

GCSE students smash it

National junior badminton champion Lucy Dodd was among several teenagers from Ponteland to achieve impressive GCSE grades in this summer's exams.

Lucy, who won two U17 international tournaments and the National U17 Mixed Doubles while in Year 11 at Dame Allan's Girls' School, celebrated an outstanding set of eight GCSE grade 9s and one grade 8.

She said: "I'm really happy with my results. I'm looking forward to coming back to the Sixth Form and focusing on A Levels, with a view to going to university and continuing with high-level sport."

Ziyana Madathil and Tom Jurowski, also from Ponteland, also achieved great sets of GCSE grades 9 – 7 (A* - A) at Dame Allan's. Ziyana got six grade 9s, two grade 8s and one grade 7, while Tom got five grade 9s, three grade 8s and one grade 7.

More than 60 per cent of exams sat by Year 11 pupils at Dame Allan's Schools achieved grades 9 – 7 (A* to A) while more than 40 per cent were 9 – 8 grades. One fifth of all exams sat this year achieved a 9, the highest possible grade at GCSE.

Ponteland High School was also

celebrating outstanding grades across all subject areas in GCSE and vocational qualifications, with 36 students (14%) achieving five or more of the highest grades 7-9 (previously A*-A).

Ponteland High School Headteacher Stefan McElwee said the students had coped with both a local reorganisation of schools which saw them move to Pont High in Year 8 and Covid a few months later.

He said: "In the face of these challenges, our Year 11 students have shown admirable determination and resilience. All of our students should be extremely proud of themselves; they have shown a strength of character and work ethic to be proud of."

Historic pub reopens after takeover and makeover

A historic pub near Ponteland has reopened its doors after five years following a takeover and makeover.

The Highlander, which once hosted Bonnie Prince Charlie, has been restored by Unveiled Venues, which purchased the 18th century former coaching inn last year.

The firm was launched last October by Aidan and Helen Ruff to bring together the Ellingham Hall and Lemmington Hall wedding venues under one group brand. The addition of The Highlander marks Unveiled Venues' entry into the pub restaurant market.

Group Director Anthony Hunter said: "The building is Grade II listed and steeped in history. It dates back to the early 1700s and its doors closed in 2018. We have been keen on opening an additional site that reflects our wedding venues for some time, and The Highlander – Ponteland fits perfectly with our brand."

After a full restoration of its restaurant area, open plan lounge bar and function room, the venue – on the outskirts of Belsay on the A696 – reopened on September 14.

Its initial opening hours will be from Thursday to Sunday from 12noon.

Ofgem trebles storm compensation cap

The compensation cap for households and businesses that lose power as a result of severe weather events has been almost trebled by Ofgem to £2,000.

The new rules follow a review into the response to Storm Arwen by distribution network operators carried out by the energy regulator.

Ofgem has updated the statutory regulations all six operators responsible for linking up homes and businesses to the electricity network in Great Britain are required to follow.

Network companies that fail to follow the rules and protect consumers' interests could face multi-million-pound fines.

The changes include:

- Increasing the compensation cap for loss of supply due to severe weather from £700 to £2000, and increasing the initial payment from £70 to £80
- Reducing the length of the time consumers have to wait for additional compensation from 12 hours to six hours after the initial payment period

- Allowing all compensation payments to be made by bank transfer to simplify and speed up the payments process
- Reducing the time consumers would need to be without power before they are eligible for compensation.

Storm Arwen saw nearly one million homes and businesses lose power in November 2021, with 40,000 consumers cut off for three days and almost 4,000 having to cope without power for over a week in parts of northern England and north-east Scotland.

They included hundreds of homes and businesses in Ponteland, Darras Hall and surrounding villages Medburn, Whalton and Belsay.

Local MP Guy Opperman, who produced a report containing a series of recommendations for improvements to storm preparations by the energy firms, welcomed the changes.

He said: "I am delighted that Ofgem have made this decision following our campaign to improve storm preparedness this winter. This summer I have visited communities who were affected by Storm Arwen and I know this news will be welcomed."






