



# Centenarian Christine gets the VIP treatment

A card from the King, a visit from the Mayor and entertainment from flapper girls to hippies – centenarian Christine Robson certainly got the VIP treatment on her big day.

Staff at the Royal Hampton in Meadowfield, Ponteland, dressed in outfits from periods throughout her life – including the flapper girls of the 1920s, the land girls of the 1940s and hippies from the 1960s and 70s – as they sang and danced.

Christine was born in August 1923 in York and worked as a food distributor for the Ministry of Food during World War Two, later becoming a dog groomer – a profession she held until her retirement.

She met husband Keith aged 27, marrying in 1949. Keith was a coal exporter and the couple moved to Ponteland in the late-1950s when he was relocated with work.

They had two sons, Chris and Tony, and two grandsons Tony and Andy. Sadly, Keith and son Tony have passed away.

Christine, who became a resident at Royal Hampton last October, enjoys flower arranging. When she was more active, she loved playing tennis at the Memorial Hall and socialising with her friends in Darras Hall, playing bridge. Christine was also a keen gardener, tending to her large garden at home.

Ponteland Mayor Karen Overbury joined in the celebrations and brought Christine a beautiful bouquet of flowers on behalf of the people of Ponteland. Both Christine and her family said they were "overwhelmed" with Coun Overbury's visit and Christine was particularly fascinated by the Mayor's 'Civic Regalia'.

### Joint receiver takes control of Dissington Estate

A joint receiver has been appointed for a 2,500-acre estate on the edge of Ponteland which was the subject of hugely controversial plans for a garden village scheme.

In what is one of the UK's largest ever receivership appointments, Watling Real Estate is taking control of the Dissington Estate and assessing all disposal options.

The estate includes three large farms, three farm smallholdings, neighbouring woodland, a fishing pond and a number of residential properties.

Andrew Foster, joint receiver and managing director at Watling Real Estate's Leeds office, said: "The Dissington Estate extends to a total of some 2,523 acres, which is one of the largest ever – if not the largest ever – receivership appointments ever to have been made in the UK.

"We will now be taking control of the land and undertaking a detailed fact-finding operation, assessing all disposal options and implementing the optimum



strategy to realise best value.


"This could be an outright sale of the whole property, or we may well end up splitting the estate into various lots to maximise its value."

The majority of the estate is currently let out as working farms, with residential buildings alongside a range of neighbouring barns, stables, workshops, storage rooms and other outbuildings.

It was first put up for sale for £27.5m in 2019, following a bid by former owners

Lugano to create a garden village on the land, with more than 2,000 homes and other facilities, which was initially supported in principle by the then Labour-led Northumberland County Council.

A change in the administration at County Hall in May 2017 led to a major rethink and a fallout with Lugano which ended up in High Court writs being served, which were later dropped after the application was withdrawn from the planning committee agenda in January 2019.

### Brother's dementia inspires charity coastal walk

The sadness of seeing a sibling's fast developing dementia has inspired a retired Ponteland bookkeeper to complete a challenging charity walk in North Yorkshire.

Janet Cusworth was joined for the 13.5-mile return trek from Whitby to Robin Hood's Bay by her daughter Helen, 37, a Technical Training Instructor who now lives in Hampshire.

The 70-year-old, of Middle Drive, Darras Hall, explained: "My brother Colin Sherwood developed dementia during the Covid lockdown when he lived alone. He became very anxious and by September last year he was unable to cope with the simple tasks necessary to live on his own.

"Colin is only 74, but the dementia developed so quickly he had very little treatment before his ability to cope with life was seriously affected."

Colin's children live in London, Canada and Australia, so he moved into residential care, initially in York where he then lived. Due to the distance from his sister he has since moved into care in Westerhope.

Janet added: "Dementia is affecting far too many people and charities like the Alzheimer's Society need support to provide support and push forward research. Dementia can only be effectively treated at the very early stages, and most sufferers have not even been formally diagnosed at this point so miss out on any chance of useful treatment."

The mother and daughter, who chose North Yorkshire because Janet and Colin's parents met in Harrogate during the war and gave their children many happy family holidays in Yorkshire, have raised more than  $\mathfrak{L}1,450$  for the Alzheimer's Society which organised the walk.



Janet said: "I had never felt I could walk that distance. So it was a personal challenge to get fitter and we started straight away walking several miles a day with our Border Collie Max, gradually building up the miles.

"We completed the 13.5 miles in six hours (including a lunch stop). I struggled up the steep, short hills but was encouraged by others taking part and when I reached the finishing line I was surprised at how fresh I still felt."

## The review: the financial planning equivalent of satnav



I ended last month's column by saying you could sit back and relax for 12 months on completion of the implementation stage of your financial plan. After this first year the next stage is your initial review.

- Your objectives What have you achieved? Are there any new objectives we need to plan for?
- Current position What has changed since the last version of

the plan? Income, expenditure assets and liabilities statements should be updated.

- **Investments** Are adjustments to take into consideration revised objectives? If still accumulating wealth, are the investments on target to achieve 'Enough'? If decumulating, and you are never going to run out of money, how are the investments performing against inflation? For both scenarios, do we need to make some amendments? Different asset classes perform in different ways; does your portfolio still match your investment risk profile? If not, we may need to rebalance to the 'shape' of your original portfolio (all our clients are automatically rebalanced once a year, at no charge).
- Estate planning Have there been changes within your family, or with legislation that we need to consider?
- Assumptions Do these need adjusting to adapt to your changing circumstances or the economic environment? At present, inflation springs to mind!



 Taxation and legislation - Are there any changes that we need to consider? Recent changes to capital gains tax and pensions have made some clients change their strategy.

Your review is not just about looking back, it's also about planning going forward; what are you going to do next?

In some instances, there may be significant changes where a completely new financial plan may be required. But usually the existing plan can be updated and amended.



Star pupils Joseph Anderson, Molly Dufton and Ojas Rajkumar will be studying at Oxford University from September.




Ponteland High School Headteacher Stefan McElwee said: "We are delighted with the results achieved by our Year 13 students this year.

# Council increases fines to tackle environmental crimes

Fines for environmental offences in Northumberland are set to increase and cover a greater number of issues, the county council has confirmed.

The council issues fixed penalty notices for various environmental offences including dog control/dog fouling, littering, fly-tipping, nuisance parking, abandoning a vehicle, consuming alcohol in public spaces and graffiti.

The cabinet has agreed to consolidate all its fixed penalty notices for environment related transgressions, which are being charged in line with government guidelines.

All fines will now be charged at £100, reduced to £80 for payment within seven days, with the exception of those caught littering who will incur a higher fine of £150, reduced to £100 if paid within seven days.

In an effort to cut down on fly tipping, the authority has also introduced new fines for householders who fail in their Duty of Care when disposing of their waste and

the waste is dumped in the county. These fines will be charged at £400, reduced to £300 if paid within seven days.

Residents are being reminded not to fall for a growing criminal scam in which they pay in good faith to have their waste taken away by people posing as legitimate waste collectors, but who then go on to fly-tip the material. Always make a note of the registration number of the vehicle used and take a note or photo of the waste carrier's licence issued by the Environment Agency.

Coun Gordon Stewart, cabinet member for Looking after our Communities said: "Fly-tipping, littering, and dog fouling can have a huge impact on Northumberland's streets. Invariably, taxpayers end up footing the bill to clean up after other people's irresponsibility.

"Fixed Penalty Notice levels have not changed since 2017 so we want to take stronger action against those who commit these types of environmental crimes.

"Our teams clear up on average in the region of 350 fly-tips each month – and we pursue the offenders through the courts. The onus really is on householders to ensure they employ a reputable waste carrier to collect their waste.

"We hope these revised fines will have a positive effect on the county's environment, particularly when it comes to reducing fly-tipping and littering."

To check a waste carrier is reputable, visit the Environment Agency's waste carrier register at nland.cc/waste and enter the business name or search for licensed waste operators near you.
