteland High School pupils, Olivia Weedon-Anderson and Charlie Capps read out the names of the 64 men from Ponteland killed in the two World Wars.

On the evening of November 11th, a Celebration of Peace was held on Coates Green, when hundreds of people came together. Lanterns and battery-powered tea lights were handed out and the glow from the lights in the dark helped to create a fitting atmosphere for the celebration. A bugler sounded the Last Post at 6.55pm and the beacon, on the top of St Mary's Church, was lit at 7pm. The church bells were then rung and members of St Mary's Church choir led the singing of war songs with the vicar, the Rev Capt Paul Allinson.

The Mayor, Alan Varley, said:
"Ponteland Town Council was keen
to involve people of all ages in the
Remembrance events and we are
delighted by the reaction to the various

events and activities.

"The Celebration of Peace on Coates Green was a very fitting finale. Hundreds of residents came together and we are grateful to many people, including St Mary's choir and the bell ringers, the bugler and the Beacon lighters. It was wonderful to see so many people coming together to mark this very special occasion.

"I would also like to thank the many shops and businesses for the poppy displays in their windows and on shop fronts."

Response from Ponteland Town Council:

Ponteland Town Council's exhibition of wartime memorabilia was well-received by residents in 2014, but at no time did the Council agree that another very similar exhibition would be held four years later.

Members of the Council would not, could not, and did not make any such commitment for an event so far in the future. It would have been deemed irresponsible to make such a pledge of money and time.

The sub-committee appointed to plan the 2018 commemoration began discussions at the start of this year. Some current Town Council members who were councillors four years ago were consulted about the practicalities and desire to hold another exhibition. It was decided early on that a fresh approach would be sought.

A theme of involving as many people as possible in the commemoration was agreed, with a particular aim of involving children. We have worked to involve all ages and the final commemoration was the Celebration of Peace on Coates Green on the evening of November 11th, which about 400 people attended.

A special children's service was held on November 9th, which all schools attended, when crosses were planted by the children in memory of the 40 Ponteland men who died in the First World War. The names of the dead from both World Wars were read out by High School students at the War Memorial on November 11th.

The youth of 100 years ago gave their todays for the tomorrows of our children and grandchildren. Educating the children of today will help to ensure that Ponteland does not forget. We will remember them.

New long stay disc parking planned for Merton Way

New restrictions on long stay parking are to be introduced in Ponteland to stop the misuse of car parks behind Merton Way. Some drivers had been leaving their cars parked for several days or even weeks, and the new regime will see disc parking introduced. The Town Council is canvassing local businesses to establish who is willing to sell the discs, which will enable parking of up to 24 hours at a time. Anyone caught abusing the new system will be subject to a fine. All parking in the recently extended car park will remain free of charge. The Highways Working Party, which met on October 12th, also discussed the extension of the decorative swan neck light columns and the possibility of providing a bus shelter at Broadway. Both will be considered for the budget for 2019-20.

Thanks to all who contributed to Britain in Bloom award

The Council is delighted to have received a gold award in the small town category for Britain in Bloom 2018. The presentation was made at an awards ceremony held in Belfast on October 19th which the Chairman of the Council's Environment Working Party Councillor Christine Caisley and Iain Clough, the council's gardening contractor, attended. The Council wishes to thank everyone involved in the competition, including lain and fellow contractors Michael Champion, Jim Scott and Derek and Calum Sherlock; the many sponsors and volunteers; Northumberland

County Council's Neighbourhood Services Team; Town Council staff; and Joyce Butcher, Robin Ramsay and David Goodchild, who had helped so much with the competition entry. The Council was also successful in the Northumbria in Bloom competition, winning a gold award in the same category for the seventh consecutive year.

Northumberland County Council report

Councillor Richard Dodd reported that the County Council was to receive an additional £7.7m to deal with potholes in the county. He is also to look into redundant bus stops on Thornhill Road being used to provide additional parking bays. Coun Dodd also reported that work was to start on the new school and leisure complex on November 26th, following a consultation held on November 13th on the proposed new fire station on Callerton Lane.

Grant applications

The Council approved a grant of £1,500 for Dalton Village Hall, and of £200 to Richard Coates School's PTA - the final part of the funding required to ensure a book on the history of the school could be published by a local resident.

This report is based on the minutes of the Town Council meeting held on November 14th.



Be safety and security aware during dark nights

As the dark nights are now upon us this can mean a time of increased crime, therefore please be safety and security aware.

I recommend that when out leave lights on at the front and rear of your house and even a radio to create a feeling that someone is home. Timer switches are an excellent security measure to prevent you forgetting to put the lights on before you leave the house.

If you have a house alarm please use it and, if you do hear an alarm sounding, do not hesitate to report this to police. Ensure doors and windows are locked, do not leave keys in locks and keep house and vehicle keys out of view. If you are going on holiday, do not advertise this on social media.

Scam phone calls

I have had further reports of scam phone calls from offenders stating they are from HMRC and selling shares. These are real examples of how an offender may gain your trust in order to fraudulently take money from you. Do not give out your personal details including your name, address, bank details and do not make any money transactions over the phone or online

if you have not verified the receiver/organisation. If in any doubt contact your bank, someone you know and trust, as well as the police on 101 or, if in an emergency, 999.

I was kindly invited to talk about safety at Richard Coates CE Primary School to a lovely class of Year 1 children as part of their emergency services week. We had an excellent discussion on stranger danger and what is a "safe stranger". The children displayed very good knowledge of how to stay safe as well and then entertained me with their question and answer session. The afternoon was finished off with a look at the police car; I can confidently say they thoroughly enjoyed using the lights and sirens multiple times! Old newspaper gives us the headlines from 1991

One of the forerunners to Pont News & Views has been sent to us by a reader who found it clearing an old drawer.

Under the scary headline 'Heads roll in Ponteland', the lead story in Edition 11 of the Pont & Darras Post from autumn 1991 was about the appointment of a new headmaster at Ponteland High School.

Irish ex-Royal Navy and BBC engineer John Foster was replacing former soldier Pip Appleby after his retirement following 19 years at the school.

Other stories featured included a report on a ceremony at County Hall where dignatories from a number of European countries were entertained by pupils including a choral group from Ponteland Middle and High Schools.

Parliamentary candidates for the Hexham constituency were making early pitches in advance of the 1992 general election.

Younger correspondents had written in calling for a motorbike/mountain bike dirt track and subsidised public transport.

Meanwhile Ponteland's new swimming pool was being billed as 'long awaited leisure luxury'.

There are also several familiar names among the local firms advertising, including Panache, Ponteland Print, Steven & Wade Optometrists, and Bonner & White.

The publication was produced by the Sunderland Echo in conjunction with Ponteland Middle School.







Young volunteers help enhance wildlife corridor

Thirty young people planted 1,500 bulbs and flowers in the latest stage of the revamp of the old railway line from Rotary Way towards the Airport.

The wild daffodils, snowdrops and wild primroses were planted by Air Cadets, Scouts and Explorer Scouts, alongside a litter pick over four days in late September and October.

The volunteering by the Air Cadets will contribute towards their Participation in Public Events award and the Scouts and Explorer Scouts can use the work for their Duke of Edinburgh Gold and Platinum award.
