# Seven jobs saved as nursery reopens after takeover

## A Ponteland nursery has reopened and seven jobs saved after a successful takeover.

Park House Nursery at Pont Park closed in April after 25 years, with the loss of around a dozen jobs, after the owners decided to retire.

But Izzie Wright, whose parents Tim and Alison already run six nurseries in Lincolnshire employing more than 100 staff, heard about the closure and decided to make enquiries about the potential for reopening under a new name and management.

After successful negotiations the lease started on June 1st. Five weeks and £50,000 later, Park Farm Day Nursery opened after a refurbishment programme led by Izzie's partner Alfy.

It has included a repaint of the entire premises, replacement of all flooring and creation of new spaces including an office, staff room and dining room.

Seven of the staff from Park House have been re-employed - five practitioners, a manager and a cook, and there are plans to expand the team as new children arrive.

Izzie, mum to three year old Alfred, said: "The setting is beautiful, with views across open countryside and regular trips to the nursery boundary to visit the cows and sheep.

"There is already a lovely outdoor garden but we have created an additional stimulating outdoor area in what was the redundant courtyard. It has been paved for bikes, trikes and patio games and a bark area for climbing frames, mud kitchen, climbing tyres and pirate ships. "We have created an outdoor area specifically for babies, laid with soft astroturf for lots of opportunities for floor play and sensory stimulation. We have two barns and plan to create a play barn filled with hay bales to climb on, zip wires, ladders and planks, and to have chickens, rabbits, guinea pigs and hamsters in the other."

Park Farm Day Nursery is offering extending open hours from 7am - 7pm from September to accommodate the shift patterns of NHS staff and airport and emergency service workers. With a capacity of 52 children aged from six weeks to five years, it is open 51 weeks of the year and offers two, three and four year old funding sessions.

A mosaic commemorating the tercentenary of a Ponteland school can now be seen in its full glory after the intervention of a local craftsman.

For Alan Mee has created this stunning wooden framework for the artwork marking the 300 years of Coates School, which has been fitted to the original building.

Friend Geoff Taylor said: "A couple of days ago we met him there by chance and I took his photo with it. Alan is a craftsman and the frame is wonderful - it is the whole thing, the legs to the ground and the gravel base too."

Tyneside shipwright Richard Coates' financial legacy in 1719 led to the founding of the school which carries his name.

Shortly before his death at the age of 46, Richard ensured provision was made in his will to set up a trust to pay for the schooling of poor children in the town, with funding coming from rents on properties he owned in Newcastle.

After his death his wife Barbara, who was from Ponteland, carried out his wishes and ensured the school was built and its pupils furnished with clothing and facilities to support their learning through an education trust which also still exists.

Opened in around 1727, the school expanded to have two floors in its first location so that boys and girls could be taught separately. It later moved to what is now Ponteland's Coates Green, then to Thornhill Road as a comprehensive school, before changing to a middle school and now a primary.

Today the building is home to the Sanderson Young estate agency, bearing the commemorative artwork created by pupils and Northumberland artist Simon Terry.

# MP tells of grief after loss of twins

Ponteland's MP Guy Opperman has told of his grief and sadness after the loss of his twin boys within hours of their birth.

The Pensions Minister, who married Flora in June 2017, said their son Teddy died soon after his birth on June 20th and his brother Rafe, born 48 hours later, died on June 23rd in Flora's arms.

In a series of poignant tweets, the MP wrote: "Sadly, just over a week ago we lost our twin boys. Teddy came and went from this world quickly and quietly. He passed peacefully. Our younger twin, Rafe, was not born until Tuesday 23rd, but died later that day in Neonatal ICU.

"Baby loss, and coping with grief, is very hard. Nothing we could do. Just a horrible tragedy. We emerged from hospital a week ago shell shocked.

"We have taken some time out to recover. I am back at work part time, but bear with me. We will come through this, but will always miss our boys.

"The loss of our younger twin Rafe was particularly acute. He lived and died within a long day. But we treasure our time with him in Neonatal ICU. We were able to tell him of all our hopes and dreams for him, and our family; but he could not make it and died in Flora's arms."

Referring to the Buddhist concept of life and death being like a wave, Mr Opperman – Hexham MP since 2010 - added: "The Wave quote is a good description of this awful process, and an acceptance of life passing. You never regret trying to have children.

"Sometimes baby loss happens. We will never forget our boys. They will be with us always. Just sadly only in their spirit and their memory."

Tributes poured in from MPs on all sides of the House of Commons after the couple's tweets about the tragedy. Former Cabinet minister David Lidington said: "Guy, you and Flora are in my thoughts and prayers. My heartfelt and unreserved sympathy for you both."

Labour MP Jess Phillips added: "Guy there is nothing to say that could show the magnitude of sorrow I hope you can feel us all across the House feeling for you and your family. Much love."

Flora has launched a fundraising campaign for research into Preterm premature rupture of the membranes (PPROM), a complication in which the amniotic sac surrounding the baby breaks before week 37 of pregnancy.

She wrote on the Justgiving page: "This will hopefully prevent other families experiencing the same pain. We are so grateful for the care we received from the NHS and we want to ensure that the learnings from our experience are as widely

accessible as possible. We intend this fund to be used for research into identifying and preventing PPROM.

"We are very grateful to Sands and the bereavement team at our hospitals for their sensitive and thoughtful care we received. We will always be considering ways that we can help extend their expertise and compassion to more families in need."

# Speeding drivers and anti-social youths warned

#### **Drugs**

Officers have been conducting regular patrols in Darras Hall following reports made by residents of suspicious vehicles in the area. On one such patrol, we conducted a search of a vehicle parked late at night on Old Station Court and found cannabis inside. This was seized and the driver was given a warning. We will continue to patrol the area both in uniform and in plain clothes to deter such behaviour. Residents are asked to continue to be vigilant and report any suspicious activity to police.

#### Anti-social behaviour

Your local policing team has been conducting regular patrols in recent weeks in order to tackle anti-social behaviour by youths in the area of the schools on Callerton Lane, the nursery site on Callerton Lane and in the wooded area between Limestone Lane and Richmond Way. These patrols will continue for some time and police will deal robustly with any individuals identified as causing regular issues. I would ask parents and guardians to be wary regarding the whereabouts of their children, especially on weekends and in the evenings.

#### **Speeding**

We have received numerous reports of speeding, particularly on Cheviot View, North Road and on Berwick Hill Road. We are asking motorists, specifically those on motorcycles, to be wary of their speed. Police will be continuing to conduct Speedwatch patrols in the coming weeks and will take robust action in regards to any motorists not adhering to speed limits or committing other traffic offences.

# More than 30 firms benefit from Town Council emergency fund

More than 30 Ponteland businesses have benefited from an emergency fund which provided urgent support to local firms affected by the Covid-19 crisis.

The Town Council initiative was designed to complement the range of support available from the Government, Northumberland County Council and other organisations.

It provided eligible applicants with nonrepayable grants of up to £500 within ten days to cover the additional costs of making their businesses Covid-19 health and safety compliant.

The one off capital grant fund was aimed at sole traders and independent companies, helping them to build business resilience and safeguard jobs as well as purchasing protective equipment.



Town Councillor Adam Shanley (pictured), who proposed the fund, said: "The Town Council is really proud to support local businesses in Ponteland through what are unquestionably very worrying and uncertain times.

"This fund was specifically aimed at helping businesses build a resilience to Covid-19, to help them with the additional costs of things such as the purchase of PPE, protective screening, hand sanitisers and also to provide the

public with some level of reassurance when visiting businesses.

"I was delighted when the Council committed this budget to give businesses that much needed shot in the arm and get footfall back to Ponteland in as safe a manner as possible. ### This tip is (almost) guaranteed to help many people get a better return on their investments!

'Too good to be true!' I hear the sceptical voices cry. So what is this fantastic investment? An HP 10bII+ Financial Calculator (£28 from Amazon).

This will calculate compound interest and therefore the effect of charges on your investment returns. Product provider illustrations will also show these but, due to the length of the documents, in my experience not many people read them. I also think that the impact has more effect if you calculate them yourself.

Our research suggests that many advisers charge 3% of the investment for initial advice and 1% ongoing\* and, when added to product and fund

charges, the annual cost can often total 2.3% or more. What is the effect of these charges compared to a time costed fee of (for example) £1,000 and total annual charges of 1.3%?

Let's assume an investment (pension or unit trust) of £100,000 over 20 years and an average annual growth rate of 5%.

The higher charges would provide a final value of £165,264, whereas the alternative would be £204,743. That is almost 24% more!

The figures look even more depressing if you then take inflation into account, assuming this averages 2.5% (the Financial Conduct Authority's recommended assumption). The first option would provide £100,954, the lower charged option £125,675.

Who is making the most money from your money?

'Ah!', but the investment industry exclaims: 'You get what you pay for and we'll get you better returns – we can beat 5% and we provide good value for money.' But will they?

Always remember that while charges are guaranteed, performance is not, and who is to judge what is value for money - the adviser or the client?

And if you think these returns are bad, consider a deposit account paying 1.5% over the same period. After inflation, the £100,000 would be worth £81,790 in current values!

In my next article, I'll look at investment returns and the myths the investment industry creates.

# Car parking fines wrongly issued at Memorial Hall

Motorists were wrongly issued with fines within weeks of a new car park charging regime being introduced at the Memorial Hall.

A number of users of the car park who had registered with the good2go website were incorrectly given penalty notices between June 17th and 23rd.

Hall trustees have pledged that all will be rescinded and apologised for the error.

Chairman Robin Ramsay said: "It has come to our attention that a number of charge notices have been issued to car park users who had already registered with good2go. Following discussions with ParkingEye, they are now in the process of rescinding these notices.

"It is understood that this fault has now been rectified and for all who have registered with good2 park please do not pay the charge for the period 17th June to 23rd June.



"The Memorial Hall Trustees apologise for the concern and inconvenience these incorrect charges have caused."

The debacle has caused quite a stir on social media. Carrie Fuller wrote on the Darras Hall Facebook group: "The Parking Eye said I had been there ten minutes longer than my hour ticket stated. I've appealed it as it took me ten minutes to sort the kids out and get a ticket. What a joke!"

Michelle Smith Vigurs added: "Don't use the car park - system has fined so many honest people." And Paul Jones wrote: "Some people including myself had two fines in one week. I appealed...and Parking Eye sent a letter confirming cancelled fines. I... won't use the car park again as I have no confidence in the system. Appears many are doing the same which is a shame."

Anyone who has been wrongly given a ticket and not yet been notified it has been withdrawn should notify the Hall at info@pontelandmemorialhall.com giving their name, reference number, car plate number and the date of the alleged offence which are shown on the notice.

A copy or original notice should also be delivered to Mr Ramsay at 11a The Rise, Darras Hall, if possible.

In April, trustees issued a desperate plea for donations, describing the venue's financial situation as "precarious". They said that with the lockdown forcing closure, all usual income from user groups ceased and after nearly 100 years the hall's continued existence was under real threat

#### Grasslands article very much welcomed

I applaud the coverage in your July 2020 issue given to the area known as the Grasslands under the heading 'Project captures history of hidden gem'.

Your readers may be interested in the most significant milestone of the management of this land by its designation as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). In the early 1980s this area was known as the recreation ground and contained a football pitch.

I recall as a member of Darras Hall Estate Committee, possibly in 1982, volunteering to erect a replacement goal post which had been purchased by the committee.

A contentious issue then arose. DHEC resolved to consider the sale of some or all of the land, with the proceeds of the sale used to finance the Committee's running costs and reduce or eliminate the rent charges.

At this time the recreation ground was not the only large area of this type of grassland in Darras Hall. An undeveloped area between Collingwood Crescent and Eastern Way, which was reserved for educational use, was no longer required and was sold off for housing, generating substantial income for the owner.

This probably seeded the idea that the estate committee should consider a similar approach to the recreation ground, which received strong opposition - particularly from adjacent owners.

The predecessor of Natural England expressed an interest in the special environmental quality of this area and in 1984 designated it an SSSI. They also recommended a management plan that would replicate the animal grazing of years gone by.

A recreation ground sub-committee was formed which I was invited to chair. Information was gathered and many problems and representations were received. The issue was reported back to the main committee and, much to my relief, the issue of the sale of the land was dropped.

It would appear from your photograph that this asset remains largely as intended in 1984, and remains for the mutual enjoyment of all Darras Hall owners who have an equal entitlement to share the value of this environmental treasure.

Darras Hall residents geographically remote from the grassland may not know of its existence or the significance of its SSSI designation, and the publicity you have given to the area is very much to be welcomed.

The public areas to the Crescent have progressed well, with the finishing works advancing at a good pace. August will see the commencement of the installation of the specialist leisure offerings, such as the Clip 'n' Climb and Soft Play areas.

Works have progressed well within the Pool Hall with the completion of the backfill to the swimming pool tanks – main and learner pools – and the completion of the pool deck areas and Aqua Play slab. Once complete, the finishing works will be advanced to the Pool Hall ahead of the installation of the pool liners and height adjustable floor in September.

The external areas have advanced through the month, with works progressing well to the hard landscaping finishes between the teaching wings, as well as the Crescent Park to the front of the building facing on to Callerton Lane. Works have also progressed well to the northern section of the South Car Park.

The ongoing works to the Bridle Path have also made good progress, with the installation of the piers to support the pedestrian bridge installed, ready for the bridge lift in early August. This was originally set for mid-July however, works to energise the new substation for the building meant that this had to be reassessed.

Works have progressed for the formation of the new sports pitches with the earthworks now at an advanced stage. The works for the construction of the 3G sports pitch and the MUGA's will progress through August and September, in order that they are complete for the opening of the campus later in the year.

Through August, the external areas will continue to be progressed with the landscaping, completion of the bridge to the Primary School, and works to the South Car Park and the new Play Park adjacent to Callerton Lane, next to the end of the Bridleway.

WWII pilot who survived crash landing celebrates 100th birthday

A former WWII pilot who recovered from being shot down by the Luftwaffe has celebrated his 100th birthday with his family.

Ralph Brumwell signed up as a volunteer reserve pilot in 1939, learning to fly at the aircraft training centre at Hamble, Hampshire. He went on to fly for RAF Bomber Command from Redhill and Brize Norton before joining 218 Sqn at Harwell. Oxfordshire.

In 1941, whilst flying a Wellington, Ralph was shot down by a Junkers 88 and crash landed near Marham, Norfolk. After recovering from the injuries sustained he transferred to light aircraft duties at Newmarket, later joining 75 New Zealand Sqn at Mepal near Ely.

Ralph was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for 30 successful sorties over Germany. After leaving the RAF, Ralph joined aerial photography company Hunting Aerosurveys in 1954 before starting his career as a passenger jet pilot at Leeds Bradford Airport.

It was here he met Bradfordian Irene, who was working as an airline ground receptionist. The couple were married for more than 55 years before the former Mayor of Castle Morpeth's death in December 2018 aged 84.

The couple, who had three children and five grandchildren, moved to Darras Hall in the early 1970s when Ralph transferred to Newcastle Airport. He retired from BA in 1980, aged 60.

He celebrated his 100th birthday on July 24th with family at home.

Eldest daughter Jane said: "Dad has lived a very happy life in Ponteland for the best part of 50 years and we thought it would be lovely to feature his 100th birthday in Pont News."

# Covid-19 group closes down after four months of volunteering

A group of volunteers set up to help people during the lockdown has announced it is winding down.

Ponteland Community Group said it was stopping all its Covid-19 support on Friday July 31st.

The group was set up at the start of the Covid-19 lockdown in March to assist local residents who needed a little extra support. Since then the group has worked with the Northumberland Community Response Team and local GP practices to help people in need.

Run entirely by local volunteers, during the past four months it has helped more than 170 local households, around 250 residents, enabling people who were required to self isolate or shield to stay safe and reduce their risk of infection.

Joint organiser Dr Ela Akay said: "More than 150 local residents across all age groups came forward to offer their services. The dedication, enthusiasm and hard work of the volunteers, enabled the Group to provide a wide range of services to local residents and the wider region.

"As well as providing day to day support the volunteers were there to help people who have been bereaved, taken ill or been discharged from hospital (none of which was due to Covid-19)."

The volunteers' achievements included:

 1,000 food deliveries to local households - 15,000 individual food items picked, packed and delivered by volunteers



- 170 local households supported with food deliveries, errands, regular phone calls and many more small acts of kindness
- 46 emergency food deliveries to local residents, using food parcels of essential items donated by Waitrose
- 26 prescriptions delivered to patients on behalf of Ponteland and White GP practices
- Easter art competition for children judged by BBC children's presenter
- Website launched providing advice on Covid-19 and local information on physical and mental health, online delivery services, local businesses, homeschooling activities and events and activities
- 15,000 donated food items distributed to communities in SE Northumberland

- 1,200 donated toiletry bags given to local NHS hospitals, hospices and women's refuges
- 2,200 wash bags donated to the NHS, local care homes and charities
- 400 premature baby clothes and hearts knitted and donated to the RVI.

Dr Akay added: "Ponteland Community Group would like to thank all its enthusiastic, caring and dedicated volunteers. Without the volunteers, lockdown would have been an anxious and difficult time for so many people.

"A special thank you must go to the 14 volunteer zone leaders, the Waitrose picking and delivery teams and the people who acted as collection points and delivery drivers for our food and toiletry bag appeals. You have all been amazing.

"It has been inspiring to see the community coming together to help people in need; all those individual and collective acts of kindness have made a difference. It has been greatly appreciated by all those that have received your help.

"The group would also like to thank everyone who donated to its appeals and the local businesses who supported them. We owe a special thanks to the staff and management at Waitrose Ponteland and the Hilton Doubletree Hotel, as without their support it would have been impossible to achieve everything."

### Flower bed planted to mark Ponteland WI's centenary


A raised flower bed has been planted by the Town Council to mark the centenary of Ponteland WI.

# Charity champ writes final chapter on fundraising decade

#### Ponteland charity champ Bruce Grant is writing the final chapter on his decade of fundraising.

For the 93-year-old, a regular sight with his collection tin in Ponteland, Morpeth, Hexham, Kingston Park and Eldon Square in Newcastle, has written an autobiography on his eventful life on land, air and sea.

Called 'Flying by the seat of my pants', it describes childhood escapades during a rural upbringing in north-east Scotland, the highs and lows of a career in the Armed Services and industry, and the airborne charity stunt that led to a three month stint in Strangeways Prison!

The grandfather-of-five, of Old Station Court, Darras Hall, received a British Empire Medal in last year's Queen's Birthday Honours for his work with the Pont Charity Group and had been invited to a garden party at Buckingham Palace in May. Sadly a combination of Covid-19 lockdown and ill health prevented that engagement.

Bruce, a former engineer, began fundraising in 2010 through church. During the past three years, he has

collected for Newcastle People's Kitchen, West End Food Bank, West End Refugee Service, Benwell Cornerstone Project, Children North East, Percy Hedley Foundation and the Great North Air Ambulance Service.

This year he has been collecting for the Royal Society for Blind Children and Tynedale Hospice at Home. He has raised over £100,000 for good causes – including more than £70,000 for seven North East charities in the last three years alone.

Bruce said: "Very recently I survived 'expected death' through a drug fed direct to my stomach. On recovery, it brought home that I should finalise outstanding charity work today, not tomorrow.

"The remaining charity work covers the sale of my book – outlining my life. It is not a professional book – it was produced due to a guest's request at one of my early charity concerts. As such it is just a collection of tales from boyhood, life at sea and in industry.

"In fairness it has produced a great deal of interest in an unusual life but I have no doubt many would prefer to read 'professional' finish books – not those of




a rank amateur who left school nearly 80 years ago using slates!"
