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

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Thousands enjoy fun in the sun at Kirkley dog festival

Dogs of all shapes and sizes, ages and breeds enjoyed some fun in the sun at a huge canine gathering at Kirkley Hall.

Thousands turned out over the weekend of September 3 to 4 for the North East Dog Festival to shop, play and take part in a wide range of have-a-go activities.

The trainers and clubs running everything from agility to barrel racing, scentventure to canicross, worked non-stop with some seeing more than 200 dogs per day go through their individual areas.

The giant dock diving pool proved a huge success, with dogs flying through the air to splash into the giant 100,000 litre pool. Other attractions included a duck herding display and Walworth Castle Birds of Prey.

The event also provided space for three charity dog shows - Roo's Journey, Newcastle Dog and Cat Shelter and GSP Rescue Services hosted classes ranging from most handsome dog to best fancy dress. The three shows across the two days raised thousands of pounds.

Rachael Kendall, General Manager at Newcastle Dog & Cat Shelter, said: "We were busy, which was fantastic, not only for raising funds but also making the general public aware of us and what we do. Some of the dogs that we have rehomed in the past came to visit us with their families which was amazing."

Festival Director Rebecca Ashworth added: "We knew it would be hard to top last year, but our team managed it. There were more traders, more have-a-go activities, more dog show classes, more displays - pretty much more of everything. Visitor numbers were up and the support and feedback has been brilliant."

Ponteland remembers our beloved Queen

Just three months after the Ponteland community gathered for a four-day celebration of the Platinum Jubilee, the sad death of Queen Elizabeth II aged 96 was met with sombre tributes.



For our younger residents, special assemblies were held in all of the Pele Trust's schools to remember Her Majesty's long reign.

Children at Darras Hall Primary School created displays from messages of gratitude and illustrations they had drawn, while older pupils wrote letters and cards of condolence to the Queen's grandchildren.

Formal books of condolence were opened at the Town Council offices, the library and at St Mary's Church, where the flag was lowered to half-mast on the evening of September 8 shortly after the announcement of Her Majesty's death and again prior to the State Funeral.

Floral tributes were left on Coates Green, while local businesses including Dobson's estate agents on Broadway, Darras Hall, created window displays.

For the first time in 70 years, the church bells at St. Mary's were rung fully muffled for an hour on September 8 (this only happens following the death of a monarch) and the tenor tolled 96 times at noon the following day.

On Saturday September 10 the muffles were removed and at noon the bells were rung open in celebration of the King's accession, before being remuffled until after the State Funeral.

Pupils at Ponteland Primary School must have been among the last people in the country to receive a letter from the Queen, as headteacher Lynn Blain explained.

"When we returned to school (after the summer break) we were delighted to receive a letter from the Queen's Lady In Waiting, thanking us for our letters and cards that we sent to the Queen in May.

"It is a very special letter as it must be one of the last ones that she had posted. Following the sad news of the death of the Queen, we are so pleased that we all wrote to her and we are going to frame her letter to us along with the commemorative card we received.

"We came together in a special assembly to pay our respects to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, whose dedication to duty and a life of service has been simply remarkable. We watched her short film with Paddington which really made us smile. We think that Paddington summed up our feelings very well when he said 'Happy Jubilee ma'am...and thank you for everything'."



Ponteland's MP Guy Opperman also paid tribute. He said: "Her Majesty was our beloved Queen. Her service to our country was steadfast, dutiful and compassionate.

"On the occasion of the Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977 the poet Philip Larkin, who spent much of his time in Northumberland, wrote of her reign: 'In times when nothing stood, but worsened or grew strange, there was one constant good, she did not change.'

"Her Majesty and Prince Philip visited Ponteland to open the (former) Police headquarters, which is fondly remembered by residents.

"The tributes from my colleagues across the House of Commons have shown her powerful ability to bring us together. The Queen touched so many and that was reflected in the powerful tributes by my colleagues. From the lovely anecdotes from former prime ministers to Sir Keir Starmer's powerful tribute that 'she lived among us', the speeches showed the best of the House of Commons.

"The Queen was the best of us and a constant in a changing world. The shock to our country will be profound, as all our lives have evolved with hers. My thoughts and prayers are with her family. They mourn their mother, and grandmother, as her country mourns her too.

"God save the King."

Northumberland County Council has launched a public consultation to decide on a fitting permanent memorial. Council leader Glen Sanderson said: "As we mourn the loss of Her Majesty the Queen, it gives us time to reflect on and remember how inspirational she has been during her years of reign.

"We have already seen many of our residents sign books of condolence and lay flowers. Having guided our country through many challenges and many celebrations across her 70 years it only seems fitting for us to be able to forever remember her in the county she often visited, our county, Northumberland.

"For that reason, we would like to create a permanent memorial in memory of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, here in Northumberland. In the coming weeks we will engage with our residents to ensure this memorial is a place for all; a place where our residents and visitors can go to remember our great monarch."



School's PE provision meets the gold standard

PE and sport provision at Darras Hall Primary School has met the Government's gold standard after the award of a coveted accolade.

The school has secured the School Games Mark Platinum Award, after demonstrating it excels in engaging pupils in sporting activity, including competitions and links with local clubs.

Children at DHPS compete in a wide range of sports including hockey, cricket, cross country, boys' and girls' football, gymnastics, athletics, basketball, golf, rugby, netball, tennis, table tennis, rounders, dance and badminton throughout the Morpeth and Ponteland areas.

They also benefit from specialist teachers and coaches, with links to a number of local sporting clubs.

Highlights last year included individual and team success for Key Stage 2 pupils at South Shields and in Ovingham in cross country events and the Year 5 Eagles basketball competition the semi-finals and finals of which were played at the Newcastle Vertu Motors Arena.

Headteacher Victoria Parr said: "Our PE staff and NUFC coaches have worked throughout the year to provide children with a packed calendar of sporting events and experiences which focus on inclusion and participation in addition to sporting excellence."

The School Games Mark is a Government-led awards scheme launched in 2012 to reward schools for their commitment to the development of competition across their school and into the community. When people complete our ScoreMy questionnaire for the first time, the most common low score is not worrying about money.

There is no point in creating a plan if it is not implemented. A well-structured financial plan will include simple actions, steps to help you achieve your objects. Circumstances can change, so it is essential that your plan is reviewed on a regular basis and adjustments made when required.

Professional advice can be invaluable in helping to overcome money worries. In extreme cases the following websites may be helpful:

In my experience, the causes of money worries are rarely unique and in most cases a financial planner will be able to draw on their experience to help create a well-structured financial plan to help you exorcise those money worries.

A word of warning: if you meet a financial adviser and they want to know about your money without getting to know you first, they are probably more interested in your money than you - and are best avoided.

County council to take 'urgent action' over £4.8m overspend

County councillors have agreed to take "urgent action" after a report projected a £4.8m overspend on this year's budget.

A combination of factors including pay rises for staff and increased fuel and utility costs are being blamed for the shortfall, which would take the authority's total budget spend to £387.5m.

Northumberland County Council's interim executive director of finance Jan Willis, in a report to the Cabinet which met on September 13, said: "The Council needs to take urgent action in order to contain the overspend."

Her report detailed a £12.5m increase in the pay bill, a £2.3m rise in school transport costs, and utility costs going up by £3.5m in the current financial year.

Measures being taken include inviting applications from staff for voluntary redundancy and the suspension of the normal budget approval process,

with all expenditure authorised by executive directors.

A vacancy panel is also being set up to recommend to the executive team any proposed recruitment, and a review of in-year fees and charges undertaken by the executive team is to be reported to the Cabinet for decision.

An NCC spokesperson said: "Along with councils throughout the country we are dealing with some significant financial issues brought about by a range of external factors. The cost of many of the things the council needs to deliver its services – from building materials to energy – has increased significantly and we need to respond to those pressures.

"As a responsible council we have a legal duty to set a balanced budget and ensure sound financial management.

"That is why we carry out rigorous budget monitoring throughout the year and are taking action now to mitigate against further overspend.

"We are carefully looking at budgets in every service to see where savings could be made, while continuing to minimise the impact on residents. It's also about the council working differently to try and develop year on year savings.

"Voluntary redundancy rounds are reasonably common and have been held annually in a number of recent years. We are currently going through this process."

Perhaps he can liaise with Factco and explain to them how to provide broadband to the home without either going overground or underground (which can't be done because of blocked ducts).

Do estate residents want hundreds of new telegraph poles?

Since my letter of last month about the imposition of poles by Factco they have made their intentions clearer.

A recent update on their website stated they will carry their broadband on poles, not underground, in streets throughout the Darras Hall estate. The reason proffered for this was the ducts under roads and pavements have blockages or are already at capacity.

The website says they will be installing poles in a number of roads in the estate. They include Ladyrigg where all houses were constructed in the mid/late 70s and have modern ducting facilities. The update also indicated that the reviews at Wentworth Court, Oaklands and Meadow Court have been completed.

At Meadow Court we have been informed that poles will be installed if the service is taken up by enough to make it economically feasible, otherwise the road will be excluded from the scheme. Representations have been made to the Darras Hall Estate Committee (DHEC) by around 100 residents mainly from Wentworth Court, Oaklands and Meadow Court who were formally 'threatened' with installation of poles.

Most members of the committee are stated as having either an environmental or estate conservation view to serving. The installation of several hundred 40ft telegraph poles would appear to be at significant variance to those objectives!

Northumberland County Council controls the pavements where these poles will be situated. Contact has also been made with county councillors but despite a promise to 'look into this' no feedback has been received.

This estate is in great danger of having imposed on it a method of broadband delivery that is profit driven and would sit well in the 1950s but could well be seen as somewhat outdated today.

Given the environmental impact one must have thought that a greater dialogue between the residents, Factco and DHEC and the county authorities would be appropriate. As it is the residents are faced with an unsightly installation that will downgrade the quality and environment of the estate with a potential impact on the value of properties.

Do residents wish to do anything about the coming of poles? For my part I have shown my opposition to the Factco policy by formally withdrawing my interest in the scheme I will leave readers to come to their own conclusions.

High flying GCSE students look forward to uninterrupted sixth form experience

High performing GCSE students are looking forward to a more stable time in sixth form after a hugely disrupted two years due to the pandemic.

More than a quarter of Ponteland High School's outgoing Year 11s (26%) achieved five or more of the highest grades 7-9 (previously A*-A). They included Isla Cardno, who got a full set of 9s.

Lauren Campbell, Rebecca Green, Jamie Ho, Myles Paparesti, Charlie Walker and Conor Wallace achieved all 8s and 9s, with 18 colleagues being awarded all 7, 8 and 9 grades.

Stefan McElwee, headteacher of Ponteland High School, said: "Despite the challenges and adversity faced by our Year 11 students over the past two years they have achieved fantastic GCSE results.

"They have experienced significant disruption to their studies yet have shown resilience and determination to achieve their best, despite the national challenges of the pandemic.

"All of our students should be extremely proud of themselves; they have shown a strength of character and work ethic to be proud of. I look forward to celebrating their results with them and I am extremely proud of their many achievements.

"We will now look forward to welcoming many of them back into our Sixth Form. I am confident they will benefit from a more stable period of education and they can look forward to further successes at A Level and beyond."

This year, following two years of Centre and Teacher Assessed grades, students sat public exams in GCSEs or equivalent courses. Grades were awarded by exam boards at a midpoint between the last public exams in 2019 and the Teacher Assessed Grades of 2021.

The GCSE successes follow superb A level results, with 26 students achieving a clean sweep of A* and A grades, described by the school as "a phenomenal achievement" given the circumstances.



New environmental group launches with tree planting project

A newly formed environmental group is to launch a ten-year action plan with its first tree planting project.

Ponteland Action Group for the Environment (PAGE) will lead 'Pontenviroland' - the plan drawn up by Rotary Ponteland which has a series of objectives to improve the local environment.

They include:

- General tree planting local schools have been contacted regarding the Woodland Trust's offer of free trees for schools. Ponteland residents and locally based companies will also be encouraged to plant trees in their land and gardens and to not remove trees unnecessarily.
- Rewilding Ponteland and its surrounds encouraging industrial and domestic garden areas to have a 'Wild Corner' where wild plants, animals, birds and insects can thrive.
- Local wildlife supporting efforts to maintain local wildlife including the Red Squirrel support group, the provision of nest boxes, the creation of 'Hedgehog Pathways' and 'Hedgehog Homes' in wild corners.
- School liaison working with and supporting local schools on environmental projects and activities and potentially setting up a 'Rotakids Group' at a local primary school to focus on environmental projects.
- Plastic and litter examining what can be done both to reduce the amount of plastic used and hold a programme of litter removal in Rotary Way and other key local sites.

Links have been established with Ponteland Town Council, Northumberland County Council, Northumberland Wildlife Trust, Ponteland Red Squirrels and PAGE is striving to forge partnerships with other groups.

Alan Hall, from PAGE, said: "Amongst some of our early initiatives, we are actively pursuing a programme of tree planting. This includes inviting residents of Ponteland to plant a new tree in their own gardens if space and garden layout will allow for this.

"We are also currently working with the County Council and the Town Council to try to secure further tree planting in the Ponteland and Darras Hall areas.

"However, one early success which has been agreed is with Darras Hall Estate Committee to plant two new trees at the entrance to the Old Station Court just behind the United Reformed Church.

"Residents are invited to have a look at the PAGE Facebook page which may give them ideas on what they can do about things such as rewilding some of their garden. Find us on Facebook at PontelandActionGroupForTheEnvironment."

MP launches campaign for mobile banking services

Ponteland's MP Guy
Opperman has launched a
campaign calling for better
access to physical banking
facilities following the latest
branch closure in the town.

Mr Opperman met with representatives at Barclays to encourage them to roll out their mobile banking vans across Tynedale and Ponteland.

The vans provide banking services to people who prefer to use in-person banking facilities rather than online banking.

The MP has also written to the Chief Executives of Lloyds, NatWest and HSBC to ask them to rollout mobile and pop-up facilities to their customers too in Northumberland.

Lloyds closed its doors on its branch in Main Street in February, following the departure of Barclays, NatWest and HSBC in recent years. People seeking face to face banking transactions now have the choice of Newcastle Building

Society's branch on Broadway, Darras Hall, or the Post Office branches on Broadway or Merton Road.

Mr Opperman said: "Access to cash and in-person banking are vital services to residents who may not be able to access

online banking. I would encourage all banks with customers across Tynedale and Ponteland to rollout services that will benefit their customers.

"We must retain in-person banking facilities!"



Planners deal blow to £1m community clubhouse appeal

Ambitious plans to develop a £1m community clubhouse on Callerton Lane have been dealt a blow by planning chiefs.

An application to vary a condition of the planning permission previously granted for the adjacent leisure centre development, to enable the felling of 15 trees to make way for the new sporting facility, has been refused.

Approval would have led to the submission of a planning application for the clubhouse scheme.

The application to remove the condition which protected all retained trees and hedgerows at the site attracted 48 objections regarding the loss of healthy trees, biodiversity impacts and visual character concerns.

There was one public representation in support, from a couple who live in Mayfair Gardens who said they had no objection to the trees being removed for the construction of a clubhouse for the rugby and football clubs.

It was delegated for officer decision and recommending refusal, Northumberland County Council Planning Officer Ryan



Soulsby said the proposed development failed to address potential impacts upon protected species and their habitats, as well as the biodiversity value of the application site.

He added: "The application fails to provide sufficient justification to warrant the removal of 15 trees from the application site whilst also failing to address potential impacts upon protected species and biodiversity.

"Furthermore, no biodiversity enhancements have been provided as part of the application. The application is therefore recommended for refusal." Ponteland Rugby Club and Ponteland United FC launched a joint fundraising campaign earlier this year for the new facility, proposed to be located on land between the rugby and football pitches adjacent to the leisure centre and to include changing rooms, a social space and viewing balcony. It would be open on matchdays, for training sessions and club social events, as well as for wider community use.

The two clubs, who have set up a new joint company to manage the project, had pledged to replace any trees which needed to be felled.

£1.4m executive recruitment drive launched at County Hall

A £1.4m recruitment drive is underway to create a new senior management team at County Hall.

Northumberland County Council has agreed a new executive management structure which will see the creation of a number of new posts reporting to a new chief executive, who is expected to be unveiled on November 2.

The moves follow a turbulent period for the council which culminated in a £209,000 settlement with former chief executive Daljit Lally who left the authority on July 31.

An independent review by a team of experienced former local authority chief executives headed by Max Caller CBE concluded corporate governance at the council was "dysfunctional" with a "harmful" working environment in a "climate of fear and intimidation".

Mr Caller said "new seasoned local government professional leadership at the top of the organisation" was needed.

A report to the Staff and Appointments Committee which met on September 20 said interim chief executive Rick O'Farrell has been leading the restructure process to successfully implement a new senior officer structure.

He has been supported by external consultants from Londonbased executive search firm Penna, and there have been 40 interviews with Cabinet members, opposition leaders and senior staff in which eight different structures have been discussed.

The preferred model is for a Chief Executive/Head of Paid Service/Electoral Returning Officer, supported by five Executive Directors for: Place & Regeneration; Transformation & Resources; Adults, Ageing & Wellbeing; Children, Young People & Education; and Public Health, Inequalities & Stronger Communities.

There will also be a Director of Governance/Legal Services and Monitoring Officer post, while the Chief Fire Officer role remains unchanged albeit with additional responsibilities.

The salary bands for all the new posts will be published on the county council website.



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
