

£10m legal battle dropped by garden

village developers

A High Court case against Northumberland County Council over plans for a 2,000-home development on the outskirts of Ponteland has been dropped.

Last August Lugano
Dissington Estate Limited
served a High Court writ
against both the authority
and its Leader Coun Peter
Jackson, Chief Executive
Daljit Lally and the Portfolio
Holder for Planning, Housing
and Resilience Councillor
John Riddle, claiming nearly
£10m in damages.

The firm alleged that delays to the planning process caused by "outrageous and arbitrary conduct amounting to misfeasance in public office" by all three had led to serious financial loss and damage.

The writ claimed the credit agreements were entered into with the expectation outline planning permission would be granted for the Dissington Garden Village scheme by October or November 2017. It stated that the estimated value of the estate on receipt of outline planning permission or the adoption of the Core Strategy would have been £190m.

The county council had consistently denied the allegations of misconduct, describing them as "inappropriate, untrue and defamatory" and saying senior officers and politicians were "appalled" and "astounded" they were made public.



It now says it will pursue Lugano for "very substantial legal costs".

The dropping of the legal action follows a decision by Lugano to withdraw its planning application for the Garden Village scheme, which had been due to go back to the County Council's Strategic Planning Committee in February.

The authority's previous minority Labour-led administration had signalled support for the scheme, entering into a Planning Performance agreement with Lugano in April 2016 after the Government invited expressions of interest (EOIs) for garden villages. The EOI was submitted by NCC in July 2016.

A hybrid planning application was then submitted to NCC in December 2016 for a 2,000-home garden village, which the authority's Strategic Planning Committee said it was 'minded to approve' in March 2017. The following month the Homes and Communities Agency granted £75,000 to NCC to support the development of the project.

But following the election of a new Conservative-led minority administration in 2017 which had the protection of green belt as a key campaign pledge, the long term planning strategy for the county – the Core Strategy – was withdrawn.

The replacement Draft Local Plan removed its proposals to delete more than 400 hectares of green belt land including on Dissington Estate, paving the way for new housing development. NCC said the policy change, which proposed 7,000 fewer new homes across the county over the next two decades, had necessitated redetermination of the planning application.

Lugano Dissington Estate Limited had purchased the 2,537-acre estate, which has 19 residential properties and six farm steadings, for £18m in 2007 and borrowed £25m in 2016 to discharge debt on the purchase and fund ongoing work promoting the scheme.

Last September Dissington
Estate tenants received a
letter saying fixed charge
receivers had been
appointed for Lugano
Dissington Estate Ltd and all
rent payments were now to
be made to the receivers.

The appointment was made by Topland Jupiter Ltd, the company which Lugano Dissington Estate Ltd entered into a credit agreement with in 2016. Lugano Developments Ltd said the letter related to a loan arrangement between Lugano and its lenders. The Estate now has new owners, LDE Ltd.

Pont News first featured Alison Guadagno last October after she completed the Great North Run with 14 friends, all in fancy dress as Incredibles superhero mum Elastigirl.

Twelve of the 15 women live in Ponteland and the idea for the group running together dressed as the Incredibles came from their regular morning runs followed by coffee and cake at Davidson of Darras Hall – hence their nickname 'the Cappuccino Crew'.

But despite her tumour returning after initial treatment last year, and needing intensive chemotherapy, Alison, 44, is now taking on the London Marathon on Sunday April 28th. She is being accompanied by her sister Caroline Gregory and three friends Joanne Brown, Elspeth Aspinall and Nichola Conlon.

Alison, a doctor at the Great North Children's Hospital, has a charity place from Brain Research UK, Caroline is running for Get Kids going and Nichola is running for Meningitis Now. Between them they need to raise £8,000 to meet the minimum amount required by their respective charities.

But they are already way past that target following a hugely successful fundraising event on Saturday March 9th at the Falcons' ground, Kingston Park, which has so far raised £18,500 with more donations still coming.

The event was hosted by Alison and her Incredibles runners and featured a 'Hit and Miss' music game with a Sonos speaker for the winner, a silent auction and grand auction.

Local businesses made very generous donations of prizes for the auctions and raffle. The auction prizes featured a Ford Ka, donated by We Buy Cars For More, a helicopter flight from Northumbria Helicopters and an original oil painting by Ruth Bond.

The fundraising activities were rounded off with a performance by Dan Hadfield, a Gary Barlow tribute act.

Incredibles group member Andrea Banner said: "Ali's determination to continue with her running and fundraising is remarkable in the face of the devastating news that the tumour has returned and has necessitated a course of intensive chemotherapy."

New fire station gets green light

Plans for a new state-of-theart fire station and training facility for Ponteland have been given the green light.

The proposal for land to the west of Ponteland High School on Callerton Lane received unanimous approval from Northumberland County Council's Strategic Planning Committee at its March meeting.

The development will create a singlestorey, seven-metre-high fire station, a 14-metre-high training tower, a drill yard to the rear of the site, and parking for up to 13 cars.

The existing fire station is being demolished as part of wider plans to free-up land for a new £42m combined primary and high school and leisure facility.

Concerns had been expressed about the loss of mature trees to make way for the new fire station. John Hague, of Ponteland Civic Society, had addressed the meeting to express concerns about the green belt and the impact on what is a designated 'green approach' to the town.

He said: "It would inflict serious damage on the existing landscape scene. It has to be located elsewhere, it has to be put in another location."

But Coun Christine Caisley, of Ponteland Town Council, accepted there were very special circumstances as there is nowhere else in the town to locate the fire station. And after the meeting, Ponteland North county councillor Richard Dodd welcomed the decision, saying: "It's much needed and imagine the howls that would happen if we weren't replacing it."

He added that any trees lost would be replaced in a town which is 'one of the leafiest places in the north of England'.



The war of words continues as a developer drops its legal action against the county council over the Garden Village plans...

Apology needed after "humiliating defeat" for developer

The summary dropping of all legal action must amount to the most humiliating admission of defeat by Lugano.

All along there was no foundation for their wild and unsubstantiated allegations against councillors, council staff and the county council itself, all of whom have just been carrying out their proper functions.

The particularly vitriolic and personal statements from the Lugano directors Richard Robson and Allan Rankin have been shown to be indefensible and without foundation. They should publicly apologise without delay.

Despite all of the bullying tactics and threats and all of the money thrown at this huge development by a foreign registered company, Lugano Dissington have finally come to the conclusion that their planning case is so weak that it has little chance of progressing and further that there was little chance of success with their flimsy and unfounded legal action against us.

This Dissington scheme was always a brazen attempt to build on hundreds of acres of valued green belt, changing our countryside for ever. It never did meet all of the criteria to qualify as a Garden Village proposal. Their crude attempts to bully both council members and officers who have been doing their proper jobs, has failed dramatically.

Lugano's claims through the Council's standards procedure have been found to be lacking in substance and evidence and have been ruled out. And now they have withdrawn any attempt at court action as they finally accepted that there was every prospect that it would have been struck out at the first hearing.

This has been a long saga which has concerned many in the local community. They will be delighted that the planning system in Northumberland has been shown to be both robust and fair, not bending to the demands of the large developers, treating all applications

according to clear criteria without fear or favour. The green belt has been preserved in the face of rapacious and unjustified development.

Not only will my lawyers be pursuing Lugano Dissington Ltd for the very substantial legal costs which have been incurred in defending against their ridiculous claims, but the very least all involved deserve is a clear and unreserved apology for all of the personal upset they have caused not just to ourselves but to the wider community of Ponteland.

Of course it is open for him to sue me but I doubt very much that he will, as he knows fine well I can prove it."

The Cross of Jesus: The Logo of Love

In our modern world we are often able to identify companies and organisations from their corporate logo.

These can help us to recognise something about them and the ethos that they wish to communicate. In correspondence I receive I'm struck by the huge variety of ecclesiastical logos.

A Newcastle Parish has multi-coloured hands joined in friendship which tells a powerful story. Our own Parish Crest celebrates our long association with Merton College, Oxford (we have just concluded our 750 Year Anniversary Celebrations).

Central to this however, both in our own 'brand-logo' and more widely is the Cross - the ultimate and universal logo of Christianity. The image of a form of horrendous torture may seem both shocking and inappropriate. But that is the point!

In the blood, pain and passion. In the crown of thorns and nails. In the tears and terror. God reveals his Love most fully. Without Calvary there can be no Easter. So we must avoid the tendency to sanitise and sentimentalise the events of Holy Week. For in it God gives himself in all the brokenness of humanity in order to conquer sin and death forever.

The Cross is still today a symbol that challenges and unnerves. Although in many contexts it is removed from the public arena it remains timeless, powerful and true – reminding us of the Easter Message that 'God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life'. (John 3:16 NRSV)

In this we can all rejoice in the Easter Hope. Alleluia Christ Is Risen. He is Risen Indeed! Alleluia.

New weekly walking group launched in Ponteland

A new weekly walking group is being launched in May to help the people of Ponteland get fitter, healthier and happier.

The new group is part of Walking for Health, a national network of more than 350 local walking groups.

Its launch follows an appeal by local resident Gordon Allan earlier this year to establish a team of trained volunteers to run the Walking for Health walks in Ponteland.

Starting on the May 7th, the walks will take place every Tuesday, meeting at 10.30am at Ponteland Leisure Centre.

The walks are open to everyone and are designed to last between an hour and an hour-and-a-half. People who want gentle exercise, enjoy being outdoors and want to explore the local network of excellent footpaths and bridleways are all invited.

The walks are also a great way to meet new people or socialise with friends. The routes are all on good footpaths and require no specialist equipment other than a pair of stout walking shoes/ trainers and a jacket to keep you warm and dry.

They have been designed for men and women who want to be more active or to provide a step down for people whose level of fitness has declined due to injury, illness or age.

Walking alone, particularly on quiet footpaths, can be a barrier for many people and the walks overcome that by providing an opportunity for people to walk together and to meet new friends. The walk volunteers will make sure everyone is safe and nobody gets left behind. Assistance dogs only.

Latest news from onteland Town Council

New technology to prioritise roads which flood for gully cleansing

New technology is to be used to prioritise roads in Ponteland susceptible to blockages and subsequent flooding for gully cleansing. The county's Highways Manager told the Town Council's Highways Working Party that a new digital audit processing system was being introduced which will provide information regarding recommended cycles for areas in order of priority. The Mayor also reported on a recent useful meeting he had had with the Highways Manager to discuss various problem areas in and around the centre of Ponteland.

New lighting planned for Thornhill Road toilet block

Lighting is to be installed on the toilet block on Thornhill Road on a timer to improve lighting levels in the car park, subject to consultation with the county's planning department. The decision followed a recommendation from the Environment Working Party which had met on February 18th and is subject to consultation as the toilets are in the conservation area.

Temporary Callerton Lane play area due to open for Easter

Work is to start shortly on the temporary play area that is being provided whilst the work on the school and leisure complex is carried out. It is to be located adjacent to the entrance to the school overflow car park and will contain six items of equipment. It is hoped that the area will be completed by Easter.

Grant applications

Grants of £600 to the Darras Hall Estate Committee to assist with their work on the upkeep and maintenance of the bridle path and £700 to the North East War Memorials Project to assist with their fundraising to replace outdated technology were approved. The NEWM Project has carried out a lot of work relating to the research and cataloguing of the war memorials in Ponteland. Councillors deferred consideration of a donation to Northumberland Pride to the April meeting and asked the Clerk to find out where other events were being held and other sources of funding. Remaining funds in the small grants budget would be carried forward to 2019-20.

£345m funding deal announced

A £345m funding deal which will increase job opportunities, lead to additional tourism, improve digital connectivity and unlock investment in towns has been announced by the UK and Scottish Governments. The Borderlands Partnership is a collaboration between the five cross-border local authorities - Carlisle City Council, Cumbria County Council, Dumfries and Galloway Council, Northumberland County Council and Scottish Borders Council. Ponteland county councillor Veronica Jones also reported on a 'Daily Mile' initiative being introduced in local schools. This will see pupils walking a mile each day to improve their health and wellbeing, with 37 schools in the county agreeing to take part.

Monthly healthy checks are being launched at Ponteland Primary Care Centre in a new initiative designed to encourage and support healthy living.

Ponteland Community Partnership is starting the 'monthly drop-in' at the GP practice on Meadowfield Industrial Estate in April. It will be held from 2pm to 3.45pm on the second Friday of each month.

This facility will be manned by a medical professional available to check blood pressure and weight. No appointment is required, but it is stressed this is not a substitute for a GP appointment.

The monthly drop-in will encourage and support healthy living in a one to one environment and signpost individuals to local services for the patients' benefit.

The service, funded by the Community Foundation's 'Out and About' fund, fits outside the NHS but will be hosted by the White Medical Group for all residents over the age of 18 and those who work in Ponteland.

On arrival, attendees will be greeted at the entrance of the Medical Centre by representatives of the Community Partnership and taken to the waiting area.

A simple record card will be supplied to bring back on any further visits but you will not be required to give any personal details; this is purely anonymous.

Residents warned of another Council Tax scam

The Trading Standards team at Northumberland County Council has received a number of complaints about telephone calls and text messages where the caller claims that the resident can have their Council Tax band reassessed upon payment of £150.

They claim to be acting on behalf of Northumberland County Council but in reality they are not.

If residents wish to have their Council Tax band assessed, they can do so, free of charge, by contacting The Valuation Office Agency via gov.uk/government/organisations/valuation-office-agency or using details on a previous or current Council Tax bill.
