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
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Creative collaboration celebrates River Tyne

A year long creative project celebrating the River Tyne culminated in an exhibition of art, music and dance at Ponteland's school and leisure complex.

Primary school pupils from Pele Trust have been following the journey of the River Tyne using the creative arts to explore and tell its story.

The trust's six schools have worked both individually and collaboratively to deliver artwork, musical compositions and artistic performances, with pupils from Ponteland High School supporting younger children via workshops and mentoring.

The project was supported by the Institute for Creative Arts Practice and the School of Arts and Cultures at Newcastle University.

University lecturer Dr Julia Partington has led music workshops in the primary schools, while sound recordist David De La Haye and Senior Lecturer in Composition Rob McKay have helped children produce musical compositions using pond dipping with underwater microphones. Meanwhile, undergraduate art students planned and delivered art lessons.

Pele Trust's dance and music specialists also worked alongside a postgraduate student from the Creative Institute for Arts Practice to create a short film of dance inspired by the River Tyne.

The three-day exhibition in the sports hall at Ponteland Leisure Centre, which culminated with a performance by Pele Trust choir and musicians on July 13, was led by Senior Lecturer of Contemporary Art Dr Gayle Meikle, assisted by two interns.

The project is the brainchild of Ponteland Primary School teacher Carly Frame, a fine art graduate, who has worked closely with the university to arrange placements for art students at the trust's primary schools.

Carly said: "The project has grown into something far greater than I could have imagined...I am so proud of the efforts of all our pupils and grateful for the support of colleagues at Newcastle University."

He had previously served at Strathclyde Fire & Rescue and Hampshire Fire & Rescue, where he started his career in 2001.

Married to Jodi and a proud dad of 14-year-old Molly, Graeme enjoys running, cycling and the occasional triathlon outside work.

He said: "It's a great honour to be



appointed as the new Chief Fire Officer and I'm excited to be following the good work of Paul. Northumberland is a beautiful place to work and I'm happy to be working alongside people who make this county proud and to be serving the people in it."

Glen Sanderson, Leader of the County Council, added: "I would like to extend my congratulations to Graeme on achieving this promotion - it is very well deserved. I've had the pleasure of working closely with Graeme and the rest of the senior management team at the fire service and know he will be an excellent appointment."

Outgoing CFO Paul Hedley added: "I'm delighted that Graeme will be the next CFO of Northumberland. Graeme has been the Deputy Chief for the last two-and-a-half years and he has already made a tremendous impact during that time, leading on some hugely significant service improvements.

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Ponteland named one of Britain's most desirable towns

Ponteland has been named in a top 50 list of Britain's most desirable towns.

The Telegraph commissioned estate agents Savills to use the latest census data to compile a list of the 50 places that scored the highest across several factors.

These included the proportion of residents holding managerial jobs, their level of qualifications, the state of their health and the costs of buying a house. Put more simply, towns with good schools and attractive surroundings - a huge draw for high earners.

The majority, including top placed Harpenden in Hertfordshire, are unsurprisingly in the South-East within an hour's commute of the capital. But the North-West also has prominent entries such as Cheshire market town Wilmslow in 23rd place and Stockport suburb Cheadle Hulme rated 26th.

Newcomers to the top 50 list include Hurstpierpoint, a village in rural West Sussex, Hitchin in Hertfordshire and the city of Bath. Chigwell in Essex, once hailed by Charles Dickens as "the greatest place in the world", has climbed the most places from 69th to 32nd.

Ponteland is in 34th place, ahead of Windsor, Bath, Oxford and Winchester.

The Mayor of Ponteland, Coun Karen Overbury, said: "It comes as no surprise to see Ponteland among Britain's 50 most desirable places to live in. We are very lucky to be surrounded by beautiful countryside and to be the gateway to Northumberland.

"We have a large number of groups and organisations, excellent schools, an impressive leisure centre and much



more. And, of course, we have easy access to the city of Newcastle and the spectacular North East coastline.

"It's telling that a large number of young people who leave for university and jobs elsewhere choose to return to Ponteland when they have children of their own. It's simply a great place to live in. We moved here more than 35 years ago and I couldn't imagine living anywhere else."

The show is run entirely by volunteers and while entry is free, donations on




the door would be appreciated to help fund the event. Any raffle prizes would be gratefully received – organisers can be contacted at info@pontelandflowershow.org.uk.

Implementation of your financial plan: a team game



In last month's column I explained why cashflow modelling should be at the core of a professionally structured financial plan. On completion of the plan, the next stage is implementation.

At this point in the process you may need to build a good team of experienced professional advisers around you, not just your financial planner.

Most financial plans are likely to include estate planning. I would strongly recommend a specialist solicitor above all others who may write wills, because they are more likely to have the experience to draft the will for complex finances or family structures.

Don't just give them instructions - a good estate planner should be

asking similar questions to your financial planner about your family, relationships, wealth etc and be prepared to work alongside your financial planner.

For those with businesses or complex tax issues, you may need to include an accountant as part of the team of advisers. We often suggest that the business should be seen as a financial asset that can either be sold at retirement or generate extra income that can be invested to provide an income in retirement. The accountant can therefore support this kind of planning. In some cases, we have brought in business coaches to provide extra support.

An issue we sometimes see with clients who should be decumulating their wealth is how they find it very difficult to change a lifetime habit of accumulating, even though they know they should be spending or gifting their money.

In most cases cashflow modelling will



provide this confidence to change, but sometimes a life coach may help to overcome any mental blocks.

When it comes to the financial advice part of the implementation, usually involving pensions and investments, products should already have been built into the plan. However, you need to be aware of the effects of the costs of establishing that product.

What are the initial costs for setting up a new product? What impact will these have on the growth of the funds? What of the ongoing fees? What are the net returns expected after all charges and inflation after the anticipated growth rates? Refer to the adviser's assumptions document. Do these charges provide value for money?

Once the implementation of the plan is complete, you can sit back and relax for 12 months before your review is due. One of the biggest disservices a financial planner (or adviser) can do for their client is to fail to carry out a review. More on this next month.

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Huge smiles at the largest reason to disability triathlon

Nearly 50 children and adults with disabilities took part in a triathlon organised by Ponteland gym owner Jo Shallcross.

The Reason To Disability Triathlon, held at David Lloyd Club and Paddy Freeman's Park in Newcastle, enables competitors to complete a traditional triathlon by swimming, running and cycling with support and specially adapted equipment.

This year's field, from nine years old to adults, included Rosie Bell, 15, from Ponteland, who has cerebral palsy and dystonia.

The Ponteland High School pupil, completing her second triathlon, explained her motivation: "It's to prove a point that even though we are disabled we all can do a triathlon. I've always been like that. I don't like the fact that we can't do things. We can, but adapted, we can still do it.

"It's not the activity that really matters. It's all these kids together as a community to do something that they can do and that's amazing."

Rosie's mum Kerry added: "This is really important for Rosie's fitness. She's been working one-on-one with Jo and just got stronger and stronger. The change in her

is unbelievable and it's really important that she keeps moving.

"Rosie loves a goal. She did her first bike ride recently to raise money for her youth club and she'll be using a trike today. She's not a strong swimmer but this is about what you can do and not what you can't. And she's not frightened and will get in the pool and give it a go. She loves being involved with the whole group. They're a great bunch."

The inspirational event, once again sponsored by Team Valley-based office technology company SOS Group, took place in blazing hot sunshine on Sunday June 25 and closed with a medal ceremony with professional triathlete Dan Dixon from Morpeth as special guest.

Organised by triathletes Jo Shallcross and Tracey Sample, The Reason To Disability Triathlon began with just a handful of competitors and has grown year on year. The latest event was the largest to date.

Jo, owner of Ponteland health and fitness gym The Barn, was first inspired to organise a triathlon tailored to the individual needs of North East children after seeing a child with disabilities enjoying the event in Hawaii.

She said: "To do a triathlon is a real challenge for them because of the tiredness levels they often experience.

They could go out for a swim and that would finish them off for the day but you're asking them to swim, bike and run. But we've set it up well so they go in waves and have a break between each one with time to reenergise and get a drink."


Sunday June 9 2024 will be a special date as it is when the 20th Ponteland Party in the Park will be held. We do hope you will be able to join us then.



Weekly banking service relocates

A weekly banking service launched last year at Ponteland Memorial Hall has been relocated to the leisure centre.

Last September, Barclays launched physical banking facilities at the Memorial Hall every Thursday in response to a call by MP Guy Opperman.

The MP had launched a campaign following the closure of branches across his constituency, including NatWest, Lloyds, HSBC and Barclays in Ponteland. He wrote to the CEOs of all four banks asking for them to consider providing more physical banking services to residents.

The service has proved very popular and the bank has announced it is moving to an office located just by the library in Ponteland Leisure Centre.

Customers visiting the facility will be able to access a wide range of services including financial reviews, balance requests, opening new accounts and support with digital banking. As the centre is a cashless site, everyday banking transactions will need to be completed at the local Post Office.

Barclays said it is committed to deploying a range of more flexible ways that customers can physically interact with the bank.

They include more than 230 pop-up banking sites in town centres and a presence in spaces such as community centres, libraries and business hubs where it offers drop in and pre-booked appointments.

Rugby runners complete 40th anniversary challenge

Rugby club runners have just completed their 40th anniversary 100-mile run from Ponteland to Edinburgh.



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Setting off in relay and tandem they completed the challenge in just over 20 hours - an impressive average of five miles an hour.

They are raising rolling funds for a new clubhouse at Ponteland Rugby Club as well as donating to the Children's Hospital at Newcastle's RVI.

The latest run was completed with seven of the original starters from the first challenge in 1983, now with an average age of 65. They were joined by nine others, including Ponteland Rugby Club President Dave Comeskey. In their younger days the route from England to the Scottish capital was competed in 11 hours 39 minutes.

Support vehicles for much needed rest and recuperation during the two-day challenge were kindly donated by Lookers Volkswagen Commercial Vehicles in Newcastle. The money for the RVI is in memory of Alastair Sym, a member of the running group for many years, who sadly passed away last year.

Andy Maidwell, still running after 40 years, said: "This time the pace was always going to be a little more sedate. It was just great to get together again, have some fun and laughs along the way, enjoy the scenery and actually get to Edinburgh.

"We had some younger ones to keep us going but some of the original group still showed remarkable endurance alongside varied levels of fitness.

"The first time we were raising money to help pay the rent of the pitch at the rugby club. Since those early days there have been big changes. We now have a new school and leisure centre in Ponteland and we are hoping a new clubhouse for the rugby club can be part of any future plans.

"Since the original challenge in 1983 we have completed the route at regular intervals, including 1993, 2003, 2013 and now the 40th anniversary in 2023. We may now hand over the baton to younger athletes."

Caring young artist receives national award

A talented young artist who raised £1,000 in an exhibition to raise money for a friend's electric wheelchair appeal has collected a national award at the Scottish Parliament.

Jevindu Sanyuth Dissanayake was featured in the April and May issues of Pont News after selling 15 of his own paintings at the exhibition at Ponteland's Café by Design to support the appeal for Freddie Tanner-Boyer.

The five-year-old, from Greenside in Gateshead, has spinal muscular atrophy and, unable to walk, he needs an electric wheelchair as he struggles outside with his manual chair.

Family and friends launched a fundraising drive to enable the purchase of a Trekinetic allterrain chair which would allow Freddie to explore and join in with his friends on days out to places like the beach and forest school. But at a cost of nearly £15,000, it is not funded by the NHS.

With more than 300 donations, the appeal target has been smashed - nearly £22,000 has been raised.

Jevindu, five, of Dinnington, has become something of a local celebrity, also featuring on BBC's Look North programme.

And now the Darras Hall Primary School pupil has

picked up another accolade, after being named one of the first winners of the inaugural British Youth International College (BYITC) Inspire Awards.

Jevindu was the joint youngest among 37 award winners aged five to 17 who had excelled in a variety of fields including sports, media, art and creativity and STEM subjects. He was named Young Philanthropist in the All Rounder category.

BYITC was founded in 2015 by Glasgow-based academic and educator Dr Rashmi Mantri to help young people learn and improve their abilities in maths.

Jevindu's mum Chapa, a hospital doctor, said: "I am extremely proud of Jevindu - it's a great achievement for his age as he was shortlisted out of thousands of nominations in nine categories and only 37 little brilliant bloomers were awarded.

"We are so grateful for the appreciation of our little son Jevindu and giving a validity for his achievements. It is an acceptance for who he really is and this will motivate and encourage his little soul to do more in the future."
