A Ponteland couple who met after serving in the Royal Navy at the end of World War Two were delighted to receive a card from the Queen, marking their 71st wedding anniversary.

John and Connie McLauchlin, both 95, thought their postman was joking when he knocked to personally hand them the Royal correspondence.

But their delight was tinged with a little sadness, given Her Majesty's recent personal loss after 73 years of marriage to Prince Philip.

Back in the late 1940s Connie sang in the Wrens (Women's Royal Naval Service) but it was when her family persuaded her to get up to sing Al Jolson standard 'April Showers' at a Newcastle social club that she caught former Royal Navy serviceman John's eye.

They were both 21 at the time, and later married at the city's St Mary's Cathedral on April 15th 1950.

John went on to serve Newcastle Breweries for 44 years, working as an operations manager, while Connie became a supervisor at British Home Stores.

They were blessed with three children - daughters Clare and Ann and son John, and have four granddaughters - Jane, Lucy, Stephanie and Philippa - and seven great-grandchildren - Niamh, Ruby, Luca, Harper, Posy, Hugo and Elle.

Living in their own home at Peel House, Main Street, the couple are fortunate to have family close by. Ann and husband Stephen live at Pont Haugh, so are able to help with shopping and medical appointments.

Jane lives at The Lairage with husband Robbie and daughters Niamh and Ruby, while Stephanie and wife Danielle live at Ladywell Way with children Harper and Hugo – so all are able to visit often.

And from family not so close at hand like Philippa and her husband Dan, Pontelanders now living in Perth, Australia, with their daughter Posy, John and Connie receive regular letters and cards.

Stephanie said: "My mum Ann has supported them throughout lockdown by taking them their shopping, and they received lots of postcards and phone calls from family.

"I made family videos and would visit gran and pa on their doorstep and video them singing so they could be part of the videos. One video was them singing 'We'll Meet Again' for VE Day. Gran, who sang in Ponteland ladies' choir at the Methodist Church, still loves to sing.

"They were thrilled to receive the card from the Queen. Gran said she was born two weeks before the Queen and her mum used to say 'I've got my Princess', which I thought was really sweet.

"Gran and pa are a wonderful inspiration to everyone who has the pleasure of knowing them."

Grandma's early cancer diagnosis inspires Matthew's 300-mile charity run

When Matthew Secker heard his grandma Sandra had bowel cancer, he decided to do something to help fund the screening programme which gave her an early diagnosis.

So in February he embarked on a challenge to run the equivalent 306 miles to Sandra's home in Kingston-upon-Thames, Surrey, before her birthday on June 4th to raise funds for Cancer Research UK.

The Year 4 pupil at Darras Hall Primary School has been regularly spotted on his runs around the estate over the past few months and has enjoyed huge support from his teachers and classmates, as well as mum Emma, dad Richard and siblings Adam and Kate.

His class teacher Mr Glendinning quickly set up a course around the school so that Matthew could complete some of the distance with school friends, whilst teaching assistant Miss Day has run two miles around the school site on a Tuesday with him after school.

Thanks to this support Matthew, nine, of Middle Drive, Darras Hall, has already smashed his fundraising target of £306, with donations topping £1,300.

Richard, a PE teacher at St Joseph's Middle School in Hexham, said: "We are so proud of Matthew's determination to complete this challenge. He has shown a great commitment to go out every day and walk or run three miles even when the weather has been bad or when he has been tired after school. He has had great support from his brother and sister – it has been a real family effort!"

Richard's mum Sandra, who celebrates her golden wedding anniversary with Gordon this summer, was equally impressed. She said: "When Matthew told me that he was going to do the challenge I thought that it was a lovely idea to raise some important funds for Cancer Research UK, as without the screening system I would not have got such an early diagnosis and treatment.

"Hearing his stories about how far he has travelled and how much he has raised has been something for me to look forward to and I can't wait to give him and all of my grandchildren a hug when we eventually see each other again."

65-home scheme proposed for Western Way

Plans have been announced for a 65-home development at the southern tip of Darras Hall.

Housing association Karbon Homes, architect IDPartnership and builder Esh Living said they would provide a wide range of housing including affordable family homes, starter homes and bungalows near the junction of Western Way and Stamfordham Road.

The proposed scheme would include ten two bedroom bungalows, 24 three bedroom homes, seven two bedroom homes and 24 two bedroom apartments suitable for retirement living.

In a website launched to gather feedback on the plans, the developers say: "A focus of this development will be to allow local people who have perhaps had to move out of the area to find accommodation that meets their needs, to return back to their roots, whether that be young local people starting out on the property ladder or those that wish to downsize to more suitable accommodation.

"Our aim is to offer local people the chance to get on the home ownership ladder through Rent to Buy and Shared Ownership. We are also looking to include homes for older people who may want to downsize and continue to live independently.

"Careful consideration has been given by the design team to ensure a high quality simple and contemporary architectural solution in keeping with the local area."

Karbon Homes, IDPartnership and Esh Living say all of the comments received via the website at westernwayhomes.com will be taken into account in the submission of their application for planning permission.

Fun and recreation: much more important than work

We all understand the need to work; it puts food on the table and pays the mortgage.

It's so important, very early in our children's lives we will be asking them 'what you want to do when you grow up?' Conversely, fun and recreation is often seen as something we could do without if we had to. But it is much more important than that.

Fun and recreation can reduce stress. Too much stress can increase our cortisol levels, which can lead to lack of sleep. headaches, low energy levels and ultimately high blood pressure and heart disease.

Many studies have also shown that people who exercise and learn throughout life are much less likely to suffer from dementia or have heart disease.

Leaving a career at retirement can leave a big gap in people's lives and unbalance their lifestyle. It is a gap that must be filled, and just as important a question for retirement planning as 'how much do I need in my pension fund?'

Calculating the cost of fun and recreation in retirement in your cash flow projections is essential. We always recommend assuming expenditure on sports and hobbies will increase and suggest

doubling the cost of holidays between retirement and age 80.

We see a lot of people who do not prioritise fun and recreation. They end up not taking enough time off work and can often take work away on holiday with them.

Not only can this have a massively detrimental effect on the third most important component of a balanced lifestyle relationships – but it is not very healthy and can have a negative impact on the second most important emotional health.

The first thing I do when making my business plan for the year is allocate time for holidays because if you don't, they can be left to the last minute, fitting around work. Ideally, work should fit around fun and recreation.

For those that don't think fun and recreation is important, the next time you're sat down with a cup of tea try this: hold your full mug at arm's-length. Is it heavy? Probably not. Now hold it there, still at arm's length, for 10 minutes. Is it heavy now? Yes, and getting heavier.

Put the mug down for couple of minutes then pick it up again and hold at arm's length. It will be a lot lighter than before. Fun and recreation has the same effect on your emotional health. You need the break!

New dog owners urged to train pets properly

Dog owners are being advised to act responsibly after increased reports of fouling and pets wandering off their leads in Ponteland's public spaces.

Environmental Enforcement Officer Dave Foy said anyone he or colleagues sees failing to pick up their dog's waste will receive an on-the-spot £100 fixed penalty fine.

The growth in dog ownership during the past 15 months since the first lockdown has also led to increased concerns about dog behaviour in Ponteland Park and the many lanes around the town.

Dave (pictured) said: "Allowing your dog to jump on other dogs, children and adults can create an unpleasant environment. Jumping up, mobbing and stealing may be naturally self-rewarding behaviours but we do not want to perpetuate them.

"Early and continuing, positive training and control will soon teach your dog more socially acceptable and equally rewarding behaviours."

He has also published a checklist for new owners on responsible dog ownership in public spaces:



- Never allow your pup to just wander up to people. Teach your pup that interaction with humans and other dogs is by invitation and under your direction. Help them to learn that them sticking with you gets a reward.
- Do not let your dog mob or rush at other humans or strange dogs. All dogs should earn their freedom by

- having good recall, self-control and manners.
- Attend training early on. There are lots of online training courses on offer. A search of the internet will soon reveal the many resources available and training venues reopening.
- Use a long line. This way your dog can enjoy degrees of freedom. Dogs do need interaction with other dogs but recall them frequently and move on; reward compliance handsomely. Look for suitable off-lead contexts and limit duration. Teach your pups to approach adult dogs and all humans calmly and with respect.

Dave is hoping owners respond positively, but warns he can enforce the Northumberland County Council (Dog Control) Public Spaces Protection Order 2020 if necessary. He said: "The combination of a responsible owner and well trained dog is the sure fire way to keep everyone happy."

Mobile breast screening unit comes to Ponteland


All women aged between 50 and 70 in Ponteland will be invited to book a mammogram at a mobile breast screening unit which will be based in the town for the next four months.

All women over the age of 70 won't receive an automatic written invitation, but are being encouraged to self-refer by contacting Newcastle Breast Screening Service on 0191 282 0202.

One in seven women will receive a breast cancer diagnosis in their lifetime. The aim of the breast screening programme is to detect and treat breast cancer at an early stage, reducing mortality.

There will be alternative locations offered for the screening appointment and Covid safety measures will apply.

Are you interested in local news? Would you like to be involved in your community magazine Pont News, which has published monthly for 16 years?


We are looking for two volunteers to join the Pont News editorial group, which receives advance copies of each issue to proof and provide feedback by email/phone.


